(Continued from page 1) presidential nomination which he won twice.

Closer To Taft

But the theme of his speech, devoted in large part to foreign policy, was much closer to the expressed views of Senator Robert A. Taft than to those of Gen. Eisenhower.

Eisenhower, former commander of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces, has expressed confidence that Western Europe will do its utmost in the common cause.

But Hoover, after saying that except for U. S. and British participation "this European army seems determined to keep its phantom quality," said:

"The potential is there, but we must by now realize that the will is lacking. . . . These six countries of Western Europe have no stirring belief in present danger."

Hoover said the Roosevelt and Truman administrations have lost the peace and sacrificed 650,000-000 human beings' freedom in an effort to appease Soviet Communism.

"The ghost of the Four Freedoms and the Atlantic Charter now wanders amid the clanking chains of a thousand slave camps. There is less freedom in the world today than at any time for a whole century. . . ."

where the U. S. sector and the Russian zone meet near Tellow, unguarded by West Berlin police.

Apparently ready, the Soviet zone People's Police raised the barrier and the abduction car raced to Communist soil without challenge. This act alone, West Berlin police said, illustrated the cold-blooded planning involved.

Much of Dr. Linse's work has revolved around records of Communist seizure of private property under the guise of nationalization. Western Allied authorities regard these files as extremely valuable for the future, should Germany be reunited.

During the last two years, German Communists have engineered the disappearance of several hundred West Germans on their "wanted" list.

John Bendor, chief of personnel for the French High Commission in West Berlin, was seized Sunday while walking along the border at Prouhau. He was returned 24 hours later.

Inspection Of P.E.I. Potatoes To Begin Monday

The seed potato growers of Nova Scotia are advised that the first inspection of early fields has started, states the Weekly Potato Bulletin. In Prince Edward Island the inspectors will begin their readings on Monday, July 14. The growers should examine and rogue their plantings before the arrival of the regional inspector.

Colorado potato beetles have been observed during the past week and egg laying is in progress. The Bulletin states that the young larvae or "red grubs" will appear during the next week. Growers are advised to keep a close watch on potato fields and when the first larvae are seen apply DDT. Potato flea beetles are becoming scarce and they should not be much more of a problem until the second brood appears early in August.
