Business Conference Has Wide Range of Subjects

Seven separate conferences will feature the annual meeting in Toronto June 24 of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, whose theme will be "Manufacturing—Canada's Future."

Only registration and receptions mark the opening day, Sunday, and the jammed business sessions of the next two days has as many as four conferences going on at once. Their topics will be world trade, taxation, transportation, industrial relations, public relations, economic growth, and management.

Program participants as speakers, chairman, panelists or moderators number more than 75, including more than 30 main addressers.

Labour Minister Allan Rock will speak at the industrial relations conference and J. Dana Wilgress, who has served Canada in many posts and now is chairman of the Canadian Section, Permanent Joint Board on Defence (Canada - U.S.A.), will address the world trade conference.

Speakers at the conference on economic growth will include W. Earle McLaughlin, chairman and president, Royal Bank of Canada; and Claude Jodan, high schools and universities.

The chemical industry of Canada meets in Toronto June 26-27. About 150 chemists and chemical engineers are expected to attend and they will hear 130 technical papers and see 60 exhibits of new chemical equipment, instruments and chemicals.

Discussion topics will range from how a beam of light can vaporize minerals for analysis purposes, to new approaches to the teaching of chemistry in high schools and universities.
