IN MEMORIAM

DONALD M. MACLEAN

The people of the community of Wood Islands North and surrounding districts were grieved to learn of the passing of one of their oldest and most respected citizens in the person of Donald Munroe MacLean, in his eighty third year.

Two years ago, Mr. MacLean, suffered an illness, from which he never fully recovered. However, he was able to be up and about until two weeks before his passing. He was stricken with a relapse with serious complications, and on Wednesday March 4th, before the dawn broke, the bonds that bind the mortal to the immortal were severed and his spirit winged its homeward flight.

His passing was one of peace and resignation, upholding his faith in "Thy Will Be Done". He was attended during his illness by his pastor, the Rev. E. S. Hales, who ministered to him in comforting passages referring to the better land.

He was a devout member of the Presbyterian Church at Wood Islands of which he was also an elder. He was president of the Young People's Society for a number of years in which he took a deep interest. He was also a member of Sword L. O. L. No. 2737.

During his active career he followed farming as an occupation, except eight years which he was employed as railroad section hand on his home section at Wood Islands.

He was the last survivor of a family of eight born to his parents, the late Murdoch MacLean and his wife, Catherine Munroe.

On June 1st, 1904 he married Miss Margaret MacLeod of Mt. Vernon, whom he leaves to mourn his loss, also one daughter, Mrs. Alex B. Gillis, Belle River, one son John Angus, also his daughter-in-law, Mrs. John A. MacLean who were all present at his bedside at the time of his passing.

One son, Malcolm G. predeceased him at the tender age of two months and 22 days. He also leaves seven grandchildren, namely Mrs. Bruce Stewart, Wood Islands, Mr. Lloyd S. Gillis, Toronto, Ont., Margaret, Christina, Donald, Joan and Charles MacLean, all of whom will cherish fond memories of a kind grandfather, also a large number of relatives and friends.

His funeral service was conducted at his late residence by his pastor, Mr. Hales, who took as his text Matthew 25 chapter, 21 verse, "Well done Thou good and faithful servant". Hymns sung were "The Lord is my Shepherd," "Take Comfort Christians," and "In The Sweet Bye and Bye".

The pallbearers were as follows: D.J. Riley, Hector MacDunnell, Neil Nicholson, George MacLean, Robert T. Cooke, and Alexander MacRae.

A large concourse of people gathered at the home to pay their last tribute of respect, and also at the grave where committal service was pronounced by his pastor, and all that remained mortal of a kind friend was tenderly laid to rest.

We seek to remember him now in the following verses of Longfellow's poem, "Resignation":

We see but dimly through the mists and vapors, Amid these earthly damps; What seem to us but sad funeral tapers, May be Heaven's distant lamps.

There is no death - what seems so is transition; This life of mortal breath Is but a suburb of the life Elysian Whose portal we call death.

IN MEMORIAM

ELVIN A. DEWAR

The sudden death of Elvin A. Dewar at Moose Jaw on Sunday morning, November 23, 1952 came as a great shock to his family and friends.

Born at Brudenell, the deceased was the son of Mrs. Albert Dewar and the late Albert Dewar. He moved to Moose Jaw at the early age of 17, entering the service of the Canadian Pacific Railways, later being promoted to engineer in which capacity he served until his sudden passing. He enlisted for active service in World War I, going overseas in February, 1917 with the engineers.

Generous to the poor and in making many friends both home and abroad, his genial smile and kind sympathy will be missed by his many friends, many of whom will often sigh for the touch of a vanished hand and the sound of his voice that is now still.

He leaves to mourn his sorrowing mother, two brothers and three sisters. William in Brudenell, James in Rosneath, Jessie in Boston, U.S.A., Lillian in Charlottetown and Florence Mrs. Carl Stewart, Montague. His father predeceased him fourteen years ago.

There was a short funeral service held at Broadford Funeral Chapel in Moose Jaw, Sask., which was largely attended by his many friends. The remains were accompanied home by Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Johnston of Moose Jaw. Mr. Johnston was a life long friend and a fellow engineer. A short service was held at the home of his brother, James Dewar at Rosneath, then to the Church of Christ in Montague of which the deceased was a member. The service was conducted by the minister, Rev. Kenneth Norris assisted by Rev. M. D. Dunbar of the Church of Christ, Charlottetown. Hymns sung by the choir were "Tarry With Me" and "Peace Perfect Peace". A solo "The Christian's Good-night" was beautifully rendered by Mrs. Preston Beck. The service at the grave was conducted by the Montague Branch of the Canadian Legion with Cyril Johnston reading the service and John Denham sounding the "Last Post" and "Reveille". The body was laid to rest beside his father in the Montague Community Cemetery.

Relatives and many friends of Mr. Donald Hart wish him a speedy and satisfactory return to former health, from the present illness which has removed him from his responsible duties as manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, at Victoria, the Village by the Sea.

Commons Studies

Tax Resolutions

OTTAWA, (CP)—In the wake of opposition demands for greater tax relief, the Commons Friday completed preliminary study of the tax proposals in the 1953-54 budget.

Members adopted resolutions containing the tax changes and gave first readings to bills based on the resolutions.

Last resolution to pass provided for a five-per-cent reduction in personal income tax and a three-per-cent cut in taxes on corporations.

Opposition members reiterated their views that greater tax reductions should have been granted. A government spokesman announced a broadening of the qualifications under which a full-time student 21 and over may be claimed as a dependent for income tax purposes.
