The Paris Bill Poster.

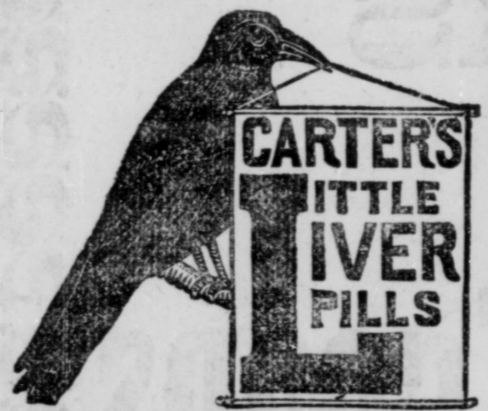
