THE FRENCH VOTE.

We disagree with the contention of the Guardian that the French-Canadians of Rustico voted for Dr. Douglas because they sympathize with Pineau. Such a contention is a libel upon French honour. We know that at least some of the French electors of Rustico voted for Dr. Douglas simply and only because they were unprepared to vote for Mr. Wise. They had always voted against Mr. Wise and they were impressed with the idea that his change of political faith was due to some ulterior motive, rather than to genuine dissatisfaction with the political course of the men in office. They knew that Mr. Wise had been in bad company; and they could not be persuaded to vote for him so soon after he had parted with his company—even though his resignation of his trust was honest and honourable. This, and not sympathy with Pineau on account of denunciations of his perfidy by the Conservative press, was the true reason why some, perhaps many, of the French people of Rustico voted against Mr. Wise and for Dr. Douglas.

HE CARRIED HIS POINT.

It will be remembered that the election bill, as introduced to Parliament was inapplicable, in some respects, to Prince Edward Island where we have open voting. Mr. Martin tried to have the matter arranged in the House of Commons, but was not fully successful. The bill went to the Senate and was hung up there until the last day of the session, Hon. Mr. Ferguson and his fellow Senators insisting that the amendments essential to the proper and just operation of the measure in this Province should be passed. On the last day of the session the government were confronted by the alternative to pass the amendments or lose the bill. Finally, at the last moment the amendments were passed, and bill, as amended, became law.

It is well that we have the Senate; and it is well that we have men there to fight for justice and the rights of the smaller Provinces.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The Maritime Medical Society now in session at St. John, have sent an expression of their sympathy to Dr. McLeod, of this city.

The best men and the best newspapers are partisan. But neither the best men nor the best newspapers will support the party in wrong doing or in continuous breaches of promise to do that which is right.

The St. John Sun remarks that the Paris exposition has already cost the Dominion treasury \$285,000, equal to nearly half the revenue of New Brunswick. But it has given Mr. Tarte a great advertisement in France.

ONE OUT OF FIVE.

(St. John Sun.)

The joy of the friends of Sir Louis Davies over the election of a local government supporter in a recent Prince Edward Island by-election shows how desperate the situation is in that province. Five provincial by-elections have been held in a few months. All were in constituencies carried in a general election by the friends of Sir Louis Davies. Of these five constituencies all but one have rejected government supporters. One refused to elect the attorney general, early last autumn, and that official has not yet found a seat. He watched from outside the bar the proceedings of the assembly at the last session and did not venture to fight for the riding vacated by the sharp trick played on Mr. Wise. As the result of the action of the Prince Edward Island electors, the government, which had a two-thirds majority after the general election of 1897, now owes its life to the casting vote of the Speaker and the purchase at Ottawa of Mr. Pineau. The riding of which the last election was held has long been regarded as about the strongest liberal seat in the whole province. Whether it would have remained so in the recent by-election if the conservatives had placed a man of their own in the field, as they did in all the other cases where they won, cannot be known. They decided to give their support to Mr. Wise, who had been a government supporter, but had withdrawn his confidence. Admitting that the election of Dr. Douglas was a victory for Sir Louis Davies and Mr. Farquharson, we have this fact that the Davies-Farquharson party has lost four out of five seats vacated since Mr. Farquharson, by the grace of Sir Louis, became premier of Prince Edward Island.

AFFLICTED INDIA

Enjoys a Gracious Rain—But the Conditions are Still Grave.

LONDON, July 19.—There has been a good rainfall in Surat, Khandeish and the western part of the Deccan, and rain has begun in parts of North Gujarat, where the numbers demanding relief continue to increase.

The viceroy of India, Baron Curzon, of Kedleston, telegraphs that there were heavier general rains last week in Benar and the central provinces of Hyderabad. The rainfall was good and sufficient for present needs in Rajputana. In Central India there were moderate general rains. The sowing of crops has partly commenced. The monsoon was heavy in Surat, and there were good falls in Kattywar and Thans. There has been insufficient rain in the Punjab for dry land sowing.

Notwithstanding the improved prospects no diminution of relief is possible. On the contrary, the figures last week were the highest reached, village relief and advances replacing relief work. The condition of the surviving cattle in Western India is deplorable. The health returns from the central provinces are satisfactory. The total relief on the lists was 6,148,000. The Governor of Bombay telegraphs to the Secretary of State for India that there were 8,928 cases of cholera in the famine districts during the week ending July 7th, of which 6,474 were fatal, and that in the native states there were 9,526 cases of which 5,892 were fatal. The total number of deaths on the relief works was 5,870 which was 3.9 per 1,000.
