THERE are grave fears of a water famine in Toronto owing to the increased consumption during the hot weather. It is expected that the reservoir will soon be empty.

ABOUT \$1000 were collected in the Halifax Catholic churches on Sunday last for a monument to the late Monsignor Power.

REV. DR. BURNS, the recently elected Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, has returned from his trip to the Pacific Coast.

A FEW dealers in fresh mackerel managed to find their way into the new fish market on Queen's Wharf to-day. The mackerel sold at from three to four cents each. The number of purchasers present was not large.

MR. CHAPUIS, editor of Le Courrier du Canada, and a son-in-law of Sir Hector Langlois, will be the Government candidate in the forthcoming election in the riding of St. John's, Quebec, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Duchesne, Grit. The Opposition candidate has not yet been named.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered last Sabbath in the Presbyterian Church, at Souris, in the morning, and at Annandale, in the evening. Rev. Mr. Archibald assisted the pastor on both occasions. Several new communicants joined the church at each place.

MR. AENEAS MACDONALD, Private Secretary to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, and Aide-de-Camp James D. Irving, visited the French warship Minerve yesterday afternoon. His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor being still out of town. A large number of citizens went on board this afternoon.

EIGHT cadets who have completed their full course at the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont., have been granted diplomas, two of the number having accepted commissions in the imperial service. Twenty-six candidates, who passed entrance examinations, have been ordered to be admitted as cadets.

CAPTAIN JOHN WALSH, recently convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to four years in the penitentiary therefor, left for Dorchester this morning in charge of Sheriff Curtis and Constable John McKinnon. A number of relatives and friends were at the station, and the prisoner broke down more than once while saying good-bye.

THE cruisers are making themselves useful. The Vigilant was on hand last Wednesday between Souris and East Point protecting the shore fishermen against American seiners. Three of the latter kept dodging along with purse seines in tow all day, but as the mackerel were inside the limit, and the cruisers there to prevent poaching, they caught no fish.

COLLINGSWOOD SCHREIBER, Esq., Superintendent of Government Railways, arrived last evening, accompanied by his private secretary, Mr. L. K. Jones. With Acting-Superintendent Unsworth, Track-master Houle and Mr. Crosskill, he went East this morning to inspect the line as far as Souris and Georgetown. Hon. W. W. Sullivan went with the party as far as Mount Stewart.

THE Steam Navigation Company's steamers Princess of Wales and St. Lawrence, are fitted up in first-class style, and travellers thereby can rely on being well and carefully attended to. The saloons are elegantly furnished, the staterooms all that can be desired and the wants of the "inner man" are well catered to. The officers are all capable and obliging, and are very popular with the travelling public.

MRS. H. BROWN was drowned in the vicinity of Peasant Point, opposite Indian town, N. B., on Sunday evening. It appears that she was picking gooseberries, and in reaching lost her balance and fell over a steep embankment, a distance of over forty feet, into the water and was drowned. Her husband, who was only a few yards away, promptly secured a boat and put off to the spot where his wife fell in, but it is believed she struck the rocks in her descent and never rose to the surface after going down. Her body has not yet been recovered.

THERE'S danger in the soda fountain. At Bridgeport, Conn., a few days ago, the generator of the fountain a drug store exploded with terrible force and broke both of the clerk's legs below the knees. The clerk discovered that the gauge was not working properly and called the proprietor. The latter attempted to unscrew the gauge, when the explosion occurred. The proprietor was rendered insensible for over an hour by inhaling the gas. The clerk was removed to his home and one leg, which was broken in twelve places, had to be amputated.

MRS. DR. BURNS and Miss Fairbanks met with the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of Zion Church and organized them into an auxiliary in connection with a similar society in Nova Scotia. There was a good attendance and the meeting was most harmonious. Mrs. Laird was chosen President and Miss Susan Mutch Secretary. Mrs. Burns and Miss Fairbanks, acting under the Women's Foreign Missionary Board in Halifax, and with the sanction of the General Assembly, proceeded this morning to Alberton, and purpose forming Auxiliaries in some of the congregations of Prince County during the present week. They will probably visit Georgetown and other congregations in the East next week.

WE are informed that Upton Park has been much improved of late, and that there is every prospect of a good meeting shortly. A number of match races are to come off this week and next—the first taking place this afternoon.

FROM private advices received by a gentleman in this city, it appears that the cause of Dr. Edgill's rejection of the offer of the Bishopric of Nova Scotia was the refusal of the War Office to accept his resignation as Chaplain-General of the Forces.

WE understand that there is a splendid band on board the French warship Minerve, at present in port, and that an effort will be made to have a promenade concert in the Roller Rink or on one of our public squares before her departure.

THE Lunenburg Progress reports that a mysterious disease has visited that town. Vomiting, inflammation of the eyes and violent coughing indicate its presence. After three or four days it passes away, leaving a lingering cough upon its victim.

EVERY one who has read the story of "East Lynne," by Mrs. Henry Wood, will be delighted to know that the same is going to be played in the Lyceum on the 28th inst., the principal parts to be taken by the well-known actors Miss Claire Scott and S. K. Coburn.

THERE was some good mackerel fishing at the eastern part of the Island last week, some of the boats taking twelve hundred each. The latter part of the week, however, was not so favorable for fishing. The mackerel this year are schooling close in shore, while last year, which was an exceptional one in this respect, they schooled to a very large extent outside the three mile limit.

Carpenter was found guilty of the theft, and sentenced to one month's imprisonment; Crosby was discharged. An assault case was postponed until to-morrow.

ANGUS FAIRBAIRS, the Scottish minstrel, who, with his accomplished daughters, gave several concerts in this city some years ago, died at his home in Boston on the 30th ult. Before he came to the United States he had, in England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland achieved a reputation second to none as an illustrator of Scottish manners and a singer of Scottish songs. He leaves behind a widow and two daughters.

THE Brunswick Hotel, Moncton, N. B., has been much improved of late, and is now, without doubt, one of the best in the Province. It contains about one hundred rooms, all of which are elegantly furnished and fitted up with the conveniences usually found in a first-class hotel. The cuisine is also first-class. The proprietor, Mr. McSweeney, and the manager Mr. Fuchs, are the right men in the right place and are justly popular with travellers. We wish the Brunswick continued success.

A SMALL parcel addressed to R. E. Stiles was left at the Queen Hotel, Halifax, last Friday afternoon, and, Mr. Stiles being out, was taken charge of by the clerk. About 9 o'clock the contents of the parcel exploded, and it immediately burst into a large and hot blaze, threatening destruction to the letter and key rack. Clerk Dillon managed to throw the burning parcel over the counter on to the floor, which was badly burned. The contents of the parcel were in powder shape, and consisted in a variety of colors, filling the place with a dense smoke. No explanation of the mystery is so far forthcoming.

THE Sunday evening parades of the Salvation Army are becoming objectionable. They occur at a time when the various congregations are worshipping, and by the incessant pounding of the big drum through the streets adjacent much discomfort is felt. We do not suppose the officers of the Army wish to annoy our church-going people, and hope that a gentle reminder will suffice. On several occasions the noise has greatly distressed sick persons residing along the line of march. We confess that the singing would be better appreciated and our people better satisfied if the big bass drum were left at home.

An amusing story is told of a young St. John man. Last week he left for Maine to marry a girl he had been courting for some time. She belonged to Fredericton, and left last spring to work in Maine. Thinking, however, that her St. John friend was too long in coming to time, she married a Yankee. The feelings of the other can better be imagined than described when he reached his destination, and learned that his dearly loved was already married. He did not hang around Maine long. He started right for home. His version of the story is that his sweetheart was dead, and was buried the day before he arrived in town.

British Political Pointers.

LONDON, July 18.

In the Lords to-day the Crimes Act Bill was read a third time.

It is stated that W. H. Smith has accepted the main proposal of the bill by Unionists for amending the Land Bill.

Lord Salisbury, at a reunion of Conservatives to-morrow, will announce the extent of the concessions.

A report gains credence that the Government will not accept Unionist amendments to the Land Bill unless Lord Hartington and some other prominent Liberal Unionists join the cabinet and share the responsibility.

The Wimbledon Shooting.

LONDON, July 18.

In the last stage of the contest for the Queen's prize at Wimbledon, three Canadians were placed, Ogg with a score 189, Langstroth, 189 and Thomas 187. Gillies and Mitchell were not placed, but secured money prizes. Mr. Ogg, of the Canadian team, won the first prize in shooting in the London corporation match at Wimbledon to-day. In the heath prize, 45 pounds, seven shots, at 200 yards, which is not yet finished, Lieut. E. A. Smith, St. John, N. B., Rifles, has so far made the highest score.

The Hot Wave.

CHICAGO, July 18.

Twenty deaths from sunstroke occurred yesterday, and as many more this morning. Two hundred and sixty babies less than a year old fell sick and died from heat. There were about 125 deaths altogether up to noon.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 18.

There were 23 deaths from heat to-day, and 38 in the last forty-eight hours. There were 30 prostrations to-day.

BALTIMORE, Md., July 18.

The weather to-day was the hottest ever known. At three o'clock it was 102 in the shade.

Extradited.

OTTAWA, July 18.

Hon. Mr. Thompson, Minister of Justice, has issued his warrant for the extradition of Buzon, who is wanted at Brussels, Belgium, on a charge of fraudulent bankruptcy and embezzlement. He is now in Montreal jail.

TORONTO, July 19—10 a.m.

Light to moderate winds, fine weather, not much change in temperature.

THE New York City Directory, issued last week, contains 2175 pages of names, numbering in all 324,813, and indicating a population of 1,600,000. There are 2,300 Smiths, 1800 Browns and 900 Joneses enrolled.

A MOST remarkable occurrence followed a negro funeral at Mount Pleasant, about six miles south of Nashville, Tenn., one day last week, nine negroes being killed by a single stroke of lightning. The party had scarcely left the grave when a most severe thunder and rain storm burst upon them. All immediately ran for trees scattered about the graveyard. Scarcely had the nine negroes reached the shelter of an immense oak when a terrific thunder cloud burst and the tree was struck. The whole party of nine tumbled down together and died instantly.
