COST OF THE WAR.

The United States have appropriated on account of the war \$292,000,000, and the actual expenditures thus far aggregate \$123,000,000.

Most of this has been spent in operations resulting in the surrender of Santiago. Other noteworthy expenditures are coal and ammunition used by Dewey, by the blockading squadron and in Sampson's ineffective bombardment of San Juan.

In detail the war has cost, as nearly as can be stated in round figures, gathered from official sources in Washington, as follows:
