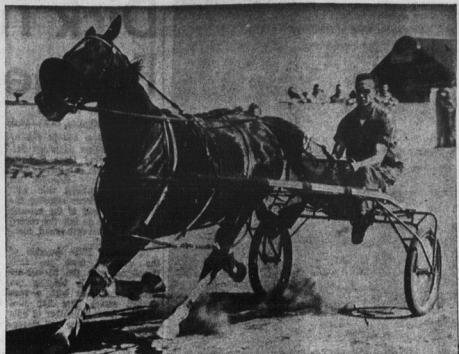

Emile Griffith Defeats Mims

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. (AP)—World welterweight champion Emile Griffith piled up an easy lead on his youth and speed and withstood two late rallies by veteran Holly Mims to score a unanimous 10-round decision in a non-title bout Saturday night.

Griffith, a native of the Virgin Islands now fighting out of New York, came in at 150 pounds, four pounds lighter and 10 years younger than Mims, a 34-year-old middleweight from Washington, D.C.

There were no knockdowns and no cuts in the bout, but Griffith staggered his man repeatedly in the rugged fighting that characterized most of the fast-paced bout.

Referee Arthur Mercante and Judge Tony Castellano each scored for Griffith, 63-1 and Judge Joe Armstrong called it 61-1. The AP scored for Griffith 7-3.

Griffith, who designs ladies hats when he isn't fighting, built up his winning margin in the middle rounds, applying relentless pressure on the veteran Mims in the fifth through the seventh.

Mims, a professional since 1954, appeared to be saving his 34-year-old legs for a closing effort in those rounds and let Griffith take the lead.

The champion bored in continually, scoring with a couple of good lefts in the fifth, rocking his man twice in the sixth and taking the seventh.

Etcheverry Sits At Home Waiting

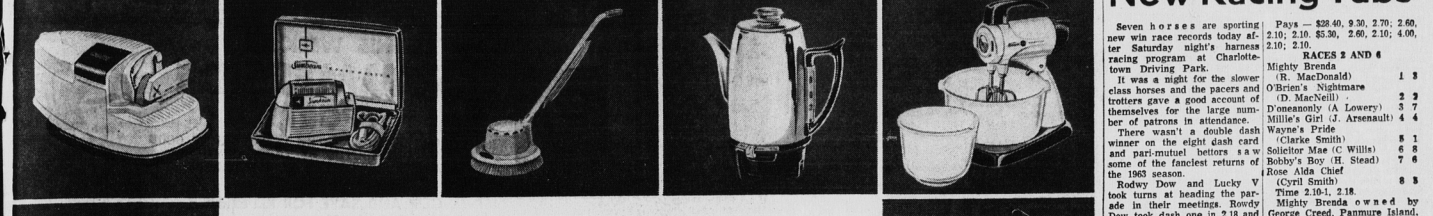
