The Sultan's Household.

In the time of the sultan's predecessor the seraglio buildings stretched along the banks of the Bosphorus for 1 1/2 miles, and contained some 4,000 persons, the household order and arrangement being much as they are at present. The sultan's mother—when he has a mother—receives a servile obedience from all its inmates. Then comes the hasnadar ousta, or mistress of the treasury, generally a shrewd old woman, promoted from the ranks of the servants for her talent for housekeeping and gossip. If the sultan valide dies, the hasnadar succeeds her. Under Abdul Medjid the seraglio was long ruled by a washerwoman, whose chief adviser was a bal-tadie, or hewer of wood, who could not read, but had the power of dismissing viziers. The sultan's four kadines come next, who rank as spouses till he divorces them and marries them to some of the pashas. Then there are five or six ikbals, or favorites; then the guieuzedes (from guieuz, eye—girls who have attracted the master's glance).

Every woman who marries from the seraglio takes with her, besides a large portion in cash, her clothing, jewels, furniture, carriages and servants. After them come the kadines-effendis, the daughters of the sultan's children; then the unmarried princesses of the royal blood, then the foster mothers and foster sisters of the sultana or princess or princesses. Among the attendants are chamberlains, secretaries, guards, eunuchs, scullions, cooks, pages, musicians, dancing girls, dwarfs, buffoons, priests, astrologers, barbers and shampooers, tasters of the sultan's food, athletes, cockfighters, ramfighters, jugglers and grooms to look after the 500 horses contained in the imperial stables.—New York Tribune.

IN THE HOME.

- Don't put borders on carpets for small rooms.
- Don't hang chandeliers or lamps in low ceiled rooms.
- Don't be chary of rich, warm tints in northern rooms.
- Don't buy what suits the fancy, regardless of their combined effect.
- Don't select anything because it is fashionable, but because it is good.
- Don't have any apparent, much less any regular, arrangement of furniture.
- Don't believe for a minute that expensiveness is essential to beautiful effects.
- Don't make a table a pivotal point from which the rest of the furniture radiates.
- Don't make a narrow door narrower with a heavy drape. We drape too much.
- Don't use decided patterns for upholstery if you have done so for wall and floor coverings.
- Don't use large patterned wall paper in small rooms, or a deep border with low ceilings.
- Don't have any fanciful, fixed arrangement of window draperies in rooms in daily use.
- Don't buy chairs that are not well made and comfortable, or lounges that are not low and broad.
- Don't let aestheticism dominate common sense and get plain carpet (filling) for the floors of rooms in daily use.
- Don't delude yourself into thinking that beautiful rugs spread over homely floors are more artistic than all over carpets.—Woman's Home Companion.

THRONE LIGHTS.

The queen regent of Spain devotes an hour each day to teaching her young son what is really his mother tongue—German. She has even written a German grammar and a reading book for him.
The king of Siam has an income of about \$2,000,000 a year. His royal palace is populated by about 5,000 people and is a little city in itself. The ornamental grounds comprise 25 acres and are surrounded by a wall 12 feet high.
