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HUNTER'S CORNER

Huns Have Made Surprising Comeback After Hard Times

September, with its golden stubble and serried stalks of grain, is with us once more and hunters are beginning to check their guns and lay in a supply of shells. It is becoming increasingly evident as October 1st begins to beckon that the sponsors of the daily bag reduction on Huns jumped to conclusions too soon. The recommendation to have the daily bag limit on Huns reduced from eight to five was made early in the season and the Order-in-Council to this effect passed on July twenty-fifth. At the moment indications and reports indicate that the Hun population is approximately 50 per cent above last season.

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It's a little too early to announce any definite increase in percentage as grain harvesting is not yet full underway but it is quite evident our Huns have made a remarkable comeback after last season's (1956) record low and the devastating winter that followed. A reduction in the daily bag limit on ducks from eight to five would result, if strictly observed, in a marked saving of ducks. Waterfowl have selected feeding grounds and their flocks across the fall sky are easily followed. Thus the duck hunter can work his cards so the ducks will come to him and it's just a case of "sit and wait" in a snug blind with a stool of decoys out front.

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HARDER WORK It's an entirely different proposition with Hun hunting. The coveys are adept at seeking out of-the-way hideouts and the hunter and his Setter or Pointer — or both — have to travel mile upon mile through vacant farms, stubble fields, alder swales and swamps in quest of the elusive Hun. It's a tiring, fruitless quest on occasions that occur too often. Tighten Guard Against Flu

OTTAWA (CP)—Medical staffs at Canada's seaports and international airports are being strengthened to tighten the guard against Asian flu, health and immigration department officials said Friday. Health Minister Monteth said he has issued orders that any arriving passengers ill with any ailment that might possibly be Asian flu are to be isolated in hospitals. All passengers disembarking from ocean liners and arriving on overseas flights are being carefully looked over by departmental medical crews for signs of the flu. Health officials said they suspect the disease already has entered Canada. Dr. B. D. R. Layton, chief of the health department's international health section, said it would have been "just about impossible to keep out the Asian flu germ." However, it was hoped to hold down the human sources of infection entering the country.

Mantle In Hospital

NEW YORK (AP) — Mickey Mantle, New York Yankee outfielder, was taken to hospital Thursday night and will remain there until Tuesday in the hope that the rest will cure his shin splints. "Mantle isn't sick," said Bob Fishel, public relations director for the Yankees, "but it was decided to put him in the hospital to keep him off his feet. Rest is the only cure for shin splints." Mantle, seeking to retain his triple batting crown of last year, has been used only sparingly during the last 10 days. However, he has insisted on being in uniform for each game and has been used as a pinch-hitter. Shin splints are caused by the tightening of the muscles along the shin. They are more painful than dangerous.

MACHINES TOO HOT

CORNER BROOK NHD (CP) Overheated machine parts have been blamed for two minor fires less than an hour apart in the Bowater Pulp and Paper mills Thursday. Two of the company's seven paper-making machines were stopped for about a half-hour.
