\$75,000,000 MAY BE VOTED FOR RELIEF

BRITISH FOREIGN POLICY UPHELD

GOVERNMENT GIVEN VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

France Moves To Punish Germany Under Covenant of League of Nations.

LONDON, April 6.—Turkey has informed Great Britain of a desire to raise the question of fortifying the Dardanelles "at a suitable moment."

LONDON, April 6.—The House of Commons voted confidence in the Baldwin Government tonight after a sharp debate that embraced the whole range of foreign policy.

Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, wound up the debate for the government with a vigorous denial that Britain contemplated turning over any of her colonies to Germany.

BALDWIN TO RESIGN?

The debate followed renewed talk in the newspapers that Prime Minister Baldwin would resign, the Daily Mail forecasting he would step down in June.

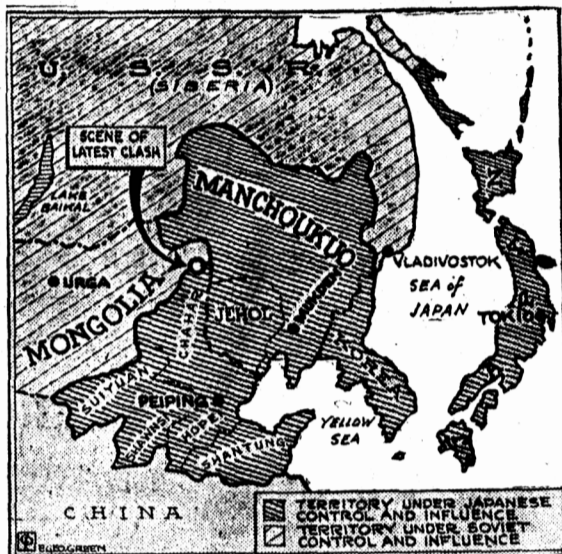
The consensus was that if there is to be a cabinet shake-up of far-reaching proportions it will be delayed until after the coronation next year.

A feature of the debate was a vigorous attack on the government's policy in the Italo-Ethiopian war by Winston Churchill.

STORM SWEEPS NEW ENGLAND

Navigation Made Difficult By Stiff Winds.

BOSTON, April 6.—Squally weather and stiff winds made navigation difficult along the New England coast today, and inland over Mt. Washington attained the hurricane force of more than 120 miles an hour.

Ships in Boston harbor narrowly avoided damage as strong winds swept them out of control of tugs.

The coastwise liner City of St. Louis was saved from possible collision with the Cunard White Star steamer Andania when two extra tugs were rushed to her aid.

Coming in from the bank with a damaged rudder, the trawler Loon called for aid from near Pina's Ledge, and a tug was sent to tow her up the harbor.

Fate Of Frances Bannister Unknown

DORCHESTER, N. B., April 6.—The fate of 15-year-old Frances Bannister, who aided the Crown to convict her two brothers of the murder of Philip Lake and her mother of being an accessory after the kidnapping of baby Betty Lake, was still unknown here tonight but belief was strong that no charges would be laid against her.

Problem More Difficult Than King Anticipated In Election Campaign

Revised Estimate For Unemployment Appropriation To Be Submitted To Parliament After Easter.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 6.—The relief appropriation bill this year may reach \$75,000,000, Premier King advised the House of Commons today when he revised his estimate of \$50,000,000 made a few days ago.

Included in the appropriation—its size is still indefinite—will be money for public works, reforestation, highways and direct relief grants to the provinces.

For almost two hours the House had a round-table discussion on economic, finance and unemployment relief when the government bill to establish an employment commission was in committee.

ETHIOPIA NOT SUING FOR PEACE, CLAIM

Britain Presses For Probe Into Charges Italy Violating Rules Of Warfare.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, April 6.—Great Britain is pressing for immediate discussion by the League of Nations of charges Italy is employing poison gas against civilians in Ethiopia, it was disclosed today.

Anthony Eden, Foreign Secretary told the House of Commons that steps have already been taken toward League consideration of Ethiopian charges Italy is violating the rules of warfare by using poison gas against non-combatants and also bombing open towns.

The Council of the League will meet Wednesday in Geneva. There have been predictions that if it develops Premier Mussolini will not discuss peace terms, Great Britain may lead a drive for additional sanctions, including an oil embargo.

Unemployment In England Lessens

(G. P. Cable) (By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, April 6.—The Ministry of Labor announced today that on March 23 a total of 1,881,531 persons were unemployed in the United Kingdom, which was 143,490 less than in the previous month and 272,339 fewer than a year ago.

TORNADO DEATH LIST NEARS 300

Wind Whips Southern States Causing Property Damage Estimated at \$6,000,000.

The southern United States' tornado death list neared 300 Monday night as wind-whipped wintry weather spread through the north and west and rain swollen rivers carried a flood threat from the Ohio Valley to the Mississippi.

More than a thousand persons were injured and \$6,000,000 worth of property damaged by storms that swept five southern states from South Carolina to Arkansas Sunday.

The dead by states: Mississippi 141; Georgia 75; Alabama 18; Tennessee 7; Arkansas 1; South Carolina 1.

River Levels Rise

Heavy rains pushed river levels upward around Cincinnati, Louisville and other cities but weathermen said there was no immediate danger of devastating floods of two weeks ago would be repeated.

The Mississippi River at New Madrid, Mo., went seven feet above flood stage, several hundred southern Illinois and Kentucky families left their homes as the Ohio River lapped into lowlands in some sections.

Snow covered much of the western states but the dust storm area remained in need of more moisture.

"Freak" Weather

"Freak" weather at Catarina, Tex., shot the mercury up to 109 degrees Sunday, plunged it back to 52 yesterday, then sent a strong wind through the town, snapping trees and telephone poles.
