Loading Grain Cargoes.

The correspondent of the Toronto Globe in his Notes from the Capital, under the head, "Another Ministerial Junketing to England," says as follows:—

The facts of the case are just the reverse of those stated in the above extract, and in order that the public may understand how little ground there is for the statement, we are permitted to publish the following correspondence:

On the 8th of June last, the Secretary of the Board of Trade received the following letter from the Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries:—

OTTAWA, 7th June, 1880.

My DEAR SIR,—Mr. Plimssoll has telegraphed to the Minister of Marine that he thinks it would be advisable that the Port Warden of Montreal should give his evidence before the committee of the House of Commons in London, which is now sitting taking evidence relative to the loading of vessels with grain in bulk; and the Board of Trade in London also think it desirable that your Port Warden should give evidence as to the practical working of our Act at Montreal and the mode of stowing grain cargoes.

While Mr. Plimssoll is quite willing and anxious that Canada should be exempted from the operation of the proposed new Bill, it is quite possible that there might be some opposition to such exemption, and it is very necessary that every precaution should be taken in the interests of the trade of the St. Lawrence, and at the expense of the Port Wardens' funds, which I believe are quite ample for the purpose? If such should be the case, of which I have no doubt, would you kindly inform me whether the Port Warden could leave by the next Saturday's mail boat from Quebec?

A special meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was at once called, to which this letter was referred, and the difficulty of sending the Port Warden to England during this season of the year was so apparent that the Council resolved, if possible, to meet the difficulty by having the evidence taken in this country. Accordingly, the following letter was addressed, by the instructions of the Council, to the Department at Ottawa:

8th June, 1880.

WM. SMITH, Esq., Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa:

DEAR SIR,—I hasten to say that your letter of yesterday regarding our Port Warden to give evidence before the Parliamentary committee of the British House of Commons regarding the Montreal system of stowing grain cargoes, was considered at a special meeting of Council this day. It appears to the Council that it is absolutely impossible for the Port Warden to be absent at the present time, owing to the pressure of business, the Council having just been making arrangements to meet the increasing demand upon the office. It is a matter of much concern that it seems impossible to concur in what comes from you with all the force of a recommendation, but the Council desire me to suggest that the object might be even better accomplished, perhaps, if your department would take evidence by commission and transmit to London, to be pressed upon the notice of the Parliamentary committee by Sir A. T. Galt, as the representative of the Dominion.

Hoping that thus the object you have in view may be accomplished,

This view evidently did not meet the wishes of the Department, and accordingly on the 11th June the following telegram was sent to Mr. Patterson by the Minister himself:—

OTTAWA, June 11.

To W. J. PATTERSON: Important; send best man available to give

evidence before committee on loading ships. Port Warden should go if possible. Why not appoint a temporary Warden. Government will pay reasonable expenses.

A special meeting of the Council was again summoned for the 14th June, and at that meeting a committee was appointed, consisting of Messrs. Cleghorn, Kinghorn, Ogilvie, and the President, to make arrangements for sending some one to England to give evidence before the Committee. The anxiety of the Minister that no time should be lost, is manifested by the following telegram received on the 15th June by Mr. Patterson:—

W. J. PATTERSON, Secretary Board of Trade Montreal:

Want answer to my telegram of Friday last. Received cable from Plimssoll last evening asking if we had sent any one. Answer immediately.

JAS. C. POPE.

In reply to this Mr. Patterson telegraphed to Ottawa with the following terms:—"Council endeavoring to get the best man to go to London; hope to arrange to-day or to-morrow." Later on in the day—that is, on the 15th—Mr. Patterson again telegraphed to Ottawa to this effect:—"The Council have concluded to send the Deputy Port Warden by Saturday's steamer. Letter will be forwarded to you this evening."

In this letter, which was sent on the 15th, the Minister was requested to give Mr. Shaw, the Deputy Port Warden, the necessary credentials and any letters of introduction he might consider necessary, and so promptly was the whole thing done that these letters were in the hands of Mr. Shaw on the morning of the 17th, and he left on the Polynesian the following day. This statement of the facts as they exist is a sufficient answer to the statement in the Globe. Whether Mr. Pope is going to England at all or not we are not aware; but it will be seen at any rate that he lost no time in securing the very best evidence that could be obtained to submit to the committee in England. We understand that on the day the announcement was made that the Board of Trade had agreed to send Mr. Shaw, the fact was telegraphed to the English press. Mr. Shaw has been several times before the committee of the House of Commons, and has undergone a most searching examination at the hands of several of the members. The regulations made for loading at this port have already received the warm approbation of Mr. Plimssoll, and we have no doubt that the presence of Mr. Shaw before the committee will have a most important effect upon the proposed legislation.

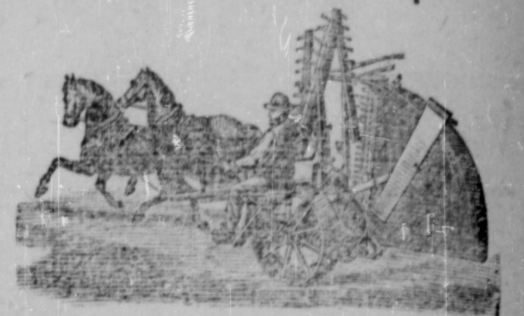
