

Police Deny Wire Tapping in Edmonton

EDMONTON (CP) — Thomas O'Dwyer, an Edmonton real estate man who has become a central figure in a real estate controversy involving the Alberta government, said he suspects his phone is being tapped by RCMP.

An RCMP official denied the charges.

Mr. O'Dwyer also said he wouldn't be surprised if RCMP were shadowing him at the request of Premier Manning.

Mr. O'Dwyer was commenting on a Toronto Star report from Edmonton which said he had identified himself as a member of an Edmonton group accused by Premier Manning of trying "to discredit the present government of Alberta and destroy the reputation of individual ministers."

Mr. O'Dwyer, 45, said the report "was in essence correct, but there were inaccuracies." "Maybe I was a member of the group, I don't know. There are many groups opposed to the government."

The Social Credit Premier said last week an unidentified cabinet minister "was enticed by a devious procedure to the home of one of the (Edmonton) elites" with the intention of obtaining information damaging to the government and other ministers.

The Manning statement was full of errors. There was not one error right," Mr. O'Dwyer said. "There were no ulterior motives in the meeting Mr. Manning alludes to, but I am not at liberty to divulge the motives or purpose of the meeting. I am a constant opponent of the government. If this is wrong, I am as guilty as poison."

Mr. O'Dwyer was a Liberal candidate in the last Alberta general election, but he said he has resigned from the party and is not a member of any political movement.

Laval To Overlook Souvenir Hunters

QUEBEC (CP) — Laval University authorities said they don't intend to discipline seven United States students caught souvenir-hunting in a big way during the weekend.

Three undergraduates studying French at Laval's summer school here were picked up by Sillery police early Monday as they removed Quebec's fleur-de-lis flag and a flag of the proposed new Canadian design from a supermarket roof.

Caught on the Green Bay, Wis., Ronald Schickel, 20, Stanton, N.D., and William Carter, 23, Jessup, Ga., were fined \$5 each.

Suburban St. Foy was harder on four college girls caught wrenching a big red bilingual "street-stop" sign from an intersection. Though the girls explained, in the French they picked up this summer, that such signs are popular decorative decorations at home, Judge Yvon Stros fined them \$16.50 each.

"What would things come to if Quebec citizens behaved like this?" he asked.

The girls were Katherine A. Paul, 19, Phoenix, Ariz.; Justine Broberg, 19, Fargo, N.D.; Victoria Burns, 20, Billings, Mont., and Diane DeBeers, 19, Macleod, Minn.

They are among 1,500 undergraduate and graduate students—about 80 are from the U.S.—who come here each summer to learn French.

N.B. Considered Possible Site

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — An Indiana aircraft firm announced Wednesday it expects to build a \$7,500,000 plant "within the boundaries of Eastern Canada" for the production of vertical take-off and landing aircraft. New Brunswick was "under consideration" as the site.

Kenneth K. Irving of Muncie, Ind., president of Air and Space Manufacturing Inc., said in a statement immediate employment would be provided for 500 persons and this would rise to 1,500 "within four years."

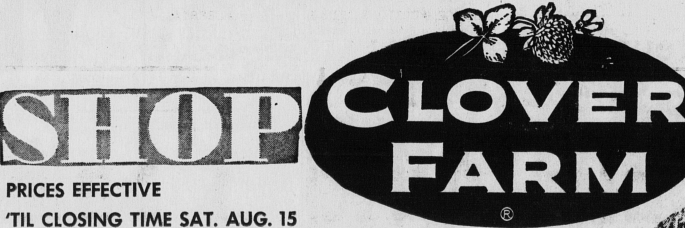
The company and Canadian representatives had incorporated to build the plant, with \$5,000,000 of the initial investment coming from the U.S. and \$2,500,000 from Canadians.

Notice of incorporation of the company in New Brunswick is contained in the current issue of the Royal Gazette. The notice says head office of Air and Space Manufacturing Ltd., "shall be at the city of Saint John." Letters Intend have been issued.

"Notable interest is being evinced by other Canadian provinces," Mr. Irving said Tuesday. The Canadian site would be announced "shortly," together with the names of Canadian businessmen associated with the venture.

Production would begin in May of 1965, the statement said. It added that at present there is no comparable type of aircraft for Canadian consumption.
