

Top Italian Net Star Custed From Tourney

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Earl Buchholz, a lanky American 18-year-old, volleyed and smashed third-seeded Nicola Pietrangeli of Italy to defeat Monday in the biggest upset of the opening session of the 73rd Wimbledon lawn tennis championships.

The St. Louis, Mo., high school student knocked out the stocky Italian, regarded as Europe's best player, 6-4, 3-6, 7-5, 7-5. He did it in spite of having his left side heavily taped.

"I had an operation during the winter," Buchholz said afterward. "Before today's match I was troubled with a cramp in my groin, so I had it strapped up. It gave me trouble only when I served."

Alex Olmedo, the 23-year-old Peruvian who is top seeded, and Barry Mackay of Dayton, Ohio—Buchholz's more famed colleagues on the U. S. Davis Cup team—also went into the second round of men's singles.

COASTS TO VICTORY
 Olmedo, who won the Davis Cup almost single-handedly for America, coasted to a 6-2, 6-4, 6-3 victory over Warren Woodcock, a 22-year-old Australian. Mackay, seeded fifth, defeated Jan Vermaak, a South African Davis Cup player, 6-2, 6-2, 3-6, 6-3.

Budge Patty, the Los Angeles veteran who operates a Paris travel bureau, and Jerodov Drobný, an Egyptian citizen who lives in London, both lost their opening matches. They were the only former Wimbledon champions to be in the field of 128.

Alan Mills of Britain defeated the 37-year-old Drobný, winner in 1954, by scores of 14-12, 3-6, 10-8, 6-4. Jon Douglas, a former football player from Santa Monica, Calif., eliminated Patty, the 1950

The New Yorkers tried hard in both ends of the twin bill but the Indians, who were supposed to choke up when the going was really rough, apparently forgot the role they were supposed to play. Stout-hearted pitching by McLaugh and Grant turned the tables twice on the Yankees. New York collected 25 hits in the twin bill but both McLaugh and Grant were terrific with men on base. Grant went the entire 14 innings in the nightcap and emerged the victor when Vic Power homered in the final frame.

Had they lost the twin bill, the Yankees would have been in front of them by one-half game. Instead the Cleveland outfit came out of the seven-hour plus battle with a three and one-half game buge over the Stengelines.

That's how important those games were Sunday afternoon.
