MONTREAL

MONTREAL (CP) — Advances outnumbered declines with turnover small and the range of changes narrow on the Montreal and Canadian stock markets Monday.

Stronger groups included papers, iron, construction and banks. Royal Bank was up 1/4 at 28, Stelo gained 2 at 80 and Howard Smith was ahead 1/4 at 42 1/2.

Among a number of issues gaining major fractions in these groups was building products, up 1/4 at 35 1/2.

But Hudson Bay slipped 1/4 to 54 1/2 and 1/2 - point losses were taken by Canada Iron at 32 and Bank of Nova Scotia at 77 1/2.

Gains somewhat outnumbered losses in the utilities where Quebec Phone gained a point at 22 and point losses each were taken by Quebec Power at 39 and Bathurst A at 46.

Foods saw 1 1/2-point gains each by Ogilvie at 48 1/2 and Maple Leaf Milling at 18 1/2. But Catell at 40 was off a point.

Down more than a point were Dominion Oilcloth at 42, down 1 1/2, and Ford A, off 1 1/2 at 173 1/2.

Point losses each were taken by Trans-Canada Corp. at 28 and Morgans at 35.

In the senior mines, Frobiisher gained 50 cents at 2.50 as Hollinger slipped 1/2 point to 33.

Most losses range to 4 cents in a mixed penny group.

The closing averages show banks off 1 1/2 at 65.73, utilities up 0.7 at 156.8, industrials up 4.1 at 316.8, combined up 2.9 at 263.4, papers up 3.7 at 440.8 and golds off 0.72 at 100.72.

NEW YORK (KAP) — Mild profit taking skimmed the top off the stock market's latest rise to record highs and led prices irregularly lower Monday.

Autos, coppers, rails, airlines and utilities ended the day lower. Oils and aircrafts were mixed.

Some fair gains were posted by chemicals, electrical equipments and some drugs and rubbers.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped 40 cents to \$229.90.

Aluminum Ltd. of Canada was the fifth most active stock in a total market of 2,730,000 shares, the smallest since Feb. 12. Aluminum closed 1/4 higher at 30.

McIntyre Porcupine's 1 1/4 gain was the biggest in the Canadian sector. Among the losers were Hudson Bay Mining, International Nickel and Canadian Pacific.

Among Canadians on the American Stock Exchange upier Oil and Preston East Dome added 1/4 each. Brazilian Traction and Canadian Marconi lost by the same margin.

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TORONTO

TORONTO (CP) — Western oils dipped on the Toronto Stock Exchange Monday to their sixth successive 1959 index low as trading was the slowest in more than a year.

Western oils opened lower, moved ahead around noon then faded as the close for nearly a half point loss.

Calgary and Edmonton was down 1 at 27 1/2. Bailey Selburn closed 15 cents at \$8.35 and Canadian Husky lost 1/4 at 10 1/2.

Senior base metals were mixed. Labrador was off 1 at 26 1/2 but Noranda added 1/4 at 51 1/2.

Other changes were in small fractions.

McIntyre was up 1 at 89 but most other moves among golds were small. Kerr-Addison dipped 1/4 at 19 1/2.

Index changes: Industrials up .19 to \$29.44; golds up .04 to 93.98; base metals off .29 to 173.97; western oils off .48, to 124.09.

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Canada's Silver Coins Check Shows Metal Up to Standard

OTTAWA — (Special) — Canada's dollar coins, 50-cent pieces, quarters and dimes have been checked for silver content and found up to standard.

The procedure is known as "The Trial of the Pyx" and is performed each year in May.

The silver coins were weighed, measured, sized apart, melted and perhaps even bitten by three cautious assay commissioners, G.H. Faye, D.S. Russell and A.G. Mungall.

Their verdict on the trial? The coins came within the allowed variation of 1.553 grains of silver in the whole coin. In fact the coins were of such good standard they were out by only .161 grains.

In the days when King's did not have to seek re-election every five years it was not unknown for them to tamper with the coins, adding some lead and extracting the silver. Hence the Trial of the Pyx.

The assay commissioner recorded their experiences at the mint in Ottawa in cautious, correct language befitting the importance of their mission.

"(We) have made the assays and trials of Her Majesty's silver coins, there being no gold coins in the Mint at Ottawa in Canada, which, according to the accounts of the officers of the Mint were coined at the said Mint from the first day of January, 1958, to the thirty-first day of December, 1958, both days included.

"We, therefore, found all the said coins to be within the prescribed remedy for fineness."

Also one brother and two sisters survive: David I. (Sturgeon), Leith Brown, Claude Lewis, Lorne Vessey, Harry Lewis, Frank Watts, and Peter Proud.
