TORCHLIGHT PROCESSION!

Fireworks, Serenade, Enthusiasm!

On Monday, shortly after 10 a.m., a Special Train, conveying Sir Leonard Tilley, Mr. Thomas White, M. P., Senator Carvell, Hon. W. W. Sullivan and Mrs. Sullivan with other ladies and gentlemen left Charlottetown for Summerside. On the way Sir Leonard Tilley expressed a desire to visit The Mill Valley Mills. Mr. Archibald, kindly made the necessary arrangements, and the honorable gentleman's desire was satisfied. The hour at which the Ministerial party arrived was, unfortunately, dinner hour, and the hands were not at work. But Sir Leonard and party were politely shown over the factory by Mr. McLean, the manager. Sir Leonard evinced an intimate knowledge of the business. Mr. McLean informed him that twenty hands are now employed in the factory, that about two hundred yards of cloth are daily produced by it, and that business is improving. Some of the webs shown Sir Leonard were admirable for their strength, their beautiful pattern, their finish and cheapness.

After spending about twenty minutes at the factory the party, reinforced by the addition of William Harker, Esq., of Springfield, and Hon. Senator Montgomery, of New London, proceeded to Summerside, where they were warmly received. Finley McNeill Esq., leading off with hearty cheers for the Finance Minister, and Mr. White. They were escorted to the Clifton Hotel, where, in company with Mr. Caron and his party, who had arrived from Tignish, they partook of luncheon. Many of the leading men of Prince County were then introduced, and some time was spent in preparing for the evening meeting.

The meeting was held in Ludlow Hall at half past four p.m. Several heavy showers, the altogether threatening state of the weather, had doubtless the effect of deterring many from coming in from the country. Nevertheless, there was a large meeting, in which all sections of the county were well represented. David Rogers, Esq., presided. William G. Strong, Esq., read the following:

ADDRESS To the Honorable Sir Leonard Tilley, K. C., M. G., C. B., Minister of Finance, &c.

SIR.—The Liberal-Conservatives of Prince County bid you an earnest and hearty welcome on this your first official visit to this county, and desire to give expression to their feeling of respect and esteem for you personally, and their approval and admiration of the able and statesmanlike manner in which you have always conducted the affairs of the Department in the Government of Canada, which is especially under your charge and control. The trade policy propounded and advocated by the leaders of the Liberal-Conservative party, prior to the last general election, commended itself to us, and we, by our votes, signified our approval of that policy, and our convictions that it would prove beneficial and conducive to the best interests of the people of Canada. We rejoice that in this we were not disappointed, and in being able to state to-day that that policy—the National Policy—has been the means, to a very great extent, of introducing an era of general and substantial prosperity, that it has fostered and promoted our industries, and has given rise to many and ever increasing methods of advancing the material interests and the general welfare of the Dominion, and that after a little over two years' experience of this policy, the people of Canada are enjoying in their varied commercial, agricultural and industrial pursuits a period of more than ordinary prosperity.

We feel that our country has not yet fully recovered from the commercial depression consequent principally upon the fiscal policy and general mismanagement of your predecessors in office. We are confident, however, that as time rolls on our people by their energy and perseverance, aided and assisted as now by the wise and efficient legislation of the present Government, will in the near future, have entirely recovered from the effects of the defective legislation of the late Government, and will make yet more rapid progress.

We congratulate you, sir, and through you the Government of Canada, upon the success of the negotiations regarding the Canada Pacific Railway, resulting, as they have, in a contract being entered into for the building upon Canadian soil of that great trans-Continental highway without materially adding to the burdens of our people for its construction.

Permit me here to extend a hearty welcome to the distinguished gentlemen who accompany you—the Hon. Mr. Caron, Minister of Militia, and Mr. Thomas White, M. P., recognizing, as we do, in the former an able and efficient Minister of the Crown, and in the latter one of the ablest and most eloquent Parliamentary supporters of the present Government.

since that time show beyond a doubt that the people of Canada have decided to stand by that policy. Canada, after waiting for thirteen years, decided to impose duties to prevent Canada being made "a slaughter market" for the United States. The result is that though Reciprocity has not yet again been obtained, the country is prosperous and confidence is restored, the Government is gaining in strength and the Opposition has no chance of again winning the Treasury Benches unless it embraces the principles upon which that Policy is based.

After reviewing the history of the National Policy, Hon. Mr. Caron proceeded to show how the debt of Canada had been increased by the party now in opposition, and to criticize the acts of Mr. McKenzie with reference to the Pacific Railway. But notwithstanding all the additions to the debt that have been made, the burden of taxation per head of the population has not been increased; but on the contrary, has been reduced.

The hon. gentleman then reviewed at length the circumstances which led to the Pacific Railway Syndicate Bargain, and the various Bills which had previously been passed with reference to that great public work, and demonstrated that the Syndicate Contract was to the country the most favorable of all; that the Syndicate lands are now selling to actual settlers at \$1.25 per acre; and that the railway rates charged by the Syndicate are lower than those adopted by the Government. He thanked the audience for their kind and patient attention, and retired amid applause.

SIR LEONARD TILLEY rose at six o'clock. He at once grappled with the statements of Mr. Blake concerning the tariff. He denied that the tariff was designed to prevent the free interchange of commodities. The extension of our trade, on fair principles, is the aim and object of the Government. They have provided that the moment the Americans take off their duties we shall take off our duties. It is the American Government, and not the Canadian, who have hampered our trade. Mr. Blake says we are powerless to make the United States renew the reciprocity treaty—a most extraordinary statement for a prospective Leader of a Government to make. What? Powerless, because we happen to be smaller in population, to effect the policy of a neighboring nation, whose interest it is to trade with us? What is the fact? Already influential petitions have been presented to Congress, praying for a revival of trade with Canada on fair terms. The Government desire to extend our trade; but they desire to extend it, not on terms beneficial only to those with whom we deal but on FAIR TERMS. Sir Leonard then set to work and proved that the present tariff operates to the advantage of the revenue, to the advantage of the consumer, to the advantage of the manufacturer, to the advantage of the capitalist, to the advantage of the working man, and their families—to the advantage of all. His opponents, when they were here, said nothing whatever about the discrimination in favor of the poor man with reference to the duties on silks and satins! Not a word about the reduction of the duties on molasses, by which the amount collected on cornmeal and on flour is almost covered! He was satisfied from what he knew of the working of the tariff, that the masses of the people would, by an overwhelming majority endorse it in 1883; and that the Opposition would have to adopt the principles of the National Policy before they returned to power. He then reviewed the charges of the Opposition with reference to Governmental expenditures, and triumphantly vindicated the Government. He was repeatedly applauded as he proceeded and sat down in the midst of an enthusiastic demonstration, which showed that his fine effort was fully appreciated by an intelligent audience.

Mr. WHITE, M. P., was well received. After a few preliminary remarks he devoted his attention to the question of the Pacific Railway. He pointed out the great advantages to Canada which must inevitably result from the railway. He showed that the syndicate bargain is a good bargain, and dealt in a masterly way with the charges and objections made by the Opposition respecting it. Had the second syndicate been successful, Sir John McDonald would have retired from office, Mr. Blake would have been sent for and faith would have been broken with British Columbia, with the country at large, and with Great Britain; the National Policy would have been tampered with, public affairs would have been thrown into confusion—all through a contemptible political dodge. He urged the Liberal-Conservatives to organize; and closed a clear and eloquent exposition by expressing his conviction that the Island would send up not five, but six representatives to support the Government in the next Parliament.

Mr. HACKETT, M. P., proposed a vote of thanks to Sir Leonard, to Hon. Mr. Caron, and to Mr. White, which met with a hearty response, and was briefly responded to by Sir Leonard Tilley. At the conclusion of the meeting, a torchlight procession marched through the streets, headed by the Summerside Brass Band. The Band serenaded the ministers in front of the Clifton House. Fireworks were set off, cheering and Liberal Conservative enthusiasm prevailed.

Bennett & Moulton's Juvenile Opera Company gave its last performance here yesterday evening. The "Extravaganza Candelora" was the play on the boards, and was received by a fair house. Miss Annie Liebsch as Cinderella sustained her part very well as usual, and Missie Mannie Upton as the Fairy looked very pretty, and acted well. Master Harry Hamilton, as the Prince, was quite a success. Florida and Button kept the audience in a continual laugh, and the Baron was also very amusing. "Der Wasserfall" was about the prettiest piece of the evening, and was sung beautifully by Misses Liebsch and Upton. Corinda's Medley was greeted with roars of laughter by the audience. The company left this morning for Summerside; and we wish them every success.

ROATING CLUB.—This evening at 8 o'clock a meeting will be held at the office of F. T. & W. L. Dean, for the purpose of organizing a club for the encouragement of aquatic sports. This is a step in the right direction. We have here, another oceaner who possesses as much brains and as good muscles as a Hulan, a Trickett, or a Ross. All they want is encouragement, and it seems strange to us that Charlottetown, built on one of the most beautiful rivers in America, and having every facility for all kinds of aquatic sports should be to this time without a club with the above object. To the meeting this evening all in favor of the movement are invited.

MR. CARON AT TIGNISH A Crowded Hall.

Addresses Presented in French and in English.

A FOUR HOUR'S SPEECH!

GREAT ENTHUSIASM!

Good Effect Produced.

On Saturday, the Hon. Mr. Caron, accompanied by F. Brecken, Esq., M. P., E. J. Hodgson, Esq., Q. C., J. R. Brecken, Esq., R. F. Qui E, Esq., and other gentlemen went to Tignish. A crowded meeting, largely made up of the Hon. gentleman's compatriots, greeted him; and he was presented with a French address, of which the following is a translation:

To the Hon. Adolphe P. Caron, Minister of Militia and Defence.

SIR.—On the part of the Acadians of this locality, we desire to bid you a fraternal welcome to our midst, and to say that we are highly pleased to receive you. This is the first time that we have had the honor of having in our midst a French Canadian, occupying so high a position in the Government of our country. True to the traditions of our ancestors, we cherish with special predilection our religion, our language and our customs. But at the same time, in common with all other Canadians of the Dominion, we proclaim ourselves very loyal subjects to Her Majesty the Queen of England.

Whatever may be our political opinions we are assured that seeing the country in so prosperous a condition, under the administration of which you are a distinguished member; and we are convinced that you seriously work for the progress and advancement of all. Your administration deserves the gratitude of the country for having raised the finances to so good a condition that to-day a surplus of revenue over expenditure is announced.

In conclusion, Sir, be kind enough to cordially accept our expressions of joy and the wishes which we form for your happiness on this memorable day, which we shall never suffer to be effaced from our memory; and in the future, when we shall hear of you and of the Hon. gentlemen who accompany you, we shall be better able to appreciate the efforts which you are making for the good of our common country.

On behalf of the inhabitants of nationalities other than the French, the following address was presented:—

To the Honorable Adolphe P. Caron, Minister of Militia and Defence.

SIR.—On behalf of the Liberal-Conservatives of Tignish, we tender you a hearty welcome to our village. Although personally a stranger, your name is quite familiar to us, and we are glad to recognize in you a rising statesman of this Dominion.

Allow us to congratulate you upon your recent elevation to a seat in the Cabinet, and the acceptance by you of the important portfolio of Militia and Defence. From your well known zeal and ability we are assured that the Militia of Canada will not, as in the past, remain a force on paper; but will become a body of well-equipped, well-trained men, who will be ready at any moment to respond to the call of their country.

We notice with pleasure that the Trade Policy of the Government has been successful beyond the expectations of the most sanguine, and that under it Canada is enjoying a season of prosperity unparalleled in her past history.

Owing to its operation old and struggling industries have been infused with new life and vigor, while the new ones are springing into existence in all parts of the Dominion. It is also reassuring to find that, after so many years of deficits under the late Administration, our able Finance Minister has succeeded in restoring the equilibrium between revenue and expenditure, and for the first time in many years can show a surplus. The policy pursued by the Government with regard to the Pacific Railway, also meets with our entire approval.

We feel that by securing a Company to construct and operate the road, the Government have relieved the people of Canada of a great burden and much anxiety. We are convinced that under this policy a large immigration will flow into our Northwest territories, thus largely increasing our population, and consequently reducing the taxation of the whole people.

It is evident that the bold and statesmanlike policy of the Government of which you are a distinguished member, has redounded to the advantage of the people of Canada, and must result in strongly out-rencing you in their affections.

We have additional pleasure in welcoming you amongst us, from the fact that this community is largely composed of Acadians, who see in you, the youngest representative of the French race in the Dominion Cabinet; a bond that will unite them all the more closely with their compatriots in the Province of Quebec.

We trust that this year first visit to our Island home may be a pleasant one; and we shall earnestly look forward to the day when we may again have the pleasure of welcoming you to our shores.

HON. MR. CARON returned thanks for these addresses, and spoke eloquently for nearly four hours—two in French and two in English. He reviewed the great questions of the day; and, as shown by the frequent applause, convincing the people that the policy and the acts of the Government are defensible and right.

On concluding, he received an enthusiastic vote of thanks, which was proposed by the Hon. S. F. Perry. In moving the vote of thanks and complimenting Mr. Caron, Mr. Perry took the opportunity to make an attack upon Mr. Hackett, which was so vigorously repelled that he afterwards wished he had not.

Hon. Mr. Caron, while in Tignish, was the guest of the Rev. Deagald McDonald. Mr. WILLIAM LUKES, Government Commissioner, is visiting the Island for the purpose of inspecting the mills and factories. He is staying at the Rankin.
