New Cabinet Appointments Announced By Premier Jones On Saturday Morning

Following the appointment on Saturday of Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Belfast, as Minister of Public Works and Highways and Hon. Keir Clark, Montague, and Hon. J. Brenton St. John, Souris, as ministers without portfolio, the above picture of the Jones Government was taken in the Confederation Chamber after the new members had been sworn in by His Honour Lieutenant Governor Frowse. Seated, left to right, are shown Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare; Premier Jones; Hon. W. E. Darby, Attorney General and Provincial Treasurer; Hon. Provincial Secretary; Hon. Keir Clark. In announcing the additions to his cabinet on Saturday Premier Jones said he would be giving up the Premiership "before too long." He added that it would not be "very soon." He was taking his colleague, Mr. MacKinnon, into the cabinet because his services were needed right away. When his own resignation took place Mayor B. Earle MacDonald could come in to even up the representation in Queen's County. The Premier added that he has made no other Cabinet changes or portfolio appointments at this time. The portfolio of Education, for example is still unfilled. He intimated that he left further appointments in the Cabinet to whoever will succeed to the Premiership when he retires. Hon. Mr. MacKinnon entered provincial politics when he con-

tested the district of Fourth Queen's in the Provincial Election in 1935. That was the same year in which the Premier himself started his active political career. Both were successful on that occasion and neither have suffered a defeat. Mr. MacKinnon was a member of the Government without portfolio in the period 1939 to 1943 under the Campbell administration. Mr. Clark first entered provincial politics when he was elected as a representative for Third King's in 1947. He was re-elected in the election held earlier this year. He came to the Provincial field with a background of experience in civic politics. He was Mayor of the town of Montague, for example in 1940. He received his degree of Bachelor of Commerce at Dalhousie University. Upon the completion

of his course there in 1934 after previously attending Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown. He was born in Mt. Stewart where his father, Mr. Russel C. Clark, a veteran member of the Legislature, has conducted a business for many years. Mr. Clark now manages the store at Montague. Mr. St. John first entered provincial politics when he successfully contested the by-election in First King's in July of 1949. His opponent at that time was Melvin J. McQuaid who was also his opponent in the Provincial election this year. He is a partner in the firm of Townsend and St. John in Souris which deals in farm machinery. Mr. St. John also had a background in civic politics. He is a former member of the Souris Town Council and was chairman of the committee on Streets and Property.

Enemy Plans For New Drive Are Suspected

By DON HUTH TOKYO, June 18 (Monday) (AP) — A powerful United States Eighth Army task force crossed parallel 38 north of Seoul Sunday and forced Communists to withdraw from a suspected buildup area. Other Allied troops wrested two key heights from fiercely-fighting Reds in rugged Eastern Korea more than 10 miles north of 38. In the air, 20 U.S. Sabre jets won a dogfight late Sunday with 25 Russian-type MIG 15 jets near the border of Manchuria and Northwest Korea. The Sabres shot down one MIG and damaged six without loss to themselves. The ground thrust north of Seoul, a reconnaissance in force, was made across the Imjin River at Korangpo, one mile south of 38. The heaviest Red resistance Sunday was in Eastern Korea but it was largely delaying action. Hill-

Validity Of Marketing Act Referred To Supreme Court

The validity of both the Provincial and Dominion legislation under the Marketing Act is to be referred by the Provincial Government to the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island, it was learned on good authority yesterday. The Marketing Act, which was introduced as Bill 82 and became Chapter 16 of the Federal Statutes of 1949, enables marketing boards to prohibit dealings outside the Province in which they have been constituted. This is believed to be the first occasion in which the validity of the Act will have been subject to a judicial inquiry. At present a test case in connection with the operation of the Potato Marketing Board is before the Magistrate for Queen's County. It was adjourned on Saturday until a later date, and is now unlikely to be heard until the Supreme Court's ruling on the Act's validity has been given.

Preparing Report On Universities

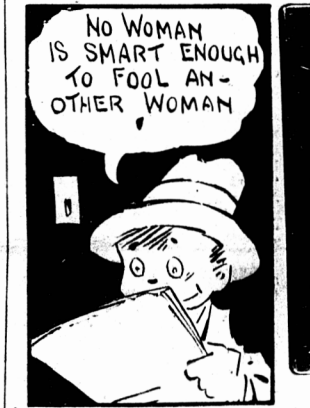

De Gaulle Polls Good Vote As Reds Lose In French General Election

By Carl Hartman PARIS, June 18 (Monday) (AP) — Gen. Charles De Gaulle's new party, fighting its first general election, appeared early today to have scored enough votes to challenge the coalition of centre parties that govern France. The Communists, although still the country's big party in numbers of voters, were losing ground. On the basis of latest returns they were polling less than 24 per cent of the popular vote, against more than 28 per cent in the last general election in 1946. The voting was heavy. Nearly four-fifths of those eligible cast their ballots. Approximately 19,000,000 persons went to the polls yesterday. With nearly half the vote counted, it still was impossible to tell just how many seats each group would have in the 627-member National Assembly. This was due to the complex method of crediting ballots set up under the new electoral law. Two things were certain: 1. The Communists were losing seats—seven of 25 previously held in Paris, two near Toulouse, one in the Belfort border area, one in former Premier Edouard Daladier's district, and many others. 2. De Gaulle's Rassemblement du Peuple Francais (R.P.F.) would have many more than their hand-

LONDON, June 17 (CP)—The King, convalescing after a lung inflammation left the heat of London Saturday to take a country rest cure on his Windsor estate. The King, 55, has been ordered to cancel all public engagements for at least a month. BONN, June 17 (AP)—A wild street fight between 2500 Communist "Free German Youth" members and 200 police broke out near here late today when police tried to tear off the Communists' blue shirts. Some Communists were beaten into unconsciousness and about 150 were bundled off to jail. Describe Damage To British Sub Affray

PORTSMOUTH, England, June 17 (AP) — The sunken British submarine Affray, lying on the edge of an under-water precipice in the English Channel, has an 18-inch hole in her breathing tube, divers said Saturday. Through this hole, tons of water could have poured to flood the engine room in less than four minutes after she sank without trace during manoeuvres April 17. All 75 officers and men aboard, including some marine commandos, were lost. A team of five divers from the naval diving ship Reclaim told a press conference how they found the sub Thursday after a nine-week search.

Opposition To Reds In China Seen In Reports

HONG KONG, June 16 (Reuters) — The Chinese Communists are calling for greater efforts in liquidating those who oppose the Red regime. They say that guerrillas, secret agents and others variously described as "counter-revolutionaries" are still active and causing immense damage to Government property. "These counter-revolutionaries must be exterminated," the official press says. The new Communist demands follow the shooting of thousands by firing squads after hysterical official-directed public trials. Admission of widespread counter-revolutionary activities appear to belie statements in other official contexts that those opposing the regime have now been reduced to "small numbers of die-hards." For instance, the Peiping Jen Min Jih Pao, "citing a few cases," reported recently that: 1. Counter revolutionaries poisoned wells in Yunan Province and caused the death of 600 persons; that they poisoned another 3,000 in North Szechwan; and that similar poisonings had occurred in various parts of "the Northeast, East China, South China and other localities." 2. A feudal landlord destroyed a building in East Szechwan and murdered five Communist officials and 20 others who were meeting inside. 3. Arsonists who set fire to the city of Lingling, in Hunan, were caught when plotting to destroy Ch'yang, in the same province. 4. Arsonists destroyed a factory and a workers' dormitory at Taising, in Manchuria. The list continued with further examples of arson and sabotage. 5. Arsonists destroyed 200 houses at Paoshu, in Shensi. By their own figures, the Communists show that, up to the present, opposition has been numerically strong. Reports received in Hong Kong confirm that enemies of the Communists are active in many provinces, blowing up bridges, burning buildings, ambushing small groups

Petai's Life Term Commuted

PARIS, June 17 (AP) — President Vincent Auriol today commuted former Marshal Henri Philippe Petai's life prison sentence to permanent confinement in a hospital. He directed that the ailing, 95-year-old soldier be transferred from his prison cell on the Isle D'Yeu to a hospital on the mainland as soon as he is fit enough to be moved. His decision to do this was reached June 8, but was announced only today, five minutes after the polls closed in the French national election. The delay in announcing it was decided upon to forestall any pre-election repercussions. Mrs. Petai who has been living in a hotel on the Isle D'Yeu to be near her husband, refused to accompany a government official when he went to inform the Marshal of Auriol's act. She said she could only stand on Petai's statement made at his trial: "A Marshal of France asks pardon of no one." The aged Marshal, hero of Verdun in the First World War and sentenced to life imprisonment for treason after the Second World War, has been gravely ill for months in the grim island prison in the Atlantic. Many times doctors have despaired of his life but he hung on. LONDON, June 17 (AP) — A spokesman for the War Office today termed reports published abroad that British troops were massing in Iraq opposite the Iranian oilfields as "just wild rumors."

Stunting Pilot Killed At Uplands Air Show

OTTAWA, June 17 (CP) — A thrilling air show came to a tragic end Saturday when a stunting pilot was killed in the blazing wreckage of an R. C. A. F. Harvard trainer. Flt. Lt. George Vrooman, the 34-year-old pilot, had completed several loops and came roaring down over the Uplands Airport field at a height of about 50 feet, apparently attempting a slow roll, when the single-engine plane nosed into the ground and burst into flame. The wreckage was strewn over a wide area, several hundred yards from where a crowd of several hundreds of persons had gathered to watch the show, staged by the Ottawa Flying Club to wind up "Flying Clubs Week." The crash occurred about 4 P.M. EDT. The show was halted immediately. Stationed at nearby Rockcliffe Airport, Flt. Lt. Vrooman was considered one of the Air Force's best pilots. A veteran of nine years' service, he had piloted External Affairs Minister Pearson in his round-the-world flight about 18 months ago. Lately he had been in charge of the R. C. A. F.'s C-5 modified four-engine North Star, piloting the Government's top officials. He is survived by a step-mother, Mrs. G. V. Vrooman.

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
