This year Ottawa was host to a new convention, that of the Women's Institutes of Canada. Every one knows of the vital work carried on for many years by this wonderful organization.

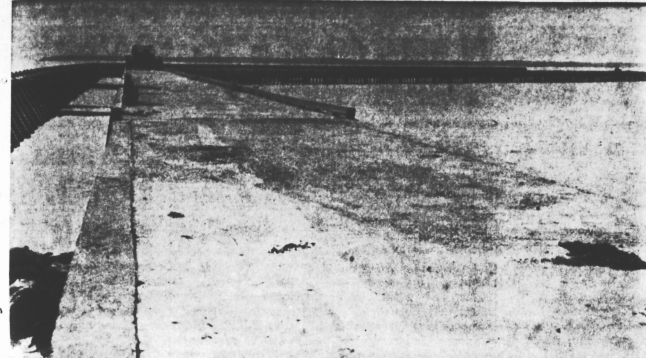
**TEACHERS' WORKSHOP**

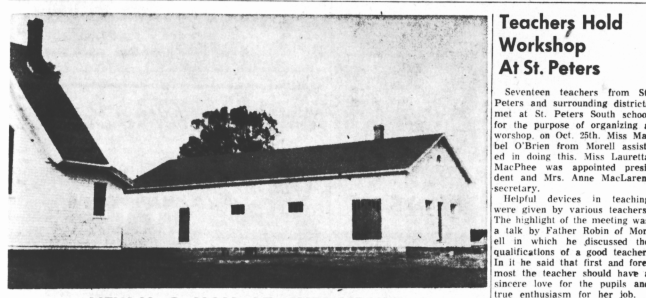
**UNPOPULAR JOB?**

### Teachers Hold Workshop At St. Peter's

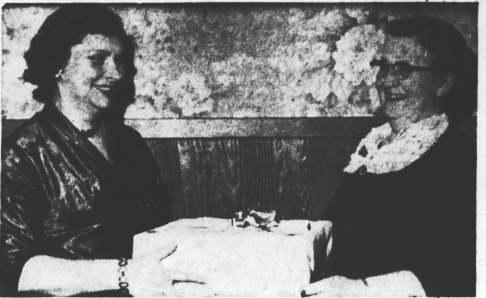

### ANNOUNCEMENT

Regarding the re-naming of the new Federal Building in Charlottetown. As you know, this building was given the name of the "Confederation" Building following its opening last year. This has led to a great deal of confusion for our countless summer visitors and conflicts with our historic Confederation Chamber in the Provincial Building.

Accordingly this organization has supported the request of the Prince Edward Island Historical Society to the Department of Public Works of the Government of Canada to have the building re-named so as to avoid such existing confusion in this regard.

Advice has now been received from Ottawa that that Department is quite willing to go along with re-naming the said building provided our interested organizations and citizens can agree on a recommendation for a new name for the building which would meet with general local approval.

Therefore this Board is conducting a contest during the month of November, 1957, to secure suggestions for a new name for this building. The contest is open to all interested organizations and citizens of Queen's County, Prince Edward Island, and your suggestions in this regard are hereby solicited. Suggestions must be accompanied by a letter giving the reasons for your choice of name, and should be mailed to Charlottetown Board of Trade, P.O. Box 336, Charlottetown, P.E.I., prior to Midnight November 30th next.

\$25.00 will be paid to the interested organization or citizen suggesting the name finally chosen to replace "Confederation" Building. In the event of more than one interested organization or citizen suggesting the name chosen, the winner shall be the one which the judges select on the basis of the best letter submitted giving reasons for the choice of such a name.

Judges shall be Hon. H. L. Palmer, President of the P. E. I. Historical Society; Hon. G. J. Tweedy, President of the Canadian Club of Prince Edward Island; and Mrs. William M. Brehaut, Provincial Educational Conventor, I.O.D.E., and the decision of the judges shall be final.

Following the close of this contest it is planned to call a meeting at City Hall of representatives of all our Organizations to choose from those submitted and any others brought up thereat a suitable new name for the Building which meets with such general local approval, and subsequently to recommend the same to Ottawa on behalf of all concerned.
