Judge Sephen's Farewell.

LONDON, April 7.—An affecting scene took place to-day in the Queen's Bench division of the High Court of Justice, when Sir James Fitzjames Stephen, retired from the bench. All of Judge Stephen's fellow judges, including the Lord Chief Justice of England, were present.

How Barnum Died.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., April 7.—Phineas Taylor Barnum, the world renowned and veteran showman, died peacefully at his home in this city at 6.32 o'clock this evening. At 11 o'clock last night the attending physicians perceived that his weakened pulse, more difficult respiration, and lower temperature indicated that the action of the heart had become so feeble as to preclude a collapse.

THE CHURCHES.

Interesting Religious News and Notes.

The St. John Presbytery at its meeting in March nominated the Rev. D. M. Gordon, of St. Andrew's church, Halifax, as the next Moderator of General Assembly.

In the Central Pennsylvania Methodist Conference there were in the year just closed nine thousand six hundred conversions. Forty thousand dollars were raised for missions.

Mr. JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER has added one more contribution to his long list of charitable bequests by giving another \$100,000 to the American Baptist Education Society.

There are ninety-seven Presbyterian churches in Mexico. Twenty-nine converts are now able ministers of the gospel. Over five thousands converts are in full communion.

The many friends of Rev. Dr. Laing, Moderator of the General Assembly, will be glad to learn that he is improving in health, and is expected home from his Southern trip in about three weeks.

PRINCIPLE CAIRNS, lecturing in Edinburgh last week on John Knox, expressed the conviction that he had done more than any other Reformer to save in the deepest sense, the Anglo-Saxon race.

Rev. C. E. BAKER writes from Harvey, Albert Co., N. B., to the Messenger:—"We are in the midst of a very gracious revival, some twelve or more have come forward. The church is greatly encouraged and strengthened."

Rev. T. WATSON SMITH, President of the Nova Scotia Conference, has left for Transat Committee. He intends to take Yarmouth missionary meetings on return from Toronto, and with this and other official engagements will not reach his Halifax home until after the middle of April.

At the late meeting of the Presbytery of Hamilton in favor of memorializing the General Assembly to divide the Presbytery of Hamilton into two presbyteries, to be known respectively as the Presbytery of Hamilton and the Presbytery of Niagara, was carried by a vote of 25 to 17.

Rev. THOMAS CHAMBERS, a Wesleyan minister, intimately acquainted with rural England, has come to the conclusion that the battle between liberty and sacerdotalism has to be fought in the agricultural parts of the country.

At a meeting of the Regins Presbytery held at Inverness, Florida, March 11 and 12, Mr. H. M. Rochester was ordained to the charge of Prince Albert. Rev. W. L. Clay, son of John Clay, Esq., Sumner, preached the ordination sermon.

A BAPTIST church was dedicated in Havana, Cuba, Feb. 13, under the auspices of the Southern Baptist Mission. Representative Baptists were present from different Southern States and from Boston and Chicago.

FATHER IGNATIUS, who has been on a missionary tour through Florida, has returned North. He has been in Washington City, where he held services in a public hall. Tickets were sold at the door at \$1, 50 and 25 cents.

To the New York Independent we are indebted for an annual exhibit of the strength of the several churches of the United States. The estimated aggregate of the membership of the Christian denominations is put at 22,000,000, an increase of nearly a million a year.
