Transport Board. Continued from page 1. Roads Association did not coincide with the part provincial treasurers should play in an enlarged program of protection for crossings.

The Government is to take some of the load off the provinces and municipalities. On the present taxation basis, they "cannot devote more money to the protection of crossings."

The CPA suggested that both the federal and provincial governments assume some of the municipalities' burden. The federal government would bear the greater share of this easement.

Urges Adequate Funds. The labor organizations said that the current study would serve no good purpose unless federal and provincial governments were prepared to "make adequate funds available."

All were agreed, however, that an intensive program of public education should be undertaken in conjunction with an enlarged plan of crossing protection.

Alberta government counsel J. J. Frayley took issue with an earlier proposal of the Canadian Pacific railway that the transport board be given power to order provinces to pay specified shares of safety measures. Mr. Frayley said the provinces always have co-operated in this respect.

Under existing legislation, the board can enforce cost-sharing orders on the railways and municipalities, but not on provincial governments. Wednesday, Chief Commissioner J. D. Kearney said the board is not inclined to "invade" provincial jurisdiction.

Commanded Athabaskan. Capt. Reed commanded the destroyer Athabaskan during her third tour of duty in the Far East, from October, 1952, to December, 1953. Reed is the senior officer of the three Canadian warships in the theatre.

His citation says he "led his force with outstanding ability and has always displayed great devotion to duty and untiring energy in execution of his duty. In command of HMCS Athabaskan he has successfully attacked vital enemy communications causing great disruption and many casualties. On many occasions his ship has attacked and silenced enemy gun positions threatening our forces and he has displayed great coolness and courage."

Capt. Reed was at one time chief of staff to Vice Admiral E. R. Maloney, chief of naval staff. Capt. Reed on Feb. 26 takes up an appointment with the supreme Allied commander, Atlantic, at Norfolk, Va., as assistant director of sea and air lines communications.

Bagged Three Trains. Cmdr. Lantier's citation says the Haida, which he commanded, inflicted considerable damage on the enemy through the officer's "outstanding leadership and daring."

"His skill and enterprise in effectively attacking and destroying transportation vital to the enemy earned him high commendation from the United Nations command."

The Haida was credited with destroying three enemy trains. Cmdr. Lantier now commands HMCS d'Iberville, training establishments for French-speaking recruits at Quebec City.

He was aboard the destroyer Ottawa when she was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine in the North Atlantic in September, 1942. He was wounded while serving in the first Athabaskan when the ship was hit by a glider bomb in the Bay of Biscay in August, 1943. He was still aboard the destroyer when she was sunk in action off the French coast in April, 1944. He was picked up and held prisoner by the Germans until May, 1945.

It would also be this government's task, Molotov said, to keep Germany out of coalitions or military alliances against former Second World War enemies.

Molotov proposed that the four occupying powers withdraw their armed forces from Germany, except for "limited contingents," even before the balloting, to prevent any interference with and pressure by foreign powers during the all-German elections.
