EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 12.

A writ to day will be served upon Lord Plunket at the instance of the Irish Land League, claiming penalties from him for voting against compensation for Disturbance Bill, without having previously taken the oath of a peer. A bill indemnifying Plunket is already in course of passing in the House of Lords.

DUBLIN, Aug. 12.

The Marquis of Waterford has received a letter warning him against attending the Royal Agricultural Society's meetings, saying that if he did he would be shot, but the Marquis attended notwithstanding. He voted against the Compensation Bill.

LONDON, Aug. 12.

Truth says private letters from the west of Ireland depict the condition of that portion of the country in gloomy colors. They speak of large quantities of arms smuggled into the cabins of small tenants, of secret drilling on the hillsides, of mysterious strangers from America, and of the latest miracle at Knock, where the Virgin and St. Patrick appeared to the peasantry and told them to pay no rents.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.

The Herald's Cork correspondent reports the Fenian organizations in England, Scotland and Ireland number nearly fifty thousand men, of whom twelve thousand in Ireland alone are armed with Snyder rifles. Arms are being surreptitiously landed on the Irish coast, and drilling goes on at night. Fenians, it is claimed, have no sympathy with the land movement, and Michael Davitt, land agitator, was expelled from the Supreme Council before his departure for America in May.

LONDON, Aug. 12.

It is stated that at one o'clock this morning a large party of men left the shore in six whale boats and boarded the Norwegian ship Juno, repairing at Passage, Ireland, went into the hold and stole three cases of rifles, a part of her cargo. The robbers cut the telegraph wires leading to Cork.

A despatch from Scutari says: "The National Council of the Albanian League came to the momentous decision to throw off every vestige of Ottoman authority. The decision was almost unanimous. The population of Scutari are preparing decisive measures against Turkish authorities."

LONDON, Aug. 12.

A private telegram from Cape Town, 11th inst., says: "The Premier starts for Basutoland to-night. Affairs there are unchanged, and tranquility prevails in other parts of colony."

The boiler makers at Burrow have demanded an advance in wages. Should a strike result, 12,000 hands will be affected.

THE CHILI-PERU WAR.

PANAMA, Aug. 12.

Advices received from Lima, 26th ult., say that there are no military operations of importance; but the Chilean fleet before Callao is increasing. Foreign residents have continued to leave Lima in large numbers. The mustering and drilling of citizens for defence of the capital is going on vigorously. It is estimated that Peruvians have a force double that of any Chile could bring to bear against the city. The enrolling of the population of Lima and Callao to join the army of reserves was finished July 30. Next day thirteen divisions met in different parts of the city. At three o'clock the Cathedral bell was rung, and at once all business establishments were closed, railway trains, street cars and nearly all coaches ceased running and the whole male population, Peruvians between sixteen and sixty years of age, turned out to answer roll call; and foreigners old men and children, to look on so complete a cessation of business; and such a uniform closing of doors was never seen before. The President visited the various divisions and was gratified with the result. Closing of business establishments will take place every day to give the different members the necessary time to drill. The churches were filled day and night with crowds imploring the assistance of Heaven, and religious processions bearing relics of the saints, pass daily through the streets. The gunboat Alaska sailed from Callao, July 15th, for Samoa.

BUENOS AYRES, August 9.

The city is besieged by National forces under Gen. Rocaf. Dr. Tegodar has called out the Provincial guards and ordered barricades in the streets.
