Lengthy Legal Battle Ends With Death In Electric Chair

MCALISTER, Okla. (AP)—Hurlie Franklin Fairris Jr., born of a Texas desperado family, died in the Oklahoma electric chair Wednesday for the slaying of an Oklahoma City policeman.

The 22-year-old Dallas hoodlum proclaimed to the last his innocence of the death of Detective Bennie P. Gravat, shot during an attempted supermarket holdup July 16, 1954.

Fairris' execution ended a long legal battle for his life. Numerous appeals and two reprieves by Governor Raymond Gary delayed the electrocution. He was convicted Oct. 21, 1954, and originally was scheduled to die Oct. 18, 1955.

Four final pleas for clemency were turned down eight hours before Fairris went to the chair.

The young slayer achieved one of his last wishes, expressed months ago. Immediately after he was pronounced dead, his body was rushed to the prison hospital where his eyes and aorta, the main artery leading from the heart, were removed. The eyes banked high-way patrol relays and plane. Arrangements had been made for a cornea transplant within 48 hours to restore some person's failing eyesight.

DONATED ARTERY

Fairris also had consented to removal of the aorta, which will go to the aorta bank in Oklahoma City, where sections are being transplanted successfully to prolong lives of persons with defects of the artery.

Young Fairris had blamed his life of crime on a number of his relatives. His mother is in the Texas state penitentiary for killing her second husband. She also killed her third husband.

His father is now free on bond after being charged with burglary in P.-is, Tex.

His sweetheart is in a federal prison for transporting a stolen car.

His uncle was given a 50-year prison term in Dallas Tuesday for a \$57 robbery in 1949. The uncle was brought out of the penitentiary for the trial. He already was serving a life sentence as a habitual criminal.

A brother is serving a 10-year sentence for burglary.

The executed man also was a nephew of Raymond Hamilton, a southwestern desperado of the 1930s.

U. S. Navy Urges Congress To Speed Building Of Carriers, Nuclear Ships To Meet Threat

WASHINGTON (AP)—The navy told Congress Wednesday it must push the building of big carriers and nuclear ships "to ensure our survival" because Russia now is second only to the United States as a naval power.

Admiral Arleigh A. Burke, chief of naval operations, said the Russians have more than 400 submarines and even 18 months from now the U. S. undersea fleet will contain only half as many.

Burke urged the House of Representatives armed services committee to approve a \$1,500,000,000 shipbuilding program for the year beginning July 1. It includes an other super-carrier and a guided missile cruiser to be the world's first nuclear-powered surface ship.

"We cannot afford a holiday," Burke said.

The admiral pictured the Soviet navy as well planned for its mission — "to prevent U. S. naval forces and shipping from entering the waters surrounding Europe and Asia."

He said the Russians have no need for a high seas fleet to fight in the mid-ocean, they have concentrated on submarines, destroyers and cruisers.

Burke estimated they are commissioning 75-85 new subs a year and have built more destroyers and cruisers since the war than all the rest of the world together. All are in commission and capable of quick manning on full scale, he said. Russia has no inactive fleet.

PLANDALE, Calif. (AP)—Airminded Prince Bernhard of the United States took a look at the fighter, the F-104, which is the superjet plane still in use by the navy as well planned for its mission — "to prevent U. S. naval forces and shipping from entering the waters surrounding Europe and Asia."

CLEVELAND, (AP)—Ten-year-old Richard Wynn, who said he "just wanted to go," drove off in a Pennsylvania Railroad switch engine Tuesday night while its two operators were eating in a nearby shanty.

Engineer A. J. Frecke and William S. Richard saw their 225-ton diesel rumbling off with the 80-pound boy at the throttle, and gave chase. The pursuit ended in about 1,000 feet, when the engine ran into a parked locomotive and stopped with no damage to either engine. The boy tried to flee but was caught.

The engineer said Richard apparently had pulled everything in sight on the engine until he found the throttle.

He was taken to juvenile detention home.
