young and old.—S.

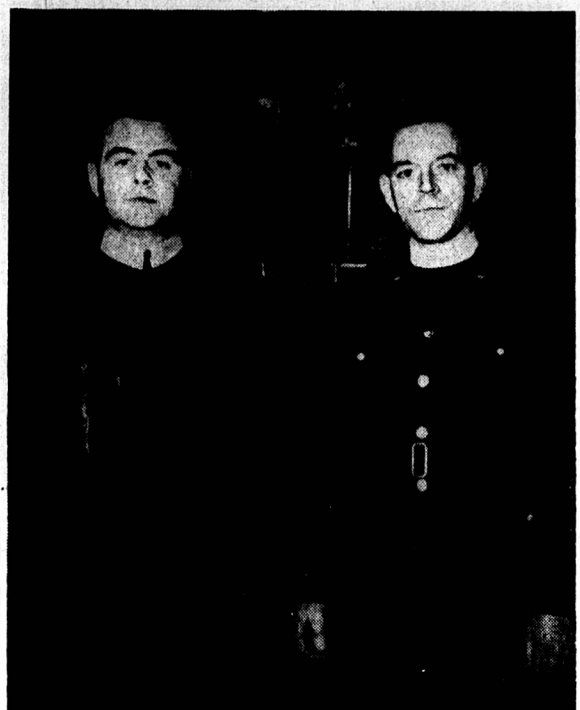
CCF Resolution
