Question Period Is Quiet

The question period in the Legislature yesterday afternoon was quiet, compared to the wrangle that developed Wednesday over a government minister's suggestion that Opposition Leader Alex Campbell be censured for giving information to the press on legislative matters.

Mr. Campbell said he was still waiting for a ruling from the House rule committee showing where he was wrong in giving information to the press. "The matter rests there," he said. On a question from former opposition leader Alex Matheson, Public Works Minister Philip Matheson said he is in touch with the offer of Crown Assets Corporation for the sale of the site of the former Charlottetown Armories and it is hoped "we will have a chance to purchase it."

Pointing out that a number of cattle had died last year from the effects of poisonous potato top killer, Daniel MacDonald (L-1st Kings) asked Agriculture Minister MacRae whether or not the legislation controlling the use of poisonous sprays had been proclaimed.

Sentences Deferred In County Court

SUMMERSIDE — Two accused who, at the time of their arrest, were residing in Central Bedoué, entered guilty pleas to five and four charges respectively before magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court yesterday morning. Gerald Haviland Dawson, 21, pleaded guilty to the following charges: unlawful possession of a mirror; unlawful taking of a vehicle without the owners consent with intent to operate it; unlawful possession of a pair of overboots; break, entry and theft and having sexual intercourse with a girl under 14 not his wife.

On the final two charges the accused elected trial by magistrate. Also residing at Central Bedoué at the time of his arrest, Elwood Floyd MacDonald, 20, pleaded guilty to the following four charges: taking a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner with intent to operate it; theft of groceries valued at less than \$50; break, entry and theft and having sexual intercourse with a girl under 14, not his wife.

MacDonald also elected trial by magistrate on the last two charges. RCMP Cpl. C. M. Clark, NCO in charge of the court detachment, told the court that both accused who have no records, were completely cooperative with the police.

He also stated that a third accused, George Eric Dawson, had taken the car without the owner's consent and had picked up MacDonald and Gerald Haviland Dawson. Following a lengthy drive he stated that Gerald Dawson had taken over operation of the vehicle and it while behind the wheel had put it into the ditch.

In deferring sentence to April 12, Magistrate MacDonald noted that neither of the accused had a permanent home. The deferred sentences were given on the condition that the two accused enter into a recognizance to the amount of \$1,000 with one surety of \$500 plus the usual conditions of keeping the peace and being of good behaviour.

Magistrate MacDonald also stated, in passing the deferred sentence, "it is my feeling that you boys have been led by Eric Dawson. He added that he proposed to let the provincial probation officer investigate the conditions under which the two accused live and work and that perhaps between the probation officer, the RCMP and himself, a situation could be worked out for the two. He warned them however, that "if during this time you get into trouble of any kind" they would not be given any consideration when sentence was passed.

George Eric Dawson, also residing at Central Bedoué at the time of his arrest, pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of a mirror and break, entry and theft. On the break charge the accused elected trial by Judge without jury. On the first three charges Dawson was remanded in custody for sentencing to March 16 while adjournment to the same date for preliminary trial was given on the fourth charge. A fine of \$75 and costs was assessed Donald Roy Watson of Summerside on a charge of driving while impaired. Accused was represented by G. Bruce MacDonald.

The magistrate dismissed a charge of care and control of a vehicle while impaired against John Nathaniel Evans of Irish-town. In giving the dismissal Magistrate MacDonald stated "this is one case where I have

some doubts and it must be resolved in favor of the accused". Mr. Evans was represented by J. Melville Campbell. William Eldon Ferrish, St. Eleanor, charged with driving while impaired, was found guilty and fined \$75. He was also represented by Mr. Campbell. Lawrence Green and Donald Joseph Kendall, both from the local RCAF station, were each fined \$75 and costs on separate charges of impaired driving. Three witnesses, one for the crown and two for the defence, including the accused, were heard in the case of Rena John Sturdy, Cape Traverse, charged with impaired driving. Following the presentation of testimony Magistrate MacDonald adjourned the case to March 17.

The court heard three crown witnesses in the case of Linus Alan Noonan, Alamy, charged with impaired driving. Testifying for the crown were: William Batt, captain and chief officer of the MV Abegweit, RCMP Cpl. C. M. Clark and RCMP const. Alan D. Burchill, the arresting officer.

The accused, who entered a plea of not guilty, is represented by J. Melville Campbell. The arrest was made aboard the Abegweit. This case was adjourned to April 7.

Forest Fire Losses Kept To Minimum

Forest fire losses in the province last year were kept to a minimum, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said in the Legislature yesterday. While speaking in the draft address debate, he said 65 fires burned about 400 acres in the province. There were 23 fires in Prince County, 23 in Queens and 19 in Kings.

Mr. MacRae said prompt reports of fires by the public was greatly appreciated. "We encouraged quick reporting of fires to police or forestry officials," he said, "and the response was excellent."

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Murder Case Is Pending

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — A man who gave himself up to police is being held here in connection with the bathtub death of a 28-year-old mother of four. Detectives have withheld the man's name but he is expected to appear in court today. Mrs. Irene Gibbons's body was found in her water-filled bathtub about 10 a.m. Thursday and detectives say foul play is suspected. Two delivery men are said to have made the discovery. Police rushed to the house on north-end Cannon Street after the man now being held walked into police headquarters. An autopsy was held but the cause of death was not disclosed. The Gibbons family, including three boys and a girl, occupy a ground-floor flat in a three-story frame house. The four children, ranging in age from three to 11 years, were taken from an upstairs apartment to be cared for by relatives.

Life Term Is Given

MONTREAL (CP) — Jean-Jacques Paulin, was sentenced Wednesday to life imprisonment when he pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of non-capital murder.

Paulin had been charged with the capital murder of Philippe Boudreau, whose body was found with two bullets in it in the neighborhood of nearby Caughnawaga six months after his death. Paulin's trial opened Monday and his plea to the reduced charge Wednesday was accepted by the Crown. Principal witness for the Crown had been Andre Blais, who was freed on the same charge at his preliminary hearing.
