S'ide Vessel Lost In Fire In Cape Breton

The "Lazy Mariner" a converted navy Fairmile owned by Jenkins and Cameron Registered of Summerside was destroyed by fire at Port Malcolm, N.S., on Monday. The captain, Lester Beck, arrived in Summerside late Tuesday night, having lost all his personal effects that were on the ship and saving only the compass and weather vane which he snatched through a window.

The "Lazy Mariner" had been used in the coastal trade and was returning from Newfoundland and put into Port Malcolm in Cape Breton on Sunday due to bad weather. On Monday morning they prepared to continue their journey home. The motors were started up to charge the batteries and sometime after Captain Beck noticed much smoke coming from the funnel. Investigating, and finding that the engine room was full of smoke, the switch setting off the fire extinguishers was pulled and for a while it looked as if the fire was extinguished. Shortly after it started up again and in a short time the hold was all ablaze.

It was decided to abandon ship and she was cut loose from the wharf and allowed to drift towards the shore where she burned out. Origin of the fire is unknown but it is thought that it may have been caused by a short circuit.

The present value of the ship is estimated at between \$35,000 and \$40,000 and was partly covered by insurance. Also on board was a quantity of canned beef, valued at about \$2,000.00. Only last week the boat came off the slip at Sydney where she had been fitted with two new propellers and other equipment at considerable cost.

She was of fifty tons register, 110 feet long and 110 feet long and 18 feet beam. The crew were, Captain Lester Beck, Summerside; mate Robert Doucet, King's County; Engineer, Maurice MacLeod, Murray Harbour; deck hand, Benny Loco, Rustico.

The "Lazy Mariner" was owned formerly by Lorne Johnston, Montague.

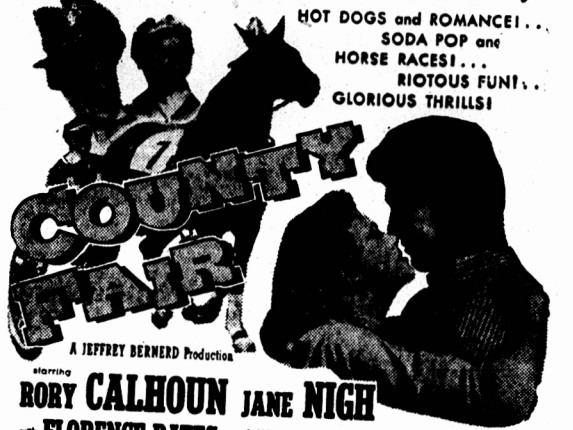
