CHANGED OPINIONS.

VERY significant of a changed public opinion in Manitoba are the utterances of the independent press here. We quote briefly the very decided utterances of the Winnipeg Free Press concerning the recent visit of Mr. Dalton McCarthy.

"Now that he has come and gone, it would be interesting to know what public good has been accomplished by Mr. McCarthy's visit to Manitoba. Has he demonstrated that in the politics of the country there is any useful, legitimate place for a man of his professions?"

This shows that the independent press of Manitoba has no sympathy whatever with that wing of the Opposition party which is against separate schools in despite of a Parliamentary Compact.

But even more significant of a changed public opinion in Manitoba is the following quotation from a private letter written by a strong Protestant well known in this Province—a native of Belfast, if we mistake not—a friend in this city.

"To-day we had Mr. Dalton McCarthy here speaking, and I must say that between him and Joe Martin they have nearly ruined this country. The advertising you mention in it, and has been a drawback. I am satisfied that if we never heard of the School Question that our population would be double what it is to-day."

We think it very doubtful if, in view of the discussions that have recently taken place, the General Assembly or the Methodist Conference will ever have passed the resolutions quoted last evening by the Patriot. It will readily be seen, in the new light that has been thrown upon the subject, that those resolutions are beside the mark.

The power of the Legislature of that province is strictly limited. It is true that the Education Acts of 1890 were pronounced intra vires by the Privy Council. But it is true also that the Lords of the Privy Council have declared that, under the conditions of these Acts, the Parliamentary compact set forth in the Manitoba Act of Confederation, has been violated, and that it is the duty of the Dominion Government and Parliament to remedy the grievance.
