Presbyterians Give Instructions

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) - The World Presbyterian Alliance has advised its members in 45 countries behind the Iron Curtain, "be loyal to the government of the nation in which you live," but in case of conflict obey God, not man. In a message Thursday closing the 10-day 17th general council of the Alliance, the 400 delegates told their brethren that Christ is the only hope in a world dominated by fear of atomic warfare. It advised its 40,000,000 adherents: "Be loyal to the government of the nation in which you live, but if a decision is forced, remember that as a Christian you must obey God rather than man." The only Iron Curtain delegation to attend the council meeting came from Czechoslovakia. The chief Hungarian delegate was refused entry by the United States and the Polish Communist government refused to let Polish delegates attend.

Forecast Western Grain Marketing

WINNIPEG (CP) - Western farmers can expect to market about 500,000,000 bushels of all grains in the 1954-55 crop year - about the same as last year - the Canadian wheat board said Thursday. The board said the extent of domestic and international demand for western grain is not yet established but it saw no reason for lesser producers' marketings in 1954-55. Incomplete statistics indicated western grain marketings in the last crop year exceeded 600,000,000 bushels, compared in 1952-53 and an average of 474,000,000 in the 10 years from 1941 to 1951. Wheat marketings were nearly 400,000,000 bushels, representing an average delivery of slightly more than 16 bushels a seeded acre.

Growing Wheat Market in Brazil

REGINA, (CP) - There is a growing demand in Brazil for high quality wheat from the United States and Canada, four Brazilian government officials said here today. The four are making a tour of Canada's wheat-producing and marketing facilities on the invitation of the Canadian wheat board. It is the first of what the wheat board hopes will be a series of visits to Canada by representatives of wheat importing countries. Members of the party are Itagiro Barcante, director general of the wheat expansion service in Brazil; Mozart De Araujo, commercial assistant; Ernesto Alberto Ferreira De Carvalho, secretary, and Dr. Alvaro Fagundes of the Brazilian embassy in Washington. The Brazilian official said the problem of wheat imports is complicated by the shortage of dollar currencies. Mr. Araujo said the Brazilian government cannot hope to expand wheat production sufficiently to take care of domestic consumption.

Struck By Lightning Ontario Man Lives

FORT FRANCIS, Ont. (CP) - Francis Einarson, operator of International Falls Municipal airport, can describe what it's like to be struck by lightning. He was perched on the wing of a plane, into which he had just pumped 25 gallons of high-octane when the bolt struck. It left the imprint of his hand burned on the wing. Witnesses said they saw a streak of fire "shooting out of his head, six feet into the air. "When the lightning struck me I felt as if I were being blown apart," Einarson said Thursday. "Fire flew out of my body in all directions." Only his hand was burned.

Attends Highland Dancing School

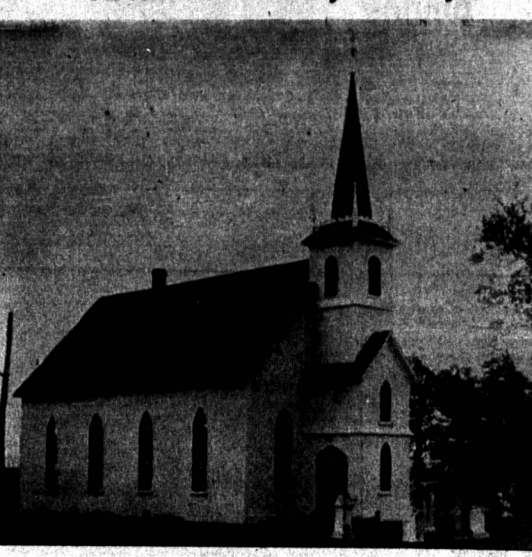

POTATO GROWERS WARNED REGARDING HARVESTING & SHIPPING AT PRESENT

That it may become necessary to impose a ten-day holding period of potato shipments from the Island is the fear expressed by Mr. W. P. MacLeod, Chief Fruit and Vegetable Inspector for Prince Edward Island. Mr. MacLeod states that the weather conditions of the past ten days have been very favorable for the development of blight, some of which has already made its appearance. He cautions growers to be extremely careful in the harvesting and shipping of too many potatoes at this time. The Fruit and Vegetable Branch, upon the first complaints of receivers will be required to authorize a holding period similar to that in effect last year. Even though this action is not desirable it may become necessary to protect the market from receiving potatoes in which blight might later develop or those which would tend to deteriorate quickly in a green condition. "Any potatoes dug now" states Mr. MacLeod, "should be moved to their destination with a minimum of delay to prevent such deterioration."
