DIED SUDDENLY.—Mrs. Stark, wife of Mr. David Stark, C. E., of Ottawa, while presiding at a dinner party at her residence, on Tuesday evening last, was seized with apoplexy, and died in a few hours. The deceased lady was a sister of Mrs. P. V. Robin, of Port Hope, Ont., formerly of Charlottetown.

WELL EARNED.—The medals presented to Messrs. William Murphy and James McQuillan, pipemen of "Rolo" Hose Company, for their untiring efforts in trying to extinguish the fire in the Cameron Block last February, have been received, and are now on exhibition in the show window of E. W. Taylor's Jewelry Store. The medals are of silver, Maltese Cross shaped, and are nicely chased. Each bears the initials of the pipemen to whom presented.

SHIP NEWS.—The clipper schooner *Elisha Crowell*, fifty hours from Broad Cove, west coast of Newfoundland, with a cargo of canned lobsters to the Hon. D. Davies, arrived in port last evening. Captain Butler reports light fair winds on the passage up. The weather had been very stormy at Port au Port for the fortnight before he sailed. The *E. Crowell* will sail for Port au Port, via Murray Harbor, on Thursday morning next, to bring Mr. Cairns and his fishing crew home for the winter.

ABOUT HORSES.—The *Pioneer* says: Six horses were taken across by the steamer last Saturday morning, besides several of the trotters who wear at the Charlottetown races. * * * Mr. Beverly of St. John, while at the provincial exhibition bought a fine Hambletonian mare from Mr. William Ross of New London for \$150, also her suckling fill sister by Westlawn, for \$100. They were taken over in the St. Lawrence last Saturday morning. We learn, too, that Mr. James McLeod of this town, refused an offer of \$100 from Mr. Traverser of Robshaw, near St. John, for a year and a half colt by the same sire.

THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION, 1889.—We are glad to learn that this General Exhibition has been a financial success. A bank deposit of \$1182 in favor of the Secretary, from Mr. J. A. Richards, who sold the admission tickets, shows that over 4,000 people visited the Exhibition. This deposit, with proceeds added for passes to Commissioners and Exhibitors and entrance fees for live stock, will bring the total receipts to over \$1300. This is a fair showing, considering that a large number of visitors on the second day went to visit the horse races on the Driving Park, who otherwise would have visited the Exhibition.

PECULIARITIES OF THE SEASON.—This season is certainly prolific in freaks of nature. Some sprigs of strawberry bushes plucked by Mrs. Hugh J. Massey, were left at the *Pioneer* office one day last week, with the second crop of ripe berries hanging from the sprays. A bunch of buttercups in full bloom were picked at Moncton, on Friday last. A limb of a crab apple tree, from the garden of Mr. Daniel Hennigar, of Noel, Hants Co., N. S., has on one side full grown fruit, and on the other side full blown blossoms. On almost any part of the tree the same curious freak may be observed.

THE POISONED CANDY.

A Drug Clerk Arrested,

CHARGED WITH SENDING IT

Through the Mails.

THE AUTHORITIES RETICENT

St. John, N. B., Oct. 6.

Never possibly in the history of the city was there more excitement than prevailed on Saturday afternoon when it became known that Wm. McDonald, clerk in the wholesale drug establishment of T. B. Barker & Sons, had been arrested charged with being the person who sent the poisoned candy through the mail, which caused the death of Mrs. McRae. People flocked to the police station and stood in crowds about the streets discussing the question. While it was the unanimous opinion that some strong evidence of McDonald's guilt had been secured, no one could say what the nature of that evidence was. The police officials were ignorant of what evidence had been secured against McDonald, as Solicitor-General Pugsley simply told Chief Marshal to have McDonald arrested, and after a slight hesitation Inspector Weatherhead and Detective Ring were ordered to proceed to Barker's shop and bring the accused to the station. McDonald did not want to go at first, but when told by Ring that he could walk a few steps ahead of the officers he consented to go.

At the store McDonald was searched, but nothing beyond some paper with short-hand characters on it were found. Stenographer Frye was sent for and this paper was placed in his hands to decipher.

Coroner Beryman and Solicitor-General Pugsley were both interviewed by your correspondent, but they declined to say a word as to the nature of the evidence. The Solicitor-General, however, said that the arrest was made on information believed to be strong, but in the interest of justice, it was not advisable to let the public know the nature of it.

After the arrest Detective Ring visited Barker's wholesale establishment, and found boxes corresponding exactly to the ones in which the candy was sent. They were used for fine-tooth combs, and a quantity of these were found which looked as if they had been emptied out of their regular boxes.

McDonald was for some time in the asylum, but was discharged as cured in May last. He was, about a year ago, employed as private secretary to O'Shaughnessy, assistant general manager of the C. P. R., in Montreal, and was in some part of Quebec or Ontario during the Galt poison-d candy cases.

C. A. Stockton has been engaged to defend McDonald, and no reporter is allowed to even speak to him. McDonald is a brother of Mrs. Barker, widow of the late Mayor Barker, of St. John.

Summary Vengeance.

VANCOUVER, B. C. Oct. 5.

Intelligence from the British colony in Borneo says that summary vengeance has been meted out to the Ghase, a Chinese Secret Society, which recently decreed death to all n-n members. Raja Boos, son of the late Raja who established British supremacy in the Straits, learned of the conspiracy, and in a sudden attack upon the Societies quarters secured documents which led to the arrest of about fifty leading members. Six were shot and eleven flogged and wounded, and after imprisonment will be permanently exiled. This is the same society which almost compassed the murder of the first Rajah, Brooks and all the foreigners in Sarawak a generation ago. Several hundred were then executed and the society wiped out.
