Studebaker Car Production Hit By Parts Plant Strike

TORONTO (CP) — Studebaker of Canada Ltd. hit by a parts shortage because of a strike at Budd Co. in the United States which is one of its major suppliers, has scheduled only 240 cars for production this week compared with 479 produced last week. The Motor Vehicle Manufacturers' Association reports.

With the reduction, Studebaker, which makes all its cars at Hamilton, has placed its assembly plant on a one-shift basis for this week and next week. Normal operation is two shifts.

Gordon E. Grundy, Studebaker president, says about 300 of the plant's 1,200 workers will be laid off.

Meantime total production in Canada continues to lag behind the 1964 pace. A total of 43,320 cars have rolled off the assembly lines so far this year compared with 89,875 last year.

Chrysler has been closed since Jan. 28 because of a strike and has not scheduled production on this week.

Acadia Capital May Be Restored

OTTAWA (CP) — The Historic Sites and Monuments Board will study the possibility of restoration of buildings at Fort Point, N.S., to mark the early capital of French Acadia, the Commons was told.

Investigation of the site at Fort Point will be made this spring, State Secretary Lamontagne said in a written return for Lloyd R. Crouse (PC — Queens-Lunenburg).

Mr. Crouse asked about possible acquisition of land by the government on which might be found ruins of a fort established in 1632 by Isaac Derazilly while serving as lieutenant-general of the French colony of Acadia.

The reply said extensive study is required before a decision could be made.

Tiny Gambia Now Listed Independent

BATHURST (AP) — Gambia became Africa's 36th and smallest independent country Thursday at a ceremonial lowering of the Union Jack and the raising of the red, blue, green and white Gambian flag.

The tiny country, last of Britain's once extensive West African colonies, clung to its ties with Britain as the 21st member of the Commonwealth. Its success however, may depend greatly on how it gets along with the former French colony of Senegal, which surrounds Gambia and traffics through it.

At the 12:01 a.m. ceremonies marking the transition from colony to nationhood Prime Minister David K. Jawara and Governor Sir John Paul marched to within 20 feet of the lighted flagpole in McCarthy Square and stood at attention.

As the Gambian flag unfurled a crowd estimated by police at 10,000 burst into cheers. Lights and fireworks blazed and celebrations started.

U.S. Pledges \$24 Million To UN Program

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — The United States has pledged \$24,700,000 to this year's program of the United Nations relief and works agency, the body which has aided some 1,000,000 Palestinian refugees in the Middle East in the last 15 years.

Francis T. P. Plimpton announced the contribution without any reference to the over-all UN financial crisis. The Americans had previously withheld pledges to other UN agencies, making clear they did so because of the Soviet refusal to pay peace-keeping assessments.

FELT COST WAS HIGH
Plimpton said the United States felt it was bearing an "unduly high" proportion of the UNRWA cost, and planned to reduce its pledge by \$1,000,000 next year.

Other contributions announced at a special pledging conference ranged from \$560 by Jamaica to \$5,400,000 by Britain.

Canada pledged \$1,200,000, specifying that \$700,000 of this would be in wheat flour and the rest in cash, and that \$200,000 would be specifically allotted for vocational training.

Ambassador Paul Tremblay said Canada had raised its usual pledge by \$200,000 because of the need for increased vocational training. The Canadian pledge was made in Canadian dollars. Most of the other pledges were in U.S. currency.
