P. E. I. To Be Represented At Toronto Winter Fair

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 3.—Prominent figures in Canadian agriculture including the Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture for the Province of Prince Edward Island, and his Deputy Mr. S. C. Wright, are included among the Board of Directors of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair and, with the management and staff, are now preparing for the Royal's gala opening in the Coliseum here, November 11.
This year's Royal, which will be officially opened by Sir Roger Makins, the British Ambassador at Washington, has as its slogan "The Canadian Show Window of Agriculture" and "The Show Place of Champions." Each of Canada's ten provinces will be represented in the 18,000-odd entries which will be on display as exhibitors vie for trophies and cash awards.
The Horse Show again promises to be a colorful and exciting spectacle with some of the world's greatest riders from Mexico, the United States, Ireland, Canada and even South America competing. An unique and colourful feature in the Horse Show ring this year will be drills, bands and displays by famous and historical regiments of Canada, including on two evenings

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TO USE ATOM
LONDON (AP)—The government announced Wednesday it is giving the highest priority to development of atomic propulsion for warships. But J. P. L. Thomas, first lord of the admiralty, also told the House of Commons: "Some years must elapse before warships powered in this way can be expected to be in service with the fleet." The United States Navy now has two atomic-powered submarines and is developing this form of propulsion for other warships.
