Tignish Local Teachers' Convention At Dalton Hall

The teachers in the Tignish area met in convention in the Dalton School recently and laid a good foundation for a most successful and promising school year ahead.

The president, Mr. P. A. Arsenault, gave a most instructive and interesting address of welcome and exhortation to the teachers present. He then called on the Reverend Pastor John A. MacDonald who cordially welcomed all to the Dalton School. He commended the teachers for their evident interest in education, stating that he was glad of the occasion to speak to such an intellectual group. The teachers were asked to do all in their power to supervise the work and, above all, the play of the children confined to their care. He asked that the teachers carefully guide and help form their plastic minds and characters adding his favorite adage: "Bring up the child in the way that he should go and in his old age he will not depart therefrom."

Excellent minutes of the last meeting were read by Miss Clothilde Arsenault.

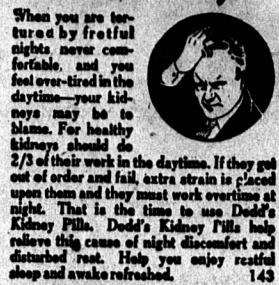
Supervisor's Address

The president then called on Supervisor Merrick Callaghan, B.A., who gave a splendid and well prepared resume of important incidentals and details necessary for and familiar to teachers. He urged teachers to be familiar with the Revised and the old Course of Studies. Emphasis was placed on the daily teaching of Composition from Grade III up. It could be oral or written, long or short, and bearing on any of the different lessons or subjects of that day. Mr. Callaghan counseled the teachers to use the Guide Books and to have their pupils use the Exercise Books supplementing and complementing their Readers. To have success in Arithmetic, Mr. Callaghan added, the blackboards should be used a great deal. Any arithmetic text may be used as long as it is a good one and has all the types of problems called for on the course.

He stressed the fact that pupils should not try the Grade VIII Examinations before the completion of that important year's work. Pupils promoted to Grade IX should actually have passed these exams.

Supervisor F. E. Doiron who is always so interested in the work prescribed and so helpful at all times urged the teachers to be faithful in the different phases of their manifold duties. He mentioned the fact that "interesting teachers are those who have teacher personality," nevertheless, all teachers can develop and improve by (a) knowing and (b) reading. Teachers can make the lessons more interesting by now and then, setting aside all books, by using different approaches, etc. Teachers were asked to make use of the wonderful help provided schools through the Department. Last year alone twenty-nine (29) new schools which consist of forty-three (43) departments, were built. This does not

include other new schools built previously. Teachers, no doubt, are most grateful for this splendid help and encouragement. The Department wants to help each school on the Island. Let us cooperate.

School By Radio

Mr. Lusty in his genial way thoroughly explained the 1950-51 Broadcasting Manual which he presented to each teacher with the compliments of the Station. After hearing Mr. Lusty all teachers realize the work of these aerial aids. Those who already have radios anxiously await these broadcasts which bring to their classrooms some of the finest teachers and many great women and men of Canada. The culture, diction, training and command of perfect English possessed by these fine teachers of the air cannot do ought but make our pupils more aware, more alert, more broad-minded and educated. Teachers without radios should devise some way or means of getting them. "Where there's a will, there's a way."

Miss Wilson of the Department of Health brought good news by telling us that Red Cross again has come to the fore by way of Dental Help and Guidance. She introduced Dr. O'Meara, the newly-appointed head of the Dental Division of Public Health. The Doctor outlined the chief causes of decay but, above all, gave us a means of prevention, i.e., (1) nutritious school lunches, (2) daily and proper use of tooth-brushes, (3) regular dental attention (beginning at the age of three).

In the absence of Miss Hill and Mrs. McCallum, a very interesting appeal was made to the teachers in regard to Red Cross work by Mrs. Cudmore who really put over to the teachers what Red Cross really stands for. The teachers are proud of and grateful to this great and grand organization which stands for service and kindness to others.

Mrs. Cudmore compared the Red Cross to the Island's mainstay, the potato. Do we fully appreciate the one, the other? And do we really get from both all that each has to give? Yes, we are grateful for the Red Cross First Aid Courses, Water Safety Program in swimming and diving and Miss Cudmore will be pleased to know that since her visit in Tignish, First Aid Kits are being introduced into certain schools. Teachers and pupils are thankful and most anxious to receive the new improved Junior Red Cross Magazines which are

classified among the best magazines for young people.

Afternoon Session

With the opening of the afternoon session came a first class talk by our worthy Director and Deputy Minister of Education, Dr. L. W. Shaw, who spoke on the methods of teaching. He told the teachers to be "ever alive and alert" to the better ways of teaching the subjects so as to better teach the child. We have received sound training let it not be latent but let it be exploited, ever improving, ever increasing. This is 1950; let us be up to date in our methods but let them always be based on pedagogy.

Dr. Shaw was followed by another friend and helper of the teachers, Mr. H. B. McLean, author of the Writing Manuals prescribed by the Department of Education and now in use in our schools. The author told that good writing is that which is easily read and easily written, two qualities found in the MacLean system. Pupils, he added, learn to write well by daily practice which is done carefully and under supervision. Writing will be done well when it has (1) motivation, (2) demonstration, (3) explanation, (4) accomplishment and (5) relaxation to uphold in it.

Mr. Malcolm McKenzie, the Chief Supervisor, next spoke to the teachers. He is to be commended for the fine work done in the revising of the Course of Studies. Teachers have often spoken of the need for fuller details being outlined that they might better teach the given subjects.

Mrs. Eulalia Gillis, a past president, now elected as vice president, read a paper concerning what she accomplished by the P. E. I. Teachers' Federation during the past year. She then thanked the teachers for the confidence they placed in her when they appointed her as member of the Board of Governors.

Interesting and helpful questions from the Box were capably answered by Dr. Shaw and Mr. McKenzie.

Realizing the worth of their dignified and competent President, Mr. P. A. Arsenault, the teachers heartily approved his reelection which he pleasantly accepted along with his added duty of being a member of the Board.

Miss Catherine Wallace also accepted this latter position.

Miss Clothilde Arsenault who is to be complimented for her exact recording of minutes was, to the pleasure of all, re-elected for another term.

Lusty, Assistant Supervisor of School Broadcasts for the explanation given regarding the Atlantic School Broadcast Program for the first half-year; (4) To Dr. O'Meara for his instructions on dental health; (5) To Miss Mona Wilson for her interest in the public health of our school children; (6) To Mrs. Harry Cudmore, representative from Junior Red Cross for information regarding Junior Red Cross, First Aid Water Safety and Health; (7) To Dr. L. W. Shaw, Director of Education for his attendance at our Convention and for his inspirational talk; (8) To Mr. H. B. McLean, author of The Modern System of Writing, for his helpful suggestions in the motivation, demonstration, explanation and application of writing; (9) To Mr. Malcolm McKenzie, Chief Supervisor, for his detailed explanation of the Supplement to the Course of Studies and for other helpful hints; (10) To Mrs. Eulalia Gillis for her report from Teachers' Federation and for the splendid interest taken as our representative in the organization.
- 2. Whereas the Supplement to the Course of Studies is so clearly outlined and offers a great help to teachers especially in the primary grades, be it resolved that the thanks of this Convention be extended to Mr. Malcolm McKenzie who compiled this outline.
- 3. Whereas the teacher assumes full responsibility in reporting the non-attendance of children to the Attendance Officer and in this way incur the displeasure of some parents, be it resolved that the signature of the Secretary of the School Trustees should be along with that of the teacher.
- 4. Whereas many pupils leave school because of financial difficulties and whereas older children need money as they continue their studies, be it resolved that this convention ask the Department to urge the Provincial Government to request the Federal Government to continue the family allowance to children to the end of High School.
- 5. Whereas a First Aid Kit is so essential in every school, be it resolved that each teacher take measure to provide such equipment.
- 6. Whereas the schools of the Province with radio facilities have so greatly benefited by the excellent lessons given over the air in the Atlantic Broadcasts of last year, be it resolved that the thanks of this Convention be forwarded by the secretary to CFCY Charlottetown for their co-operation in this worthwhile project. 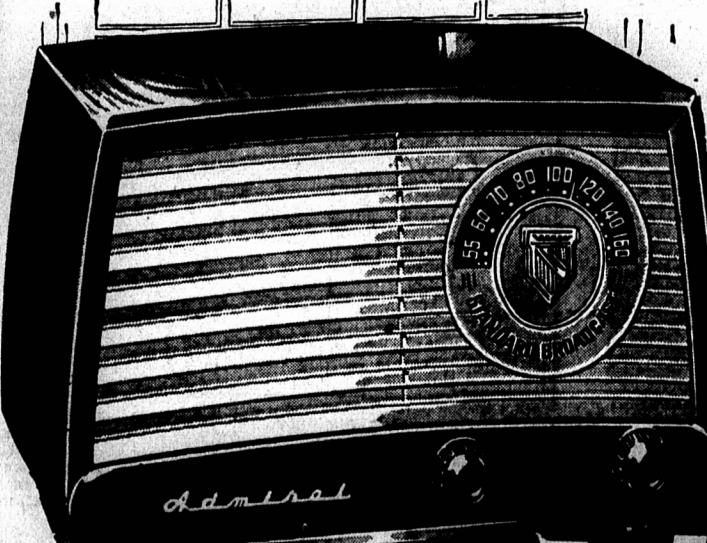

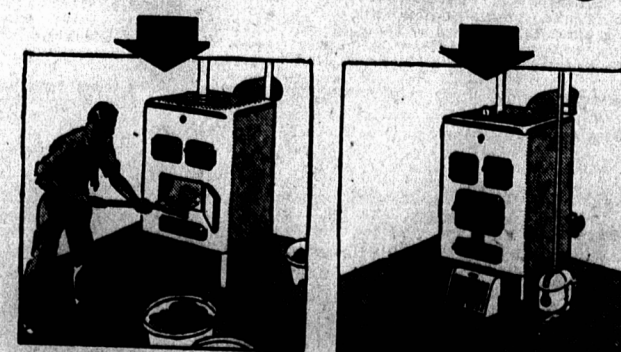
