A FINE topsail schooner, built and owned by David Egan, Esq., Mount Stewart, arrived here this morning to complete her cargo for Newfoundland. She is called the "Kha B," is one hundred and thirty tons, is well finished and creditable in every respect to her owner.

NEW PAPER FOR MONCTON. Mr. R. Higman, who has a job printing office in connection with his drug business, is to commence the publication of a weekly paper, to be called the "Argus," about the first of December. The sheet will be 18 by 24.

SCHOONER "Capella," of P. E. Island, recently stranded on Oak Island, was successfully launched and brought into port, by Jas. T. Betts, who made a fine thing of the job. She is now lying at the wharf under charter for ports in P. E. Island.—Pictou News.

MR. E. E. ROBINS, son of John Robins, Esq., of the Dominion Finance Department, arrived home from Honolulu last night. Mr. Robins has been for a number of years in the employ of the Canadian Sugar Company, in the Sandwich Islands. He comes to spend a winter in his native city.

HEAVY FOAL.—Mr. H. B. Smith's foal by Royal Harry, out of his small Melnis mare, which took first prize at the Provincial Exhibition, is growing very rapidly. At the time of the Exhibition he weighed 496, he has now increased to 572—a heavy weight for a cart foal, but extraordinary for a well-bred one.

THE schooner "Lottie" is ashore at Pictou Light, she was bound from St. John's, Nfld., for Charlottetown, and was put into this port for a harbor. She will probably remain where she is until the spring. The schooner "Kezia," from Boston on the same place, was driven ashore at Roy's Island, Merigomish, where she still lies.—Pictou News.

THAT this is one of the mildest seasons experienced for many years all will admit; but that it is so mild as to grow strawberries few will believe. However, such is the fact. Mr. Theophilus Crosby, of Cornwall, brought to the city to-day a luscious garden strawberry, which he picked from his garden on the 22nd inst. It is now on exhibition at Dodd's Medical Hall. Those who want "Ocular demonstration," can go and see it.

NOVA SCOTIA MINTING.—The Trades Journal says it is rumored that a gentleman that an English company contemplates the erection of a blast furnace or furnaces in that locality. The ore is to be brought from the East River and smelted there. The Halifax Company are erecting a crusher at McGregor pit, Stellerton. The machine comprises a number of iron rollers which move in opposite directions, and so arranged that all the coal drawn between them is made uniform size. The coal thus crushed is to be used in coke-making.

A TRAGIC affair occurred at the festival connected with the marriage of the daughter of Thomas Lowther at Mount Whately, near Sackville, N. B., on the 21st inst. After the ceremony was performed about half-past seven, a charivari party appeared at Mr. Lowther's residence and fired a salute. A young farmer named Benjamin Smith, belonging to Fort Lawrence fell dead. A shot hole about an inch in diameter was discovered about a short range into his right side. It is supposed to have been accidentally done. The affair has created a most painful shock.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL, No. 15, in Baltimore, Md., was badly damaged by fire on the 19th. The flames had evidently been smouldering several days, for when they broke out the flooring of two large class-rooms immediately gave way. The scholars had left the building a few minutes previous, thus making a narrow escape. The school was one of the largest in Baltimore. Some years ago a scholar named Campbell committed suicide by hanging himself in the yard, and ever since strange stories have been told about the ghostly midnight wanderings of the boy's uneasy spirit through the empty school-rooms.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Struck—But Not Struck Dumb

LONDON, Nov. 23.

The Morning Post says, "We are struck with amazement at the singular shortsightedness and want of prescience exhibited by Her Majesty's Government in wishing to withdraw British troops from Egypt at such a juncture."

The Standard admits it is quite clear this is no time to withdraw troops from Egypt.

The Daily Telegraph thinks British military prestige alone can arrest the progress of El Medhi's army.

The Times cannot believe Gladstone will willfully and blindly persist in weakening the small British force now in Egypt. It says England will hold the Government answerable if by further errors of judgment Egypt is allowed to relapse into anarchy. A Cairo despatch says the Egyptian Government favors the sending of a strong force to Khartoum for the purpose of opening a road between Suakin and Berber, and thus maintaining communication with Khartoum.

The War Cloud.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 23.

A secret Imperial decree has been published appointing Lin, Generalissimo of the Black Flags in Tonquin.

The Chinese Government will supply the funds and munitions of war to the forces now being raised in Tun-Nan. These troops will assist the Black Flags in repelling the French forces should they invade the southern provinces, but they must not cross the frontier into Tonquin.

"A Drawback"

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.

An Order in Council has been passed, granting a drawback of ten cents per ton upon all shipping built in the Dominion, in addition to drawbacks previously allowed on cordage, canvas, iron knees and other articles used in the business.

New rules for the government of proceedings in vice-admiralty courts, have been made by the Imperial authorities.

Work-people Protest.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

At a meeting of 600 employees of the Metropolitan Underground Railway last night, a resolution was passed declaring that the outrage at Praed Street Station was an attack upon the hard working people of the metropolis. Copies of the resolution will be sent to the American Minister and to Parnell.

An Army Annihilated.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

A special despatch to the Times from Khartoum, dated Nov. 20, says the most trustworthy Hicks in the service of the Government, who arrived at Douen yesterday, report 1,100 men, including Hicks Pasha, the Governor General, and the entire staff, were annihilated. Hicks Pasha was captured.

A Further Issue of Stock.

MONTREAL, Nov. 23.

President Stephen, of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., has issued a circular stating that thirty days after date the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. will issue the balance of its authorized capital stock, amounting to 45,000,000 dollars.

A Place Found for Him.

TORONTO, Nov. 23.

G. W. Ross, ex-M. P., who was lately unseated in Middlesex, has been appointed Minister of Education in Ontario, vice Mr. Crooks resigned.

A Fatal Fire.

UNIONVILLE, Mo., Nov. 23.

A house belonging to F. W. Huston, farmer, was burned last night. Mrs. Huston and two children perished in the flames.

Bank Failure.

VIKESBURG, Nov. 23.

The Mississippi Valley Bank has made a bad failure. The liabilities reach \$800,000, the cash on hand being only \$13,000.

Newfoundland's New Governor.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

Sir John Hawley Glover, lately Governor of Antigua and Leeward Islands, has been appointed Governor of Newfoundland.

Down on Parnell.

CORK, Nov. 23.

The Board of Trustees refused the use of the Exhibition Hall to Parnell for the purpose of delivering an address.

Fire at Moncton.

MONCTON, Nov. 23.

A fire occurred here at six o'clock to-night, and about 1,500 dollars worth of property was destroyed.

Fatal Collision.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

Two steamers collided on Lake Geneva yesterday, and twenty passengers were drowned.

Another Cotton Failure.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 23.

Cowie, Duckworth & Co., cotton brokers, have failed.

Murder and Robbery.

KICKMAN, Ky., Nov. 23.

Hillsman King and wife were murdered last night, and their house robbed of \$2,000.

Hicks Pasha Betrayed.

CAIRO, Nov. 23.

A telegram from Mr. Power at Khartoum, the artist who was with Hicks Pasha, reports that the first attack by the Egyptian army was successful, and that it was not until the enemy was believed to be routed that Hicks Pasha accepted the guidance of an emissary of Mahdi, who led the army into a waterless defile where it was annihilated.

The Failure List.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.

R. G. Dun & Co., report 247 failures in the United States and Canada this week as against 235 last week. Three fifths of these failures occurred in Western and Southern and Pacific States.

War Inevitable.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

A Paris despatch says the Marquis Tseng has notified Earl Granville that war between China and France is certain to occur.

APPLES are scarce in the St. John market. The prices obtained there is from four to five dollars per barrel. There are two reasons the Telegraph says for the scarcity. (1) The crop in Nova Scotia was considerably below the average, and (2) There is a new market for fruit in the United States. This year the demand for Nova Scotian apples was so great across the border that the apple growers of Nova Scotia had everything their own way. The Americans began to visit that Province before the fruit was fairly ripe and in some instances bought the productions of whole orchards. The variety known as gravensteins was the only kind of which there was an average yield, and these were bought up at good prices wherever they could be obtained. An idea of the quantity of apples thus sold may be gained from the fact that for weeks the American steamer completed her cargo each trip with apples. The best of the fruit was disposed of in that way, leaving only an inferior quality for the places formerly supplied with the best. The worst feature, however, is that the variety of fruit of which there was the poorest yield is the kind which is usually kept for spring use, so that at that season of the year it is altogether likely that a barrel of apples will cost much higher than it does at present.

HON. THOMAS H. DUDLEY, formerly American Consul at Liverpool, is to give a lecture in New York on the 21st, on "The System of American Protection," said England was employing to ruin the American protective system the Cobden club, which was awarded medals for free trade essays in Harvard, Yale, and Vassar Colleges, and the Professors of Political Economy in Yale and Williams Colleges are both members of the Cobden club. The lecturer said they were Professors Saunders, of Yale, and Perry, of Williams. He did not know that these professors were paid by the Cobden club, but as a lawyer, he did not himself feel disposed to work for nothing, and supposed they did not.
