Rotary Speaker Discusses Causeway Electric Cable

A.D. Cameron, a former general manager of the Maritime Electric Co. and now an official with the Montreal Engineering Co. Ltd. told the members of the Charlottetown Rotary Club recently that the electric cable on the new causeway which will link P.E.I. into the Maritime power grid will probably be operated at half capacity for the first few years to provide the same service at lower cost.

Mr. Cameron said that the final details of the size, voltage and arrangement of the proposed cable has still not been approved by the Atlantic Development Board. "The link," he said, "will probably have a capacity of between 100,000 and 140,000 kilowatts. It will be capable of operating at 138,000 volts but will probably be operated for the first few years at 89,000 volts, to provide the same service at lower cost."

Mr. Cameron said it is planned that P.E.I. will join the Maritime interconnection as a full partner, meaning it will have to maintain capacity with its own system during peak loads and make its contribution to the capacity held in reserve by the power pool.

The former general manager of the Maritime Electric Co. said "the biggest economy in the joining of a power pool lies in being able to share a common reserve capacity instead of having to carry the spare capacity necessary."

An additional advantage of joining such a grid is the privilege of the partners to purchase so-called "economy energy" that is available at a given time in the power pool.

In his talk to the Rotary Club, Mr. Cameron reviewed the history of the Maritime Electric Co. from the time it used to be known as the Charlottetown Light and Power Company, which in 1886 had one generator,

capable of producing 150 kilowatts. Today the high pressure steam turbines of the Maritime Electric Co. drive generators capable of producing 50,000 kilowatts.

STUDIES BEING MADE

In speaking of the future of the company, Mr. Cameron said there is on order a high efficiency 20,000 kilowatt unit. "For the first time," said Mr. Cameron, "engineering studies are being made of locations outside of Charlottetown for this unit."

He estimated the studies should be completed by late spring.

To help him explain the operations of the Maritime Electric plant in Charlottetown Mr. Cameron showed the gathering a number of colored slides illustrating the many and varied

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says cloud covered Prince Edward Island and most of Nova Scotia late Tuesday. In New Brunswick, skies were generally clear. A few snowflurries were occurring in the eastern sections of the district.

An area of high pressure over Quebec will move into the Maritimes today, and skies will gradually clear in all sections of the district. Afternoon temperatures will range from the mid 20s to near 30.

This area of high pressure will give sunny weather Thursday with little temperature change.

Regional forecasts:

Northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore, Prince Edward Island: Cloudy with a few snowflurries becoming mostly sunny near noon; not much change in temperature; winds northerly 15. Diminishing tonight to light.

Low-high at New Glasgow and Goshen 13 and 29. Charlottetown 17 and 26. Outlook for Thursday — Sunny with little temperature change.
