MR. FOSTER SPEAKS

Regrets the Devil of Corruption in Politics.

THE ABUSE OF PATRONAGE

Gives Some Good Advice to the Young Conservatives of Toronto—The Liberal Party's Success

Toronto, Ont., November 29.—Hon. Geo. E. Foster addressed the members of the Conservative Club last night in Victoria Hall. He confined his remarks largely to giving the club some sound advice as to organization and discussing politics from an ethical standpoint. Referring in the course of his remarks to the question of patronage he begged the young men present not to look for political success by promises of patronage. The golden apple would turn to ashes in their mouth if they did. He wished both political parties could agree that patronage should go no more by party favor, but by actual merit. Another thing that gave him keen regret was to see the devil of corruption in politics. It prevailed in both parties and all over. Nothing made him feel more hopeless than the remark sometimes made that such and such constituency could be carried if sufficient money were spent in the purchase of votes. Mr. Foster then turned to party politics. He discussed at some length the Globe's articles on the growing time. Whatever of a growing time Canada was enjoying he maintained was the result of the course of the late Government and of the national policy, but so far as the Liberal Government was concerned, the term was correct enough for it was, indeed, a growing time in respect to debt and expenditure.

BERLIN, Nov. 30.—It is learned from an authoritative source that Colonel Schwartzkoppen, the former German military attache at Paris, while supping with Emperor William at Potsdam on Sunday, detailed the whole of the inside history of the Dreyfus-Esterhazy and Picquart case to his majesty, who contemplates taking some action in this matter.

The Doukhoborts.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—The Star's London cable says: The steamer Lake Huron left Liverpool yesterday for Batoum, to carry direct to Canada the first batch of those excellent settlers, many with money, of Russian nonconformists, called Doukhoborts, of whom 7,000 are expected to settle in the Canadian Northwest next summer, largely through the instrumentality of their friends.

The Lake Huron leaves Batoum on Dec. 16th with 1,522 souls, and sails for St. John, N. B., thence the party proceeds to Winnipeg, where arrangements have been made for wintering them. Count Serge Tolstoi, son of the famous Tolstoi, is in charge of the party. The second party, about 2,000, leaves Batoum about ten days later by steamer Lake Superior, also for St. John and Winnipeg.

NEWS NOTES.

A contemporary remarks that the spirit of imperialism is leading the American people into strange byways, but the oddest fancy of all is to couple the extension of the empire with the preaching of the gospel. A correspondent calls upon the Government "to raise the American flag in the Caroline Islands and re-establish missions there," and the New York Sun describes this as "a great missionary opportunity." It is a new idea to grab a country which belongs to some one else with the view of making it a field for missionary endeavour. The English send missionaries first and troops afterwards, and the French newspapers denounce the proceedings as hypocrisy. To reverse the process would free the Anglo-Saxon race from the accusation of perfidy, but it hardly seems an improvement. It would take away even the appearance of consistency.

MORE STORM NEWS

The Loss of the Portland--Steamer Ashore at Seal Cove.

BOSTON, Dec. 1.—It is believed that 120 lives have been lost by the wreck of the steamer Portland.

No list of passengers was retained on shore, but this estimate is believed to be about correct.

Seven of the crew were New Brunswickers and one a Haligonian.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 1.—The steamer British Queen, from Antwerp for Boston, is ashore at Seal Cove and is probably a total wreck.

The interesting and impressive ceremony was performed by Rev C A Brooks. The bride, who is the only daughter of Mr and Mrs J J Meyer, of Yarmouth, looked charming, attired in a suit of white with lace and pearl trimmings to match; and carrying the customary bridal bouquet. She was attended by Miss Maggie Callendar, of Portland, while the groom was supported by his brother, Mr N. S. J. Murray of Fredericton, P. E. I. The church, which was thronged with guests, presented a grand appearance being beautifully and artistically decorated, in honor of the event, with flowers, ribbons, etc. The wedding march was skillfully rendered by Miss Blake.
