

Local and Other Items.

HIGH TIDE to-day. I. O. O. F.—St. Lawrence Lodge meets to-night. CIVIC. The regular monthly meeting of the City Council will be held this evening. SCOTT ACT.—One more new summons has been served. It is for a third offence and is returnable to-morrow. THE RIFLE.—No. 2 Battery will meet at 8 o'clock to-morrow evening, to arrange for the final match to be shot for their badge. ARRIVED.—The brig, Hattie Louise, Captain Bernard, has arrived at Barba oca, all well. The passage occupied seventeen days. COMING.—The last number of the Dominion Illustrated announces that views of Charlottetown are in preparation for that excellent pictorial. APPLES FOR ENGLAND.—The Annapolis Spectator says that about 12000 barrels of Greensteins will be shipped to London via Halifax this week. The apples are the product of the Annapolis and Cornwallis valleys. SHOOTING.—The annual shooting of No. 3 Company for the Company's silver cup will take place on Kensington Range Wednesday, 10th inst. Also the Graham Cup and a number of other prizes. Shooting to commence at 12 o'clock sharp. THE STARR.—The steamer M. A. Starr, Captain Ferguson, arrived here from Halifax via intermediate ports, after an exceedingly rough passage, at eight o'clock yesterday morning. She brought the usual general cargo, and sails on return this evening, with a full freight of lobsters, potatoes and oats. DRIVING PARK.—Stock is already taken in the proposed Exhibition Ground and Driving Park to the amount of \$15,000. All having \$200 to invest should not lose the opportunity of investing in this enterprise. A meeting of stockholders and all interested will be held this evening, in J. D. McLeod's Hall, at 8 o'clock. THE RULING PASSION, ETC.—During the fire yesterday morning some of the ladies boarding in the neighborhood, after carefully packing their trunks, remained behind to arrange their bangs, spending as much time before the mirror as though they were getting ready for church or a shopping expedition. MONCTON POLICE STATISTICS.—The Moncton police made 22 arrests during the month of Sept. and collected \$50 in fines and costs, as compared with 20 arrests and \$25.20 in fines and costs during the month of August and 17 arrests and the collection of \$28.75 during September of last year. COURTS.—An exchange reports that cleverly executed counterfeit \$5 and \$1 bills of the United States are being largely circulated. The paper in the five dollar bill is a trifle thicker than it should be, and the head of Gen. Grant somewhat rougher. In the one dollar counterfeits the paper is better, but the same defect exists in the head of Martha Washington as in the head of Gen. Grant. THE CURRIE CASE.—The celebrated D. D. Currie case will probably be among the first cases reached at the sitting of the Supreme Court which begins at Fredericton to-morrow (Tuesday). In this case the Methodist conference are called upon to show cause why Rev. Mr. Currie should not be reinstated. The case involves some fine points in ecclesiastical law, and will be watched with general interest. CANADIAN CATTLE.—A further sale of Canadian store cattle imported by the Canadian Cattle Company at Aberdeen, yielded an average price. 397 were sold. There was a large attendance and brisk buying. The total proceeds were \$5647 15s giving an average of £14 4s, 6d per head, against £13 10s., the average of the last cargo. An extra cargo of 315 cattle is due by the Europa, and the trade is assuming large proportions. POLICE COURT.—Ann Doherty, violation of Scott Act, remanded for one week, to be released from custody on furnishing two bailes in \$50 each. Charles Slate, drunk and out after hours, \$30 or 30 days. Norman Valley, drunk and disorderly, \$90 or 90 days. David Carroll, charged with being one of a gang that crested a disturbance in a house on Pownal Street on Saturday evening, was remanded till to-morrow. James Burns, out after hours, three months hard labor. ANOTHER WARNING.—There have been a good many warnings published this year from Canadians in the States, to their friends in the Provinces. Among the latest is one from a Nova Scotian, formerly of Cornwallis, who writes to say that he has been five months in California and that he is in a position to warn Canadians against going there, unless they are men of money and wish to invest. He says that there is an immigration society in San Francisco, run in the interests of the railways, by which Canada is flooded with literature, and this literature is doing much harm by inducing Canadians to go to California. Bad for the Tramps.

MONTREAL, Oct. 8. While three tramps were walking on the C. P. track at Lachine to-day an express came up behind them and blew her whistle. Two of the tramps left the track, but the third remained on, and his head and arm were taken completely off. While the train was backing up the tramp companions were seen rifling his clothing. They even attempted to get his boots off, but failed and fled to the woods.

The Ross-McDougall Competition.

NEW GLASGOW, Oct. 6. The Ross-McDougall hammer throwing contest came off this afternoon on the athletic grounds. A large crowd was in attendance. McDougall won the light hammer, throwing it 132 feet 1 inch. Ross won the 16 pound throw, while McDougall won the heavy hammer, throwing it 87 feet. Rain fell slightly, interfering with the throwing.

Destroyed by Floods.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 7. The Governor of the State of Hidalgo has received from Zacualtipan information that the town of Hacodina has been completely destroyed by floods. Over 300 families rendered homeless are in the mountains and in great distress. Many of the houses were so completely buried in the sand that the owners are unable to discover the slightest vestige of them.

Small Pox in Toronto.

TORONTO, Oct. 6. Two more cases of small pox have been discovered since Friday night, and people are becoming thoroughly alarmed. Twelve physicians are busily engaged in house to house vaccination, and the Board of Health are seriously thinking of enforcing quarantine on Buffalo.

No New Developments.

TORONTO, Oct. 6. There are no new developments in the Galt candy poisoning case. A detective has been put upon the case, and the viscera of the dead children and the unopened packages have been sent here for analysis. The package for McKay, of Pictou, N. S., turns out to have been sent by his employer as a sample.

Exemption from Taxes.

TORONTO, Oct. 6. The congregation of Jarvis Street Baptist Church have been discussing for some time the question as to whether church property should pay its proportion of municipal taxes, and have decided at last that it should. It was held by them that church exemption is a form of state and which should not be countenanced by the Baptist denomination.

Charge Dismissed.

TORONTO, Oct. 6. The charge against E. B. Cox, ex-broker, of appropriating to his own use \$10,000 of Central Bank funds, has been dismissed. The failure of the charges against him is ascribed to the cashier's refusal to return from Minneapolis and testify.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 7. The yellow fever official bulletin for the 24 hours ending 6 p. m. to-day, shows new cases 33, deaths 9; total cases to date, 3,151; corrected number total deaths, 291. The deaths to-day include Edward Martin, editor of the Times-Union.

Immoral Literature.

KINGSTON, Oct. 7. All numbers of the New York Illustrated, exposed for sale here yesterday, were seized by the customs authorities as immoral literature.

Becoming Insane.

MONTREAL, Oct. 7. It is believed that Pitcher, the Providence bank embezzler, who is serving seven years in the penitentiary, is becoming insane.

Donation.

MONTREAL, Oct. 7. Mr. Molson, of this city, has donated \$3,000 to the library of the Fraser Institute.

Archbishop O'Brien is preaching a series of sermons on "The Catechism and Creation," in St. Mary's Cathedral, Halifax. Messrs. Leslie Clay and J. A. McLeod, of Summerside, were in town yesterday on their way to college, in the Upper Provinces.—Moncton Times. Mr. John Rogers, the popular representative of Evans, Sons and Mason, Montreal, is on a business trip to the Island. He is registered at the Davies. John Wesley once wrote to Adam Clarke this laconic epistle: "Do not please the devil by preaching too loud or too long, but please God by denying yourself herein." The Amherst Gazette says that Messrs. Dawson and Usher have left for the Island to purchase horses for the Chignecto Marine Railway. Mr. Henry Moore, agricultural editor of the Liberator Times, has returned from a tour

of inspection of Manitoba and the Northwest, much impressed by the capabilities of those regions. The Rev. John Carroll, of St. Mary's Church, Chicago, is said to be the oldest priest in the United States. He was ordained Jan. 20, 1820. He was born in Ireland in 1797.
