

Morell Rink Bill Passed In Committee Yesterday

Steps that will give the community of Morell a skating rink were taken in the Legislature yesterday when an Act to incorporate Morell Community Rink was given second reading. Harvey Douglas (L-2nd Kings) promoted the bill.

Dr. L. G. Dewar (PC - 2nd Prince) congratulated the people of Morell for their initiative in providing a place where the children could enjoy winter sports.

He said O'Leary had a fine rink and had \$5,000 in the bank at the time of the latest storm in 1956 when the roof fell in. Dr. Dewar said there has been great pressure from the people in that area to have the rink restored, but lack of finances seem to present the greatest problem.

He wondered whether the Government could come to the assistance of a community such as O'Leary's.

TWO FINE RINKS

Premier Matheson said that 10 years ago two very fine rinks at Murray Harbour and at North River had been built by the people of the areas concerned. He understood that both these rinks have been doing well ever since their construction.

Mr. Matheson said the only way in which to help a commu-

ity build a rink would be to lend the village interest free for a period of ten years. Such a loan, he said, would be pledged against the capital grants of the village.

He explained that this was the method used in Crapaud and was sorry to note that this village had gotten behind in its payment. He feared the government would have to withhold next year's grant if no payment on the loan were forthcoming. "It is the only way we can do it," he said, "we can't have the people of North Pond or East Point paying for a rink in some other part of the Island."

The Premier said the physical fitness program entered into with the Federal Government had been discontinued and the Province since that time has had to carry the program alone.

Hon. Eugene Cullen said he was pleased to see the Crapaud rink was becoming noted as the centre of the now famous Crapaud exhibition.

Frank Myers said Crapaud rink would not be running if it were not for the women of the district who he said gave many hours of voluntary time in catering. Mr. Myers said he was sorry to have to admit that the rink was in default in its debt.

what the provincial gross product was but would venture to say it was double what it was ten years ago.

He suggested that the Provincial Treasurer try to obtain some statistics that would show the gross provincial product before he presents another budget. "If he has the chance to present another one," he added.

Premier Matheson: "You could never be surer of anything in your life."

"It seems to me," said Dr. Dewar, "that with the prospect of a provincial election, the government is letting its finances go to jeopardy, its education lag behind and its hospitals poorly provided for—but with the one thought in mind let's get elected at all costs."

Speaking of Hospital Insurance, Dr. Dewar observed that the federal government is expected to provide \$35,000,000. He felt the provincial government should try to raise its revenue for the plan through the most painless way and he did not think this was the plan being adopted.

NO ALTERNATIVE

When questioned as to whether he had an alternative to offer, Dr. Dewar had no reply. "I feel a great many people are not going to receive the benefits which the plan originally intended to cover," said Dr. Dewar. "There are people who are not and will not provide for themselves and I am afraid it will be the hospitals that will have to suffer in these instances," he added.

Premier: "If you read the bill you will see that everybody will be covered."

Dr. Dewar said he could not understand why there was no charge made against the hospital plan for the first three months of the plan from January to March was being budgeted at the rate of \$665,000 for three months.

At this rate, he figured that by taking a full 12 months period it would cost \$2½ million.

Premier: "That will all be explained when the bill is considered so that even a grade two pupil will be able to understand it."

TOKEN EFFORT

The Opposition critic said the budget showed only a token effort on the part of the government to establish young farmers. He felt that the \$250,000 provided under the bill was far short of the needs in this direction, especially when it was only a loan.

He claimed that in spite of increases to teachers' salaries the province with 17 percent of its budget for education, was still far behind the other provinces of Canada.

He quoted figures to show that Newfoundland spends 30 percent of its budget for education; N. S. 28; N.B. 18; Que. 21; Ont. 26; Man. 23; Sask. 18; Alta. 21; B. C. 18.2; Canadian average 22.6.

He reasoned that if Prince Edward Island would bring its spending for education up to the Canadian average, that is by 5.6 percent of the provincial budget, the minister would be voting another \$1,018,000.

Hon. Mr. Macdonald: "We've tried to keep the deficit down to please you."

Dr. Dewar: "If you are, you should not do it at the expense of education because two of our

lowestances: one-half the old age security, and old age pension as well as 60 percent of the cost of health insurance. This agreement was good till 1952, with certain special concessions given to P.E.I.

PICKERSGILL Quoting from Mr. Pickersgill who spoke on the conference at the time Dr. Dewar noted that the federal member said: "It is not the business of the federal government to raise revenue for the province but just to equalize payments."

Mr. Diefenbaker said the grants would not give the provinces enough.

Walter Harris said as far as the federal government was concerned, "the bargain is over. We believe it is fair in the light of federal responsibilities."

Kings Firms Awarded Three Harbour Works Contracts

The Minister of Public Works, the Hon. Howard Green, has announced that a contract for \$19,981.30 has been awarded to Norman N. MacLean, of Murray River, P. E. I., for the construction of a breakwater extension at North Lake. The company submitted the lowest bid on the project in response to the Department's advertising for public tenders. Specified completion date is September 5, 1959.

The work will consist of an extension to the North Breakwater, 100 feet in length, which will be constructed with braced pile bents, wales, caps, tie, deck stringers and plank deck. The back face is to be sheeted on the inshore 90 feet of length and the remainder of the faces will be close piled with triangular fillers between piles. With the exception of the deck plank, all timber is to be creosote treated, and the interior of the work is to be stone ballasted.
