**KILLED ON THE RAIL.**—An aged woman was killed by a railway accident, near Montreal, on the evening of Tuesday last. Her name was Henrietta Boisseau, and she belonged to Grand Ligne, Que. The engineer of the train, which caused the woman's death, says that he could not stop his engine, owing to the slippery condition of the rails. He has cleared out.

**ANNIVERSARY.**—The anniversary services of the Association of Intercessory Prayer were held in St. Peter's Church on Friday. The services consisted of Holy Communion in the morning, and Evensong and address at 7.30. During the year 2,643 intercessions have been sent in, and as members say each intercession four times over, a quarter of a million intercessions have thus been made by the Society in twelve months.

**MISSING MEN.**—The Halifax papers report a couple of "missing men." A lad named Gasentch, cabin boy of the German barque Blucher, loading at Troop's wharf, Dartmouth, has been missing since Friday morning, but it is thought that perhaps he has deserted from the vessel and is hiding in the city. George Adams, driver for Nathan Hubley who resides at Indian River, has been missing since Friday night last and no trace of his whereabouts can be ascertained. He went into a stable with a man named Hubley and while the latter was engaged feeding his horse, Adams suddenly disappeared and nothing has been heard of him since.

### Personal.

Archbishop Tache, of Manitoba, is reported to be dying in Montreal.

The salary of Toronto's Mayor has been increased to \$4,000 a year.

The Czarina will spend several months in Naples for the benefit of her health.

King John of Abyssinia is making preparations for a war with the King of Shoa.

Senator Montgomery, from P. E. Island, passed through Pictou yesterday on his way to Ottawa.—News.

Mgr. Fabre has left Rome en route for Montreal, where he is expected to arrive on the 15th of next month.

At a meeting, reported in the Gazette of January 23, Mr. R. Harris, R. C. A., was elected a life member of the Art Association of Montreal.

Lady Salisbury and Lady Roseberry called at the residence of U. S. Minister Phelps, on the 22nd inst, and informally presented Mrs. Phelps with a superb bracelet.

The dowager Empress Augusta has bestowed, during the past eleven years, diplomas, with her own signature and gold crosses, on 1,535 female servants remaining forty years with one family.

The name of Mr. Graham, former partner of Sir John Thompson, is mentioned in connection with the position which is likely to be made vacant by the retirement of Judge Hugh McDonald of the supreme court of Nova Scotia, who has applied for leave of absence.

Senator Frye is of the opinion that the United States must take her place as one of the fighting nations of the world. He pushes the policy of non-intervention to an extent even beyond that implied in Tallyrand's definition.

Mr. Frye said to the Herald the other day, apropos of the Samoa question:—We are told as an excuse for our non-interference that it is contrary to our policy to concern ourselves with matters outside of our own country. If

that is our policy it ought to be changed. When that policy was laid down as a rule of national conduct we were a struggling nation, with only a few millions of people. To-day we are strong and powerful. Our interests are diversified. Our commerce extends to every corner of the habitable globe. We must assert our rights and dignity wherever they are assailed.
