TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Another Whitechapel Murder.

LONDON, Sept. 10. At 5.30 this morning the body of a woman was found lying in the corner of the railway arch on Cable Street, Whitechapel. The head and arms had been cut off and carried away, and the stomach ripped open, the intestines lying on the ground. The police instantly surrounded the spot, but no arrests have been made. Physicians who examined the body state that, in their opinion, the murder and mutilation occupied nearly an hour. It is thought that the murderer carried off the head and arms in a bag. The murder is the worst of the whole series of Whitechapel murders. The manner in which the head had been severed from the body shows that the murderer possessed some surgical skill. The woman was about 30 years old. Her clothing was shabby. The remains have not been identified. The most intense excitement prevails in Whitechapel. LATER. Details show there was no blood on the ground where the body was found, nor any blood on the body. From this it is evident that the murder was committed somewhere else, and that the body was deposited under the railway arch. The trunk was nude. A bloody chemise was found lying near the body. The arms were intact, but the legs were missing. It is believed the woman has been dead two days.

A Disastrous Storm.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. A damaging storm has prevailed along the Atlantic coast since Sunday and still continues. The damage to railroad lines and coast resorts is very great. Ocean City is almost entirely under water. Grave fears are entertained for property at Atlantic City, as well as for the lives of the residents, for there would be no way of escape should the condition become more threatening. The loss to property at Coney Island by the heavy rains and high wind will reach \$250,000. The beautiful surroundings of the big hotels at Brighton and Manhattan Beaches have been made a scene of desolation. The highways are littered with wreckage of every description to the depth of several feet.

A Committee Appointed.

LONDON, Sept. 10. At a meeting of the shareholders of Rose & Co. to-day, a committee was appointed to inquire into the facts connected with the purchase of the company's property and general condition and administration of the estate. During the proceedings, Dr. Wilson, a prominent agitator for the inquiry, dropped dead.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10. Canon Partridge, of Halifax gives notice in Anglican Synod of a canon on marriage and divorce which reads, "No clergyman in this ecclesiastical Province shall solemnize marriage in any case where there is a divorced wife or husband of either party still living."

Snowed Under.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 11. The harbor commission vote was taken to-day, and the scheme was snowed under. Only 1,173 voted yes, and 2,066 pro, leaving a large vote not polled. Out of the thirteen wards, only one voted in favor of commission, and that by only two majority.

Haldimand Again.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10. Judge Falconbridge has declared the Haldimand election void upon what Colter's friends declare to be insufficient evidence. The case will probably be appealed.
