WE were to-day shown the championship medal to be competed for at the bicycle race in the Roller Rink on Wednesday evening next. The medal is of silver, cross-shaped, and is ornamented with gold leaves. In the centre is an engraving of two bicyclists, and on the rear the inscription, "Five Mile Championship of P. E. Island." On the pin from which the medal depends is a place for the winner's name. The medal was manufactured by P. W. Ellis, Toronto, and was imported through Mr. G. H. Taylor, watchmaker and jeweler, in whose shop window it can be seen.

A LARGER amount of drunkenness than usual has been noticeable about town during the past few days, and several peaceable citizens have been assaulted while passing along the streets. To such an extent has the nuisance spread, that some of the citizens have appealed to the police committee of the City Council, to try and make some arrangements whereby all drunken and disorderly characters should be arrested. The committee were to have waited upon the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon, but owing to the latter being engaged at Court until about one o'clock, the interview was postponed until this afternoon.

NARROW ESCAPE.—Chester, the six year old son of John Dingwell, of Annsdale, had a narrow escape from sudden death on Tuesday last. His father was engaged in hauling kelp from the shore with a heavy truck wagon and a span of horses. After loading the wagon the father placed the little fellow on the top of the load and started. He did not go far before the boy tumbled off, falling between the wheels, the hind wheel passing over his body between the hips and shoulders. He was carried home partially conscious, and medical aid was sent for. After a while the little fellow began to rally, and hopes are now entertained of his recovery. The wagon, loaded as it was, would weigh over a ton; and the wobble is that the child survived.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

What Chamberlain Thinks.

LONDON, Sept. 29.

Chamberlain, speaking at Birmingham to-day said no one was more sincerely animated by friendly feelings towards America than he. No one more desired to maintain good relations between England and America. He referred to Canada's progress and, in reference to the fishery dispute, said that England's duty was to secure for Canada a fair settlement of her case. He regarded the appointment of a fisheries commission as affording an opportunity for commenting a union between Great Britain and the Colonies. The Home Rule question had no right to claim the first attention of the Commons to the exclusion of the questions of local government, protection of life at sea, temperance and other important subjects. He praised Lord Randolph Churchill as the first statesman in many years who advanced the subject of economy in public expenditure. He blamed John Morley and Sir William Vernon Harcourt for not defining the Home Rule scheme, and denied that the majority of the people in Ireland really wanted Home Rule. His speech was received with enthusiasm. A resolution expressing confidence in Chamberlain was met by a counter resolution to express no confidence. Uproar ensued, but the resolution of confidence was finally carried, 200 voting against it.

The Fishery Commission.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.

The President has invited William L. Putnam, of Maine, and President James B. Angell, of Michigan University, to act with the Secretary of State in negotiating with Great Britain for the settlement of the Canadian fishery dispute. Both have accepted. Putnam has been United States consul the last two years in cases arising under the law and treaty in connection with the fishery dispute. Angell is one of the commissioners by whom the latest treaty with China was negotiated.

The Pope's Jubilee.

ROME, Sept. 29.

The Pope's jubilee receptions have begun. The Roman police have seized the Pope's jubilee medals, which are inscribed "Pope Leo III., Pontifex et rex." It is expected that the Vatican will protest against the seizure, and point out that the law of guarantees recognized the Pope's right to the title of sovereign.

Extensive Bush Fires.

MONTREAL, Sept. 29.

Extensive bush fires are raging in almost every direction in Ontario and Quebec. So far not much damage has been done to farm buildings. The losses being chiefly in timber and fences, but unless rain comes speedily, several villages which are now surrounded by fire.

The Charlevoix Victory.

QUEBEC, Sept. 29.

The election in Charlevoix to-day resulted in the return of Mr. Cimon, the Government candidate, by 500 majority. The late member, father of the successful candidate to-day, was a Rielite. This is a splendid victory for the Government.

The New Under-Secretary.

LONDON, Sept. 29.

Col. Sir Joseph Westridge, recently in charge of the British Commission on the Afghan Boundary question, will succeed Major General Sir Redvers Buller as Under-Secretary for Ireland.

The Manitoba Wheat Crop.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 29.

The total yield of wheat is placed at eleven million bushels, leaving a surplus of seven million bushels for export. The average yield is between twenty-five and thirty bushels per acre.

The Race Postponed.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.

The second race between the Volunteer and Thistle was postponed owing to dense fog.

I. O. O. F.—The Sovereign Grand Lodge met in Denver on Monday, the 19th inst. They were received by the Governor, the Mayor and local Oddfellows. There was a full attendance, and the reports of the Grand officers show a prosperous year. The increase of membership was 13,000, making a total of 547,303; encampment membership, 97,773; militant branch, 15,259. There was a relief expenditure of \$2,250,000, and a revenue of over \$5,500,000 during the past year.

AN Ottawa despatch says: "On Friday night the Salvation Army had what they called 'the procession of the ten virgins,' that number of women walking, five with lighted and five with unlighted torches, all being dressed in what appeared to be a burlesque of a Catholic girl's costume for her first communion. The show caused a great deal of comment yesterday, and to-night when the army procession without the virgins was near the post office a large crowd assembled and hooted and jeered them to such an extent that they retreated in short order. One member of the Army who wanted to be demonstrative was hustled a little, but there was no row-throwing or assaults and no arrests were made."
