## Provincial Swimming Meet At S'ide Today

The best of Queen's, King's and Prince County swimming and diving artists will hold full sway at the Marine Wharf on the Summerside waterfront this afternoon, commencing at two o'clock, when they will meet to compete for Provincial championships.

Chosen from the individual County trials held earlier this year, the two top winners in each event from all three Counties will pit their skill against one another in search of individual and team honors.

It is the second annual holding of the event and is again being sponsored by the Summerside Y's Men Club. Some 100 or more competitors are expected to compete in a total of 25 events ranging from boys and girls of 13 years and under to men's and ladies' open senior events.

An experienced and competent group of officials have been appointed to take charge of the meet and officials are looking forward to it being an even greater success than the inaugural meeting held about this time last year. The keenest type of competition and good sportsmanship is expected to offer a fine afternoon of aquatic skill and entertainment for spectators.

## Hawks Mail Contract To New Coach

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 21 (CP)—Lebaron A. Reid, president of Moncton Hawks Club of the Maritime Major Hockey League, said tonight he had mailed the "biggest contract ever" offered to Tommy (Cowboy) Anderson, of Drumheller, Alta.

Anderson, former coach of Pittsburgh Hornets of the American Hockey League, agreed to terms by telephone several days ago, Reid said. He declined to reveal the salary the former N. H. L. player would receive but said it included "substantial" bonuses based on the position in which the team finished in the league standings.

Reid said the Maritime Major League championship would be the goal of this year's edition of the Hawks. Last season the team finished in the cellar of a four-team league.

## Bob Feller Chalks Up 20th Win This Season

 Bob Feller won his 20th of the season for Cleveland Indians Tuesday night, dumping Washington Nationals to their 10th straight defeat, a 4-0 shutout. The win preserved Cleveland's one-game margin over New York Yankees.

Feller gave only six hits and held the upper hand all the way as he reformed the select 20-game winners after an absence of three seasons. It was the sixth time in his 13 campaigns with league-leading Cleveland that he had won 20 or more—a feat passed by only five other hurlers in American League history: Cy Young, Walter Johnson, Lefty Grove, Eddie Plank and Wes Ferrell.

So far this season no other major league chucker has won more than 17.

The shutout was Feller's third this year. He has lost five.

By the end of the 19th inning the Indians had given Feller a 5-0 lead, which he protected by retiring the Nats 1-2-3 in the fourth, fifth and sixth.

Larry Doby hit a home run in the seventh—his 19th of the season.

## Addressed Meeting In Winnipeg Recently

Results achieved so far in experiments being carried on locally were described recently by Mr. Lorne Callbeck of the Science Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture in a scientific paper entitled "Effect of Zinc-Containing Fungicides on the Growth and Yield of Potatoes." The paper was presented by Mr. Callbeck during the recent annual meeting of the Canadian Phyto-Pathological Society held in Winnipeg.

Mr. Callbeck stated that while everything was still very much in the experimental stage the results apparently indicated that zinc-containing fungicides increased the yield. More experiments on a large scale are being conducted this year to try to determine definite results.

Mr. Callbeck, who is plant pathologist in the local branch of the Science Service, also attended the annual meeting of the Agricultural Institute of Canada held at the same time in the western city. He was absent about three weeks and while away visited Ottawa and other Canadian cities as well as the states of Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota. He was accompanied by Mrs. Callbeck and their daughter, Claudette. While in Winnipeg he was interviewed over the C.B.C. in company with Dr. W. Newton, of Vancouver Island, as they were designated the two most widely separated pathologists.

## Crop Report

OTTAWA, Aug. 21 (CP)—Harvesting of hay and grain has been delayed in the Maritime Provinces by recent rains, the Bureau of Statistics reported today, in a telegraphic crop report covering conditions across Canada.

The potato blight is "quite prevalent" in the commercial areas of New Brunswick. Pastures throughout the Maritimes are excellent.

Hay in Quebec has been delayed by continuing wet weather. In general, the crop is heavier than usual but poorer in quality. Potatoes and truck crops are satisfactory.

Harvesting of spring grains in Southern Ontario is well advanced. Excellent yields and quality are reported.

Crop conditions on the Prairies are generally good, but rains dur-

## Stars Score 5-3 Victory Over Northeast Rovers

Fred Whalen's cellar-dwelling East End Stars came up with a 5-3 victory over the MacFarlane-coached second place Northeast Rovers in a regular City Baseball League fixture played at Memorial Field last evening.

Getting underway late, the game was called due to darkness after four and a half innings of play, the Stars foregoing their trip to the plate in the last of the fifth with a two-run bulge.

The game was the third last regular schedule tilt but made no change in the present standings of the two teams in the league race.

West End Anchors are at the top of the loop over Northwest Falcons and still have two games to play. Rovers and Stars have one left each while Falcons have completed their schedule.

Junior MacLeod was the winning hurler with a three-hit performance while losing moundsman Donnie MacLean was also only tagged for three bingles.

Rovers led at the end of two innings of play by two runs when they capitalized on two hits and six Stars' errors, but the Stars came belting back in the last of the third for four runs on three hits off MacLeod. One was a double by Maurice Williams that batted home two runs and then scored himself on an error by the catcher on an attempted steal home. Charles Ready scored the fourth after he got on with a single and came home from third on a wild pitch.

Both hurlers struck out five batters each. MacLeod walking two batters and MacLean giving up four free passes.

Third sacker Charlie Kennedy of the Rovers came up with the big clout of the night when he sent a long drive into right field for a triple in the fourth with nobody on.

## To Compete In Ottawa Tennis Tournament

Two young local tennis enthusiasts, Jack MacDonald and Peter McGonnell of Queen Square School, winner and runner-up in the recent junior boys Provincial tennis championships, have been chosen by Mr. Jim Palmer, local Canadian Lawn Tennis Association representative, to compete in the Canadian Junior Tennis championships that commence at Ottawa this Saturday.

The two youthful racket wielders will be the first in many years to be given the opportunity of representing the Province in Dominion competition.

Endeavouring to encourage junior tennis on a Canada-wide scale, the C.L.T.A. are paying the greater part of the boys' expenses for the trip.

The tourney will commence at Ottawa on August 25th and will continue on through Saturday, September 1st. During the tournament the local juniors will also have the opportunity of taking instruction from two United States tennis professionals, one of them being Leo Christie who has been in charge of Canada's Davis Cup team during the past four years.

They will leave Thursday morning for Saskatoon, N.B., where they will join the Nova Scotia junior contingent and will proceed from there to Ottawa by chartered bus.

MacDonald and McGonnell are entered in the 18 years and under boys singles, doubles and mixed doubles and also in all three of the same divisions in the 15 years and under bracket.

On their return, following the Canadian championships, the two local lads are expected to be two of the leading contenders in the City interscholastic tennis tournament to be held here in mid-September.

## Five Candidates For Baseball Commissioner

 NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (AP)—Major League club owners whittled the list of candidates for commissioner of baseball to five today and said they hoped to pick their man at a joint meeting in Chicago Sept. 20.

"Every one of the five men has told us he is available," said Del Webb, co-owner of the New York Yankees and chairman of the group of owners who met in an all-day screening session at the Waldorf Astoria.

He declined to identify any of the remaining candidates but it is believed Warren Giles, president of the Cincinnati Reds, and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, former superintendent of West Point, are high on the list.

Lou Perini of the Boston Braves said some of the candidates in the original list of 11 eliminated themselves.

Generals Dwight Eisenhower and Douglas MacArthur are believed among those who asked that they not be considered. Former Postmaster General Jim Farley and George Trautman, president of the minor leagues, are also out of the picture, according to information received by the Associated Press.

In the original list and possibly still in the running are Ford Frick, president of the National League; Gen. Clifton B. Cates, Marine Corps commandant; and Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, commander of the Air Force.

## Large Increase Noted In July Rail Shipments

An increase of over one hundred percent in the number of railroads exported from this Province in July, 1951 over July 1950, is the highlight of the July report of railway shipments as issued by the Charlottetown office of the Canadian National Railway Superintendent.

The number of railroads of pulpwood, 431, accounts for approximately 57% of the total cars moved out last July. This compares with a total of only four railroads in July, 1950.

Potato shipments continued to drop, the totals for 1950 and 1951 being 95 and 85. Lumber, with 12 cars this year to one in July, 1950, scrap 13 to 0, and canned goods 9-0, were other notable increases.

On the import side sand, stone and gravel showed the largest increase in railroads to 44. Flour and feed, gas and oil, lime, salt, and vegetables were other commodities with increases. Autos, coal, lumber, sugar, cement, and canned goods all showed decreases.

Shipments for last month, with the corresponding month in 1950 in brackets, are as follows:

Total of import railroads was 1387, showing an increase of 76 railroads over July, 1950.

Total of export railroads was 752, showing an increase of 387 railroads over July 1950.

This particular tournament highlights the activities of the Ladies Branch of the club for the season and it is anticipated by the Games Committee that the interest shown presages a goodly number of entries.

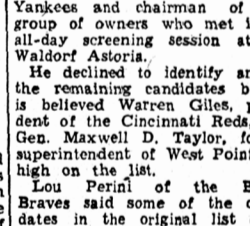
Thursday's play will be 18 holes and entries may be left with Mrs. Marc Sandow at the Clubhouse.
