N. B. AND P. E. ISLAND CONFERENCE—  
SIXTH DAY.  
MARYSVILLE, June 21.

Rev. Mr. Winsloe, from Milltown, a  
Minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church,  
was invited to a seat on the platform. He  
made a brief speech and received a hearty  
greeting from the Conference.  
The following amounts had been secured  
for the Sustentation Fund:—

There were 39 claimants on the fund, so

Rev. A. D. McCully, B. D., reported  
from the committee to disburse the annual  
Conference collection. The total amount  
received was \$175, against which there  
were claims amounting to \$446. Commit-  
tee was ordered to disburse.

Rev. J. C. Berrie reported from the  
Temperance Society. Conference again  
declared itself very fully and emphatically  
in favor of prohibition, and urged the mem-  
bers to support candidates in favor of pro-  
hibition.  
Rev. H. Daniel moved the thanks of the  
Conference to Dr. Stewart for his ordina-  
tion charge, and requested its publication in  
the Wesleyan. Conference agreed.

After singing and scripture read by  
Secretary, the Rev. George Harrison led  
in prayer.  
It was reported that Revs. E. Evans and  
Henry Daniel were elected members of the  
general committee of the Supernumerary  
Fund.

The Secretary of Conference then pro-  
ceeded to read the list of stations, after

thanks to Rev. John Read and the people  
of Marysville for their kindness in enter-  
taining the members of this conference. It  
was passed by a rising vote. Rev. John  
Read suitably responded to the invitation.  
Rev. R. W. Weddall, A. B. presented the  
report from the evangelistic committee. It  
recommended the organization of a band of  
workers, (2) open air services in accordance  
with the discipline of the church, and (3)  
it recommended to make our district and  
conference gatherings more distinctly  
evangelistic and aggressive in their  
character. Conference agreed to the same.  
It was reported that Mr. Allan P. Taylor  
had died during the year. He was in the  
27th year of his age and the fourth of his  
ministry. Dr. Stewart and Dr. Pickard  
referred to his honesty of purpose and his  
success in the work. Conference adjourned  
at 12 noon.
