Mr. Keir Duggan of Trinity United Credit Union, Summerside, was elected president of the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League held Thursday at the Charlottetown Hotel. Other officers elected were vice-president, George Cheverie, Federal Employees' Credit Union, Charlottetown; Gilbert Gaudet, St. Anthony's Credit Union, Howland; Managing Director, Leo J. Corcoran, Charlottetown. The resignation of J. G. Dennis as managing director of the P.E.I. Credit Union League was accepted with regret.

The newly elected directors for the coming year are: Queens County, Albert J. Gallant; Kings County, J. Ernest Avery (re-elected); Prince County, George Gaudet, Charlottetown; George Cheverie, Prince County (unexpired term of the late Cyrus Potter); Keir Duggan.

A dividend of 3% on share capital in the share and loan department was declared. The credentials committee reported that 35 Credit Unions were represented at the annual meeting. There were 82 delegates and 43 visitors. An interesting panel discussion on "Credit Union Publicity and Education" was chaired by Dr. Brendan O'Grady. Members of the panel were: J. E. Avery, George Cheverie, Keir Duggan and Lyster MacLennan. After some discussion, the meeting voted un-

animously to increase dues paid to the P.E.I. Credit Union League from 50 cents to 75 cents per member per annum.

Speaking on the subject, "Credit Unions are the financial arm of the co-operative movement in Canada," Mr. Alex MacIsaac, managing director of the Co-operative Union of Nova Scotia, stated that people must organize their own credit institutions. "Credit Union members must have equity not only in their homes, cars and furniture but also in stores, wholesales, factories, trust companies and insurance," he said. "A total program of co-operation is needed. Credit Unions, Co-operatives and Labour Unions must unite in pursuit of their common democratic objectives."

# Quick Agreement Reached To End U.S. Steel Strike

By JOHN MOODY — The PITTSBURGH (AP) — The United Steelworkers (CIO) and U.S. Steel Corporation, world's largest producers, agreed Friday on an average 15-cent-plus hourly wage increase, ending the shortest industry strike in history. The strike had been on little more than 12 hours when settlement was reached.

Other major steel companies immediately met with union officials to work out settlements based on terms of the pact with Big Steel.

The U.S. steel settlement covers 150,000 production workers. Union President David J. McDonald said he hopes to reach agreement with 95 other basic steelmaking firms.

# Eight Jets

crashed. The four flying top cover returned to base without incident. They took off from the Otta air-base a few miles north of Lisbon Friday morning and were due back Friday afternoon for an air festival. The festival was cancelled and all planes touring the country and colonies were recalled to their bases.

"This is the biggest accident in the history of Portuguese aviation," said Capt. Pont Rodrigues, commander of the Otta base.

The only witness to the accident, little Old Maria de Jesus Victorino, was guarding her sheep atop 5,000-foot-high Mount Carvalho. The mountain was shrouded in clouds.

"I was hoping the sun would drive the clouds away," she said, when she heard a hissing and roaring over her head. That was the flight of four under Capt. Rangel de Lima which was flying higher than the other eight. He is known as "Lucky Lima" for his many close calls in the past.

"Then I thought the mountain below had exploded as flames, smoke and burning debris began flying in every direction. Many pine trees caught fire and others had been shaved off. I couldn't understand what had happened. It was terrible. But the silence that followed was worse. The bird sang no more and many of them were dead."

AMONG THE BEST

Maria de Jesus didn't learn until hours later that it was eight planes she had seen crash in the clouds and that three lieutenants, a sergeant and four corporals who were among the best in the Portuguese Air Force, had lost their lives. Two of the lieutenants and the sergeant were married and had children.

The debris of the planes was scattered over a square mile of charred trees and underbrush. The burned remains of the pilots were taken to the chapel of the nearby hamlet of Carvalhinhas.

Three parachutes were found intact, some 500 yards from the crash site. One of them was wide open. This was one of the mysteries the official investigation of the crash will have to decipher.

The jets were planes supplied Portugal by the United States under the North Atlantic Treaty Organization of which Portugal is a member.
