Afterwards he took up the temperance work, and his powerful addresses made quite an impression throughout Ontario. But one day a story went forth of his having kissed against her will a girl at Stratford, Ont., and afterwards his usefulness in that Province was gone. He went to Pennsylvania, plunged into excesses, then went to Detroit, where he was picked up by a raving maniac, and sent to the State asylum in which he died.
