

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The Letcher stable of Springhill, N.S. is now at the Charlottetown track and the horses look in the pink of condition. Their spring training was done at Amherst, N.S. The popular trotter Jennie Kalmuck 2:10 1/2 is full of life and looks as though she will race in the same form she displayed two years ago. The get of Kalmuck 2:15 1/2, have long-wearing qualities and Jennie took her record as an 11-year-old racing against trotters and pacers alike. This year she is eligible to the 2:19 trot. Of course most interest is centered in the purchases made last fall from S. A. Wathen and Son Stable, Fort Fairfield, Maine. Direct Mite 2:06 1/2 is a five-year-old pacer by the world's champion pacer, Billy Direct 1:53. He had winnings of \$6,380 last year and is eligible to the 2:17 pace.

Mighty Deb is a three-year-old by Mighty H. 2:04 1/2. She is a handsome roan filly that took a two-year-old record last season on a mile track of 2:03 and raced against the best two-year-olds in the large stakes at the principal racing centres. She had winnings last year of \$3,260 but with allowances this year is eligible to a 2:22 pace. Both these horses are perfect mannered as one would expect coming from the Wathen stable. The big black pacer, A. G. Scott 2:09 1/2 by Highland Scott 1:59 1/2, looks better than ever and we understand has been training to perfection. He has a heart like a lion and if he is anywhere near his opposition when he heads for the wire he is pretty sure to be first. He is eligible to a 2:17 pace. Promising two-year-old completes the string, and are under the care of George Gardner.

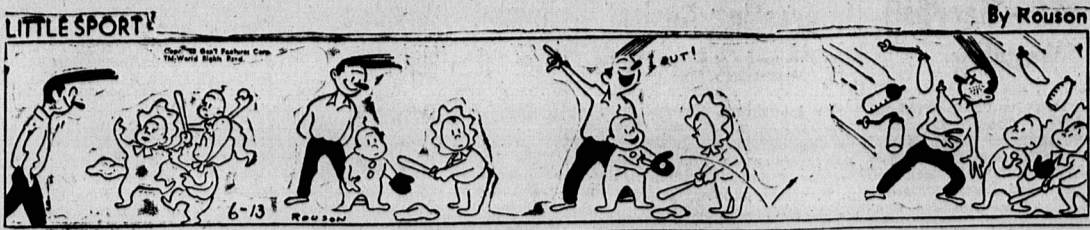
Walter S. Pound writes from California that he is shipping his stable on June 20 to Vernon Downs Raceway, N.Y. He has had very good success at the meet in California. Prudent Found, a green pacer, won both her starts, the last in 2:09 1/2. Hawkins Hess, a three-year-old won his only start in 2:10 1/2. Patrick Primrose was beaten a head by Rush Hour 2:00. He is owned by the movie actor

Charles Coburn and his driver is Jake Rodman. Patrick Primrose was starting out of his class. He is eligible to a 2:16 pace and this is his first defeat in nine starts. We predict that at Vernon Downs he will take a record close to 2:02.

Secretary Ken MacDougall announces that there are 122 horses now quartered at Cape Breton Sports Centre, which he believes to be a record for a full season's racing program at a Maritime track. Handling these 122 horses are 55 trainers with Worrell Lewis having the greatest number under his care. Worrell has Crusader Chief, Shining Hour, Jenny Lynn, Miss Judy Hal, Lotta Lee, Miss Daisy Mae, Mary's Delight, Jolly Jim and Lee Hy. The Joe MacDonald stable has Josedale Clansman, Colonel Hansford, Connelly, Cobblestone, Bonnie Reamore, Lilly Belle Lee. Then there's Wendy Carroll, formerly of the Truro Raceway, who has Pat D. Sandy Budlong, Bud's Best, Miss Eloise and Shinar Direct, which make up the Vei Stables. The 122 horses are owned by 81 shown owners, and they cover Sydney, Glace Bay, New Waterford, Sydney Mines, North Sydney, Little Bras D'Or, Port Morien, Lingan, New York and Charlottetown.

A thoughtful friend sent us results of some of the races at Roosevelt Raceway in which Maritime horses were starters. In the 2nd Race May 30, Doctor J. A. went away in third position, jumped off at the 16th pole, came on well but could not make it. He was driven by Del MagTavish. Lock Hanover, driven by Bob Ryan, was in second position and finished eighth. Lock led to the quarter but made a bad break, caught and broke again. The time was 2:11, the first quarter in 32 1/2 seconds. A very heavy track.
