excuse to go back to your no-good husband? Your children may need a father, but certainly the brutal, imprudent one you gave them will do them no good. In fact, they have more sense than you do. They don't want him back, and would be justified in leaving home should you elect to put them again in the home atmosphere they have escaped.

**FAMILY IS JUSTIFIED**

You are certainly fortunate in having such a fine family to back you up, and try to protect you. They are absolutely justified in forbidding your husband to set foot on their property, and you should have some of the same spunk. You know perfectly well that, at this stage, your husband will almost surely never change.

If he has an honest intention to reform, let him prove himself first, then go back to him. Apparently drink and a bad temper are at the bottom of his trouble. The first can be cured by a co-operative visit to Alcoholics Anonymous. Here he will be given sympathetic treatment, but he must be willing to have their assistance, and be earnestly determined to follow it through. Having conquered this hazard, he can go to work on his temper. Since his bad outbursts are occasioned chiefly by too much drinking, he will find one cure automatically taking care of the other. Then he would be in a fit condition to take up his responsibilities as a father and husband.
