an official of the National Federation of Fruit and Potato Traders on the subject. Said official: "The cost of getting these cabbages, lettuce, etc. to market is considerable. Your cabbage must be sold at a price which pays for their journey, and freight travel today costs money. Remember too, that they must travel in containers that can be used only four or five times, and many firms have to budget to lose on entire stock of containers in a season. Then there is the cost of sending the containers to the grower by road or rail, and on its return, there is the portering in the market itself, and also market tolls which are based on the business done by the wholesaler."

What else are we to remember? asked the reporter. "Well, you can remember that the proportion of the wholesaler's overhead - his rents, taxes, trucks and salaries. It takes 10 to 20 years to train a good salesman, and they deservedly get good salaries. The telegraph and telephone messages to the growers, of ten hourly, add to the cost. The grower's profit of the wholesaler has been only one penny for it. He tackled estimated at 10 per cent gross profit."

Changes Noted In Canadian Dairy Industry

OTTAWA, December 1950 - Due to increased domestic consumption and exports and a lower production of certain manufactured products in 1950, the Canadian dairy industry has changed from one of surplus of certain commodities in 1949, to one of no surpluses or near scarcity in 1950.

(The ink in those bygone days, was made of oak-galls and iron.)

BROWSING IN THE DICTIONARY

An etna, says the dictionary, is a small combined spirit lamp and boiler, named from the volcano. The definition is exact but needs some enlargement. I once examined an etna and saw that it was made of some metal that had once been silvered. The base was a little bowl for holding the alcohol (spirit) and from its centre rose a conical container having a hinged lid. The fluid to be heated, (usually milk) was placed in the container, then a little alcohol was poured into the bowl and set on fire. It thus heated the milk, and seems to have been designed for nursery use. It had, however, long been looked on as "an antique."

I often find myself referring to a "latch" (or door fastening) as a "sneek". The dictionary tells me that the word is Scottish, but it is used on both sides of the border. The old-time sneek was made of wood and there was no thumb piece to lift it. Instead, a hole was bored through the door above the latch and a cord passed through it; one end was tied to the sneek and the other hung loose outside. One pulled the cord to raise the sneek. At night the householder locked up by pulling in the cord.

The "O" in such Irish names as O'Sullivan, seems to be disappearing. It signifies descent as "Mac" does in Scottish names. The word re-appears in Scottish dialect as "oe", which the dictionary says, means grandchild. The same authority gives "leroe" as meaning great-grandchild; for which word see the Latin's son in Sir Walter Scott's "Lady of the Lake".

A while ago, I noted that a brother-german was a "full brother" and that half brothers had one parent in common. Since then a further limitation has turned up. Half brothers, son of the same mother, are "brothers uterine."
