This remarkable child was normal in every other way and died at the age of fifteen. — Buffon in his "Natural History."

The very latest thing in gasoline storage tank is a pontoon roof which rides on the surface of the liquid. The pontoon roof prevents evaporation of oil because there is no space above the liquid to hold air.

Each year the United States and Canada uses five hundred million barrels of motor oil.

The octave value of the average grade of automobile oil grows higher each year. In 1931 it was 80, in 1938 it rose to 73. (The average octane value of aviation gasoline is 90). To put it another way, the third grade of gasoline used now is better than the first grade used several years ago.

Only 12,000 persons are employed in the world's combined cement industry. Why? Because most of the processing is carried out by modern machinery. This is an amazingly small number of workers when one considers that the British cement industry alone produces and delivers annually to consumers more than 8,000,000 tons of cement.

To produce the coal used annually in making gas, 70,000 miners are kept in continuous employment.

The Queen bee is treated like royalty. To begin with, the egg is laid in a special Queen cell. Then the lava that is to grow into a queen receives a special food called "royal jelly."

When the Queen emerges from her cell, she is most beautiful. The other members of the hive take her food, shake and brush her, and give her every attention. Oh to be a Queen!

On August 16, 1868, for the first time in history the heads of two great nations exchanged greetings by means of cable. Queen Victoria and President Buchanan had a chat which lasted 17 hours and 40 minutes. The Royal message contained 99 words and 500 letters, averaging two minutes for each letter and ten minutes for each word.

That you can tell a church by its spire is not true of St. John's Church, Barrington, Nova Scotia. One of Canada's oldest protestant places of worship, it is conspicuous in the city skyline and a landmark. It was built by Congregationalists in 1769.

A slave boy was sold by Sir David Kirke at Quebec, in 1628 for "50 half crowns."

While the baptism of slaves was more or less general, it did not release them from bondage.

Rev. Daniel Cash, Truro, N. S., freed two slaves, mother and daughter.

To make it clear that civil and religious freedom are as far apart as the poles, in 1761, the legislators of Prince Edward Island passed an Act that baptism of slaves does not always free them from human bondage.

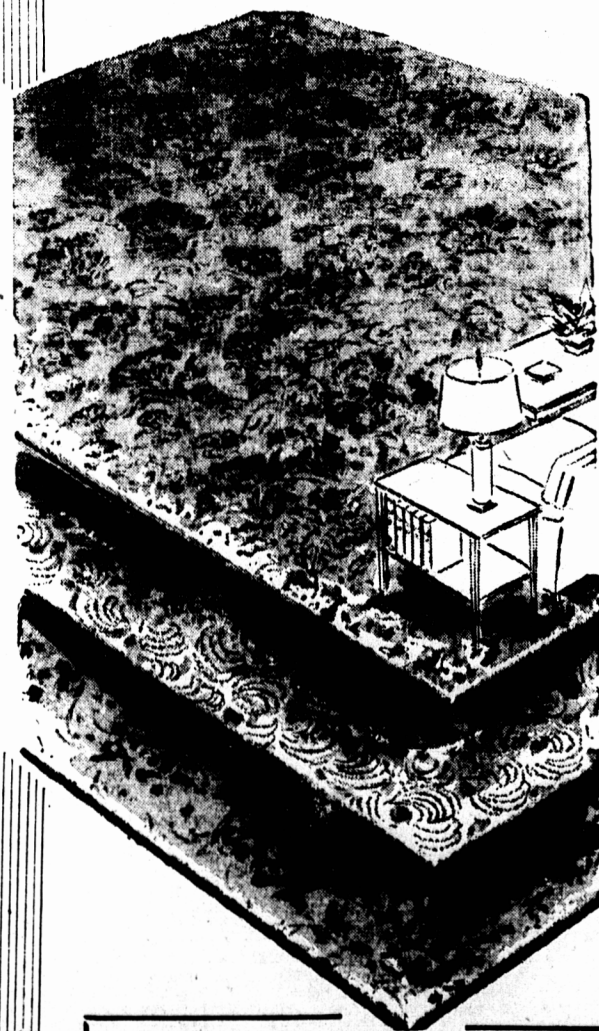
