

True Bill Returned At S'side For Possession of Stolen Goods

The Grand Jury returned a true bill against Albert Gallant of Summerside, charged with unlawful possession of stolen goods at the sitting of the Supreme Court, Summerside yesterday, Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan presiding. The accused pleaded "not guilty" and his trial will commence this morning at 11:00 a.m.

The charge resulted from a break at the Canadian Legion Home in Summerside on the night of December 10, 1955, in which more than 25 cartons of cigarettes, 5 cases of ale and \$25 to \$30 worth of rolled coppers were taken and two Summerside men were absconded with. The men were subsequently convicted and sentenced to jail terms. Gallant was alleged to be the driver of the taxi which transported the stolen goods to a house on Hanover Street on the night of the break. He is charged with unlawful possession of 25 cartons of cigarettes and five cases of ale, knowing them to have been stolen.

D.O. Stewart Q.C. is Crown prosecutor while J.A. MacDonald,

Charlotteville is acting for the accused.

Members of the Grand Jury were Messrs. Harry Bonness, Kensington (foreman), Percy MacMurdo, Kelvin Maxwell Robertson, Summerside, Allison MacLean, Summerside, Charles Lockhart, Malpeque, Earl Corney, Summerside, Archibald Montgomery, North Bedouque and Andrew Jardine, Freetown.

In their report the Grand Jury recommended storm windows for the jailer's quarters and that all woodwork be repainted. The report stated that prisoners are washing their clothes and dishes in the same sink and recommended that a washing machine and set-tub be provided to overcome this situation. Also that the abutments in the gas compound be repaired.

His Lordship thanked the Grand Jury for their report which showed, he stated, that their work was done thoroughly. Court was adjourned until eleven o'clock this morning.

SMALL SURPLUS FORECAST

New By-Laws Increase Tax Rate At Summerside

An increase in Summerside tax structure was revealed at last night's special meeting of the Town Council when by-laws were passed imposing an increase of \$8.00 per thousand on real estate and personal property and an increase of \$4.00 on poll taxes. This brings the new tax rate in Summerside to \$30.00 per \$1,000 on real and personal property and the poll tax to \$10.00.

The estimated revenue for 1956 is \$45,484 and the estimated expenditures total \$434,925, leaving a budgeted surplus of \$559.00.

Coun. H. E. Clark who delivered the annual financial report, due to the recent resignation of Coun. J. L. MacDougall who was chairman of the finance committee, said it was a matter of regret that Coun. MacDougall was forced to retire, and was unable to be present to report the estimates and revenue and expenditure.

Coun. Clark said in part: "In setting up the estimates, the committee has been as conservative as was deemed advisable with respect to revenue, at the same time endeavouring to provide on the expenditure side sufficient for each department to enable the different committees to operate reasonably well by providing the essential services to the public in a manner denoting continued progress and at the same time endeavouring to work towards a reasonable economy."

"Although the Town Council has this for its objective each year, and while we have been fortunate in the past to be in a position to balance the budget without an increase in the tax rate, nevertheless, we regret to say that this year is an exception to the rule."

Coun. Clark then referred to the worst sleet storm in the history of P. E. I. which cost Summerside an estimated \$400,000.00; the construction of a new high school, due to the dire need of additional classrooms and laboratories; the renovation of the old post office to provide a town office; also the construction of a new civic auditorium. He said the town was also required to take over the skating rink (Civic Stadium) in order to protect its interests in the build-

ing and to install artificial ice.

Coun. Clark continued to part: "The Town Council feels that these capital expenditures of 1955 were most essential and the increase in tax rate is due to these capital expenditures and not to any poor administration; of course the costs necessitated by the disastrous sleet storm were something over what we had control.

"We must admit that in the past the town has progressed favourably while operating on a very low tax rate and even though a higher tax rate is imposed this year, it is hoped before another year passes our system of assessment that will result in a more equitable valuation of properties which will prove beneficial to the citizens in general.

"Our citizens have always realized their duties of citizenship and have always appreciated the fact that to supply the wants and needs of the people, money must be spent and we congratulate our citizens for the fine attitude and interest they have always shown towards the betterment of their town."
