Mr. John McDonald, of Centre Toronto, on Free Trade.

Mr. John McDonald, of Centre Toronto, the Grit candidate, in a speech published in the Globe, has the following:—

"Free Trade with the United States meant to-day the extinguishment of all the capital invested by every manufacturer in this country. Everything else being equal, undoubtedly free trade might have its attraction; but to talk of a young people like us entering into free trade with a people like those of the United States, was simply to talk nonsense. We would have just about the same chance as a little boy would have in fighting with a bully. This country was not in a position to enter into free trade relations with the United States—the idea was simply preposterous."

We regret to learn that Ronald Steele, the driver in charge of the mare "Fairy," met with a serious accident at Summerside Driving Park yesterday evening. He received a kick from Mr. Glover's young stallion which broke his leg below the knee.

At a late hour on Monday night, a sailor named McDonald took lodgings on board the schooner "Ocean Wave." He had been drinking during the night; and, after retiring, slept soundly. On awaking in the morning, he found himself minus a watch, chain, and \$80 cash. He made complaint at the Police Station, and officers Cameron and Hennessy immediately searched the vessel. After they arrived, a Maltese sailor produced the missing watch and cash, amounting to \$7. The Maltese, whose name is Joseph Monteno Da Salva, was arrested and tried before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. The evidence of a young negro, named Gairo, who went on board with the Maltese on Monday night, shows that he (the Maltese) went into the cabin where McDonald was sleeping; that when he returned he showed the watch to the negro, and afterwards hid it. There was no proof of his stealing the money. He was sentenced to four months' imprisonment with hard labor.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

TORONTO, Sept. 9. The articles for the Hanlan-Courtney match have been signed, the race to take place at Lachine, October 2nd.

MAGDALENE ISLANDS, Sept. 5, } Via Pictou, Sept. 7. }

The proclamations for the coming election, to take place on the 8th of November next, have been received. The candidates for this county are reported to be Hon. Dr. Fortin, Conservative, and Mr. Tremblay, Liberal.

An American schooner called the Rical is reported on shore at Byron Island with mackerel. No further particulars received.

MEMPHIS, TENN., Sept. 9. The condition of the city grows more desperate every hour. Whole families are stricken down in a few hours, and the call for nurses is greater than can be supplied.

Yesterday there were about 100 deaths and 300 new cases; and to-day, up to noon, 70 deaths are reported. The death rate to-day will probably exceed any previous day. Of new cases it is useless to longer keep count.

TURKISH troops continue to arrive from Salonica at Metrovitz and Novi Bazar, and it is estimated that 60,000 regular troops and insurgents are encamped at those places. The insurgents in the northeast of Bosnia are estimated at 50,000, including 15,000 Redifs and Nizams.

VIENNA, Sept. 9. In an engagement at Bihaes, two Austrian officers were killed and 16 officers and 400 men were wounded.

BERLIN, Sept. 9. In the speech from the throne at the opening of the Reichstag to-day, the Emperor expressed the hope that the anti-Socialist Bill would be adopted, that the spread of the Socialist movement would be arrested, and that those who have been misled by it may be brought back to the right path. The speech contained no reference to foreign affairs.

LONDON, Sept. 9. A letter from Drisco, Davis Strait, dated 12th of July, says that no one vessel of the whaling fleet had caught a single fish, and it was expected that the season would prove a complete failure. No vessel has been able to pass through Melville Bay, which is unprecedented.

ROME, Sept. 9. A Royal decree has been issued ordering every ship arriving at Italian ports from any port of the United States to be placed in quarantine.
