THE MEDICAL CONVENTION.

Closing Session Last Evening Followed by Supper at the Davies.

At yesterday afternoon's session of the Maritime Medical Association a paper on "The relative value of excision and erosion of the knee joint," was read by Dr. McKay, of Halifax; and a discussion on "Tuberculosis joints" followed. Dr. McKay was the subject discussed by Dr. Ross, of Halifax, and two interesting cases were exhibited.

Dr. Dodge read a paper entitled "A plea for common sense and more rational methods in the treatment of diseases of the nasal passage." An interesting discussion followed "A note on Exophthalmic Goitre," by Dr. Miller.

At the evening session Dr. A. Ross, of Vernon River, read a paper on "Diphtheria"; and "Two cases of brain surgery," by Dr. A. McNeill, closed the programme.

At the opening of the afternoon session Prof. Cushing, of Boston, gave a valuable address on the subject of hystero-myopia. Dr. James Bell, of Montreal, made some interesting remarks on the subject of injuries to the brain in connection with the cases presented.

Before adjourning a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the home medical men for their hospitality during the convention, and the visitors were thanked most heartily for their attendance and co-operation.

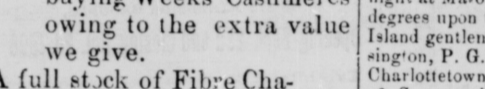

MCLURE'S MAGAZINE FOR JULY.

Whoever cares to know how Rudyard Kipling composes one of his spirited baroque romances installed in the new issue of the opening paper in McClure's Magazine for July. Written by Mr. E. Kay Robinson with whom Kipling was intimately associated in the editorship of a newspaper in India, the paper is full of interesting personal facts about Kipling. But perhaps surpassing this in abundance of new personal detail is a paper of recollections of Longfellow, Whittier and Holmes, by Elizabeth Stuart Phelps. When it appears, while never lacking for affectionate care, and never losing his cheerful tone, was, in his last years, much oppressed by loneliness, and Holmes, while generally so merry a man, was at heart grave almost to melancholy. In his later years the latter experienced, too, quite a radical change in his religious views. Both papers are fully illustrated with portraits and other pictures; and, forming an independent article, is a comprehensive series of portraits of Longfellow.

A woman's account of her own experience in climbing to the very top of the Matterhorn—a feat which few women have proved equal to; an illustrated article by Cleveland Moffet, indicating the revolution that is already beginning to be wrought in travel—travels in the horsecarriage; a paper of reminiscences and anecdotes from personal associates of Abraham Lincoln at the bar, showing Lincoln's life and methods as a lawyer; and a paper by Mr. Will H. Low on the present state of printing in Germany, with reproductions of recent celebrated German paintings—another noteworthy feature of this issue is Mr. C. H. Clarke, president of the American Geographical Society, writes of the growth of the English power in Africa, showing how largely it has come to exceed that of any other nation. Then, there are several good stories—one of the mad mid-night ride of a pretty, young wheelwoman, disguised in her brother's bicycle suit.
